MINERS DROP ANOTHER.

Lose to Nebraska Indians on Wet Field 8-4.

The Nebraska Indians proved too much for the Miners in the first game of a two-game series on Jackling Field Wednesday afternoon, and they scalped our boys 8-4.

A two-days rain had made the field suitable for anything but baseball, but Coach Dennie did not want to disappoint the fans, so the game was played. Clean playing was impossible, and both teams were slowed up by the mud.

Huff started for the Miners, but was wild, and was relieved in the seventh after having walked two Indians. Keeling took his place, and retired the side without a score. However, he was afflicted with Huff's trouble, and in the eighth walked four men, forcing in a run. A single scored two men, clinching the game for the Redskins.

After retiring the Indians in one, two, three order in the first, the Miners made two runs. Kamp went to first, advanced on Skeen's sacrifice, and scored on Mountjoy's single. Buck made second on the thrown-in, and took third on Miller's out. Wilson's hot one scored Buck. Raible hit safely, but Dawson flied out.

The Braves tied the score in the second on a walk, a sacrifice and two doubles. They added another in the fourth, and two more in the fifth on two walks, an error and a hit.

Grotts, Johnson, and Head Will Publish Paper Again Next Year.

At a mass meeting held last week for the purpose of electing the Board of Managers for the Missouri Miner next year the present board composed of Fred Grotts, General Manager; J. L. Head, Editor-in-Chief and G. E. Johnson, Business Manager were re-elected.

A motion was passed giving the Board the power to name the other members of the staff. These names will be made public next week.

The Missouri Miner was founded in February by the present Board as an experiment. Seventeen issues have been published and the paper has proved itself to be one of the school institutions. It has received the hearty support of students, alumni and faculty.

Numerous plans are being made for next year. The size of the paper will be increased and every effort made to give the School of Mines a creditable weekly.

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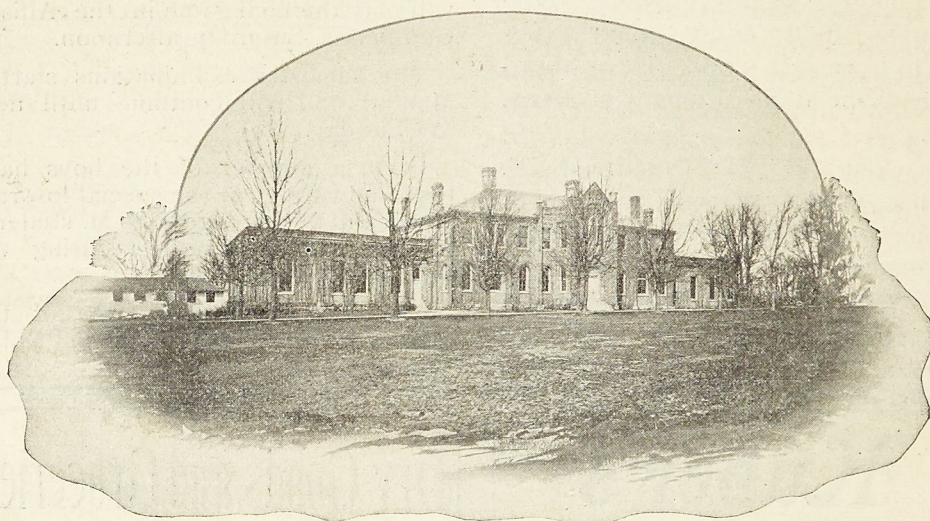
