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IT'S TIME FOR A NEW DEAL ON THE ROLLAMO SETUP

Two weeks ago in an issue of the MINER, several facts concerning the incompatibility of the Rollamo Board system was presented. Since then, many students have agreed with the criticism published, and we believe that it is time that some action should be taken. Meetings have been held with the parties concerned, but they have made no attempt to act on suggestions. They have agreed that the constitution should be changed, but are trying to stall the issue. It is time then, to bring the matter openly to the student body and let the Student Council investigate the matter more thoroughly. It has been said that the Constitution provided a "Closed Shop System." The following figures prove that this is true.

The MINER BOARD constitution limits its membership to 30% from Independents, and 20% from any single fraternity. This method seems feasible to provide a co-operative board with no single group gaining total control.

The following changes in the constitution of the Rollamo Board have been proposed to create a more "non-political" organization.

(1) To elect all officers and board members by ballot of the entire membership of the board instead of by the six officers.

(2) To include in the yearbook pictures of all organizations, such as the Radio Club, Photography Club, and eating clubs, in addition to the organizations that pay for space in the book.

Perhaps the increasing danger of this important issue may be best represented by the increasing amount of the officers "split" during the past four years as represented in the following figures:

scribed several particular instruments in wide use and told of the various difficulties encountered in making each one. One instrument described was used by large baking concerns and had a scale calibrated in loaves of bread per hour.

At the close of the lecture the audience was allowed to examine a large display of instruments furnished by Mr. Olesen. This display included, voltmeters, ammeters, exposure meters, thermometers, and many other forms of electrical instruments. One ammeter displayed was sensitive enough to detect the current produced by holding one treminal in each hand.

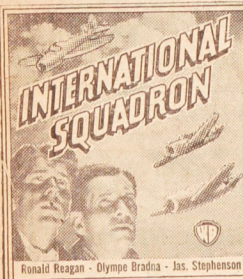
