## M. S. M. PLAYERS TAKES PLACE OF OLD STAR AND GARTER.

At a meeting of the members of the old Star and Garter, the members of the cast of the coming show, "Facing the Music," and others especially interested in dramatics in the school, in Norwood Hall on Tuesday afternoon, a new society was launched in the school. The name chosen for it was the M. S. M. Players.

The constitution which was accepted, called for several plays to be presented during the year, for the benefit of any worthy student organization. The members of the cast of these plays are to be selected on a competitive basis, and any student in school, or any young lady in Rolla is eligible to try for a place.

Membership in the M. S. M. Players is not limited to the students in the school, but extends to any young lady who may have successfully carried a part in two plays at school. Selection in the future will be made on this basis.

Altogether the M. S. M. Players is an organization well worthy of the support of the student body and townspeople. Their first play, "Facing the Music," will be presented in Parker Hall on next Friday evening, Sept. 23, 1921. Let's have a good turnout.

## FOOTBALL PROGRESSES. Competition on the Gridiron Keen.

M. S. M. got off on the first lap of a successful football season this week. After spending the first few days in conditioning work, pushing the buckboard, tackling the dummy and falling on the ball, the squad was divided up into three teams and scrimmage work was started on Thursday. As yet the team has not been picked, but by the latter part of next week those men known as the "firsts" and "seconds" should begin to appear. Competition has been unusually keen during the last week, and very few men have their positions "salted." Eleven men reported one evening to try out for end, and from the looks of them and the rest of the line men we will have to steal the Prudential phrase, "As strong as Gibraltar." And with the fastest back field M. S. M. has seen in years we believe we will be at the top of athletic circles by the end of the season.

## THE UNION CLUB.

A new organization on the campus is the Union Club, formed by the Vocational men. Their club is located in the house vacated by the Pi Kappa Alphas. ## THE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY NOV. 2ND TO 5TH.

As every one knows, this year marks the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Missouri School of Mines. Every one was agreed that the semi-centennial should be celebrated in some way, but just when and how to celebrate were matters of some discussion. While he was still Director, Dr. McRae took the first steps in formulating some definite plans. He got in touch with the various Alumni Associations, and found that they were eager to boost in any way possible.

When Dr. Fulton became Director, he immediately set to work to plan the celebration. The question of time was settled by direct correspondence with the alumni. It was found that most of them preferred to have the date some time in the fall rather than in the spring at St. Pat's, as was originally suggested.

The date finally decided upon was Nov. 2nd to 5th inclusive. Dr. Fulton then wrote a personal letter to each alumnus, telling him of the plans, and urging him to be present if at all possible. There has been no end to the enthusiastic replies to these letters. All the old grads seem more than anxious to get back to have another look at M. S. M., and renew old acquaintances.

The Alumni Associations over the country have been of invaluable assistance in the work for they are in closer touch with their members than is the school. Mr. Cummings, of the St. Louis Association, has given many valuable suggestions, and

in addition is boosting the celebration in every way he knows how. He has sent all members his personal letter, urging that they be here. Mr. M. M. Valerius, of the Tulsa Association, pledges 100 per cent enthusiasm from the members there. He is being assisted by Mr. W. W. Kiskaddon, who was here in Rolla recently conferring with Dr. Fulton. Mr. Ralph H. Benedict, head of the Kansas City Association, promises a good delegation, and any help that is needed. The California Association, even tho it is several thousand miles away, is one of the most enthusiastic, and promises a delegation.

Because the Alumni Associations are so interested, Dr. Fulton has left the program largely to them. They are completely in charge of one day's program, and all other parts of the event will be largely their choice. Dr. Fulton is serving chiefly as a co-ordinator in this respect. The matter of housing the delegates is the most serious problem. Dr. Armsby has undertaken the task of finding

out how many people can be housed in Rolla for the four days of the celebration. If these accommodations prove inadequate, other arrangements will have to be made. The St. Louis delegation has solved its own problem in that respect, for they are going to charter Pullmans for the entire four days.

There is no doubt that as far as the alumni are concerned there is an excess of pep and enthusiasm. They are all anxious to get back and see how old M. S. M. has grown since they were here. It is pretty certain that they will take careful note of the kind of fellows we have here now. For that reason let's go. Show these old grads that we are just as peppy and just as good fellows as they are. Boost the Fiftieth Anniversary all you can now, and when our guests come in, let's do our best to show them a good time, and make their visit one long to be remembered.

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### CONCERNING STUDENT ASSISTANTS.

At the last session the State legislature voted the School of Mines a large appropriation, which caused much favorable comment at the time. This gave promise of a prosperous year, and men who were serving as student assistants in the various departments looked forward to a fitting remuneration for their work this year. Not so, however, for after refitting certain buildings, developing a very practical school mine, and the construction of a carpenter chop and a garage, it was decided to lock the vault just as the students came back. In other words the pay of student assistants was cut from \$25 to \$18 a month. Perhaps the country-wide reduction in wages has some bearing on this matter, or the management has information of a coming break in peak

prices which maintain in Rolla.

From an economic point of view we present the following: 12 hours a week at 35c is \$4.20, which in a month will amount to \$18.00, or \$72.00 a semester. Toward the gaining of this sum the assistant loses the equivalent of six credit hours. What is the value of an hour in dollars and cents? An average student will require \$300 for a semester. Twenty-two hours is the limit which would mean \$13.63, the average cost of a credit hour. Losing six hours' credit, the assistant suffers an expense of \$81.78. Is this fair? It may be that those responsible have not thought of the subject in this light, but does such compensation add to the dignity of the teaching profession?

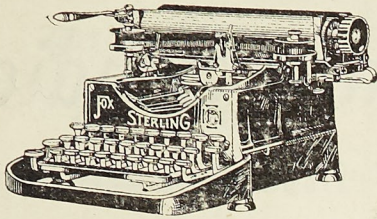

#### DEATH OF E. A. MILLER.

The citizens of Rolla and all Miners and others who knew him were grieved to hear of the death of E. A. (Kelly) Miller, '16, on June 30th, 1921, at a mine of the Saline Coal Co., at Harrisburg Ill., by falling rock. Miller was mine superintendent for the company, and was on a tour of inspection thru the mine when the accident happened. Two assistants were with him at the time, and one of these was instantly killed, and the other was severely injured.

"Kelly" Miller was, without a doubt, one of the most popular men who has ever attended school here. He was considered one of the best athletes in school, and was a four M man in football. He was a member of the Grubstaker Club and Quo Vadis, and was president of his class in his Sophomore year.

He was married to Miss Flor-

ence Ary, and she, with three children, is left to mourn his death. While in Rolla he joined Rolla Lodge of Masons, and his body was laid to rest in Edwardsville, Ill., according to the ancient rites of Free Masonry, at the request of Rolla Lodge.

#### ARRESTED AS COMMUNIST.

The Joliet (Ill.) Evening Herald-News of Sept. 2, 1921, contains an account of the arrest of Charles Bramson, M. S. M. '12, chemist of the Superior Phosphate Co., of Joliet, with seven others in the rooms of the "Workers' Educational Society of America," for alleged connections with the Communist Party.
