The Arkansas Indians may be looking out for their scalp this afternoon at the Jackling Stadium when they tangle with the Miners in their first pigskin raid of the 1941 season.

Signal fires from the Arkansas campus reveal that the Indians have only four Braves on this year's team who lettered last year. The army, reports Coach Adams of Arkansas, has taken twenty-one of his last year's tribe.

Although these reports hint that Arkansas will present a weaker team today on the gridiron than last year's, there is little reason to believe that the Miners will hold the Indians scoreless and run at will through their line.

The passing combination of Quarterback Lynch, co-captain of Arkansas State, and "never miss-em" McClellan will be a serious threat to the Miner defense.

Coach Adams will start Cy Perkins at tackle. Blayne Glasgow will hold down the center of the line, while Dill Settemire and Grauer Tafferty will fill the guard slots. The Indian backfield will be comprised of Adams and Mertoach at the halves, Lynch at quarterback, and McClure at fullback. Stationed at the ends will be speed merchants McClellan and Ryan.

Arkansas will run most of their plays from a short punt formation and box to the right or left. At defense, the Indians use a shifting 6-2-2-1.

The Arkansas squad of thirty strong arrived at Rolla last night and immediately started to work out under the arc lights on the upper Miner football field.

Hip swinging Paul Fullop, a speedy and deceptive back, who earned his weight in pigskins last season, will be the main spark in the Miner offense. Veteran Keith Cook, aerial artist, will play in the fullback position.

Two new stars will be unveiled today in the persons of Jimmy Miller and Latrell Jones. Halfback Miller is a top notch ball packer with plenty of football knowledge. Latrell Jones, blocking back, is the brain man for the Miner backfield.

Coaches Gale Bullman and Percy Gill will start Nicholas Mushovic and Gene Hammann at the ends and Captain Ed Kromka and Theo Hoby at the tackles. The guard positions will be held down by Gilbert Carafail and Frank Irland while Meredith Kiburz will start at center.

Two new faces in the Miner line are Nicholas Mushovic and Gilbert Carafail. Carafail is the only Freshman in the starting line-up.

The Miners will run all of their plays from a T formation shifting to a box. A shifting defense will be used.

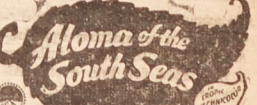

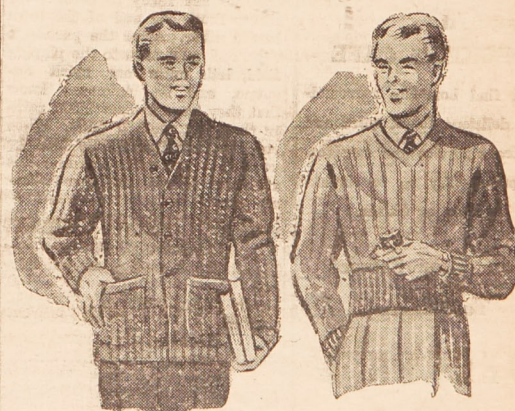

Knights Templar Has Loaned \$28,000 To MSM Students

Knights Templar Press Release

During the year 1922, the Grand Commandery of Missouri, in co-operation with the Grand Encampment of the United States of America, created the Knights Templar Educational Foundation of Missouri. This Foundation has had far-reaching influence, 2,455 student residents of Missouri using the \$404,236.50 which has been loaned to date.

Juniors and Seniors in accredited colleges and universities are those eligible for loans, and the maximum amount for one school year is \$200.00.

On the campus of the Missouri School of Mines, 225 students have received loans totalling \$28,022.00.

Mr. H. H. Armsby and Mr. Noel Hubbard, have rendered invaluable service as they have (1) furnished blanks and general information for requesting loans, (2) investigated applicants, and (3) kept in touch with graduates. They will continue in this capacity in cooperation with the Grand Commandery Committee.

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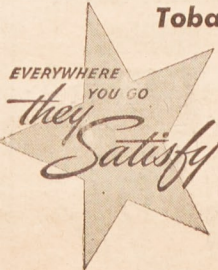
