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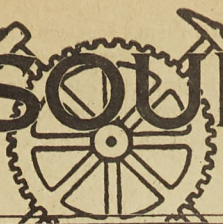

### New All-Time Record Set

A new high was reached this year in the enrollment at MSM. Despite the rather gloomy outlook and general money shortage, last minute enrollments boosted the total to 625 for the fall semester. This represents an increase of 27 over last years total. It also establishes an all time record.

Several last years graduates have returned for further study and there is a general increase in graduate students.

There is also a marked increase in woman students this year. There are twenty co-eds enrolled for the fall semester. This also sets up a new record.

The increase is thought to be partly due to the changes in the curriculum that enables the granting of a straight Bachelor of Science degree with majors in any subject. No doubt some of the increase is due to the scarcity of out side jobs.

## Many Militant Miners Attend R.O.T.C. Camp

A total of thirty students from MSM attended the summer encampment which is a required part of the course in advanced military. Most of the men went to Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas for their training, but a few went to Ft. Humphreys, Va., and Ft. Logan, Colo.

J. K. Richardson, while at Ft. Logan, was presented with his commission since he completed the required four years of school work last year.

Lieutenant Hardin and Sergeant Bertrum were at Ft. Leavenworth. Lieutenant Winslow was at Ft. Riley.

All of the men who were at Ft. Leavenworth report the camp as a very interesting and instructive one. Reveille was at 5:45 and taps sounded at 11. The time during the day would be spent with the students engaged at various tasks such as building a suspension, pontoon, or pier type bridge, digging trenches, close and extended order drill, firing the pistol or rifle, calisthenics, parades, inspections, combat problems, tours of inspection, and horse-back riding. As a whole, all of the men seem to have enjoyed the camp very much.

## Several Changes Made in Faculty

PROF. HARRIS RETIRES

Prof. Elmo G. Harris, member of the faculty for nearly forty years, is automatically retired at the age of seventy years. The retirement became effective with the beginning of the present school year. Prof. Harris came to MSM in 1890 as director and professor of Civil Engineering. After serving as director for two years he devoted his time to civil engineering until 1910 when he went to the university for one and one half years. Prof. Harris has served through the terms of ten directors of the school.

Prof. Harris has done a great deal of consulting work and has contributed much to civil engineering practice. His work in compressed air, hydraulics and reinforced concrete has attracted international attention. He is the author of several text books that are in use throughout the United States.

Prof. Harris is well known about the campus for his ability to get work out of men. Many C. E. graduates owe their success to having learned to really work (Look Page 4 Change in Faculty)

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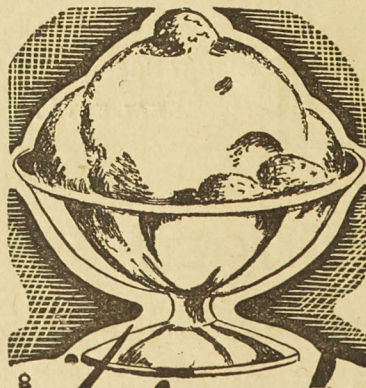
