Saturday, October 24, MSM will celebrate its annual Parents-Engineers Day with a continuous program of attractions for parents, alumni and friends.

From 8-9 a. m. there be registration of parents and visitors in Parker Hall. After registration, guided tours of the campus will be conducted in order that parents may view the laboratories and buildings in which their sons pursue their studies. Special exhibits will be shown in all the departments.

The fraternities and eating clubs will be hosts to the out-of-town visitors with luncheons served in the various houses until 1:45.

The Parents-Engineers Day program will be highlighted by the MSM vs Warrensburg football game which is scheduled to start at 2 o'clock on Jackling Field.

The program for the day will be concluded by a Parents-Engineers banquet at the Pennant Hotel in the evening. The speaker for this occasion is being selected.

Tau Beta Pi Holds Pledge Quiz

The Tau Beta Pi exam was given to the pledges on Thursday night. Nine out of the ten prospective members took it. The other one will take it later. Incidentally, all of the testees passed the quiz with a score higher than the required 65. The quiz covered all subjects which are necessary to the engineer's education, such as English, Mathematics, Chemistry, and Physics. Following are some sample questions from the quiz which the pledges struggled with. Try yourself out on them.

Civils Hear Talk On Aerial Mapping

Mr. J. M. Harden of the United States Geological Survey, Topography Department spoke on the subject "Aerial Mapping" before a meeting of the Student Chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers on Tuesday night. His lecture covered the development of aerial mapping from its beginning to the present time. The principles applied to aerial mapping and their applications to practical problems with relation to aerial mapping were illustrated by photographs and drawings.

The present emergency has increased tremendously the demand for topographical maps and surveys. Such maps are extremely valuable in the selection of sites for military uses.

In all aerial mapping the final map is made from photographs controlled by actual ground surveys. After the corrections for tilt of the camera and other distortions are completed a true model of the earth's surface is had where elevation and horizontal position are correct to five feet. The contours are then drawn on the map. These contours are accurate to one half of one contour interval.

Among the guests at the meeting were Capt. C. L. Sadler, Division Eng., U. S. Geological Survey, and Mr. T. L. Vander Velde, Professor of Sanitation.

A large number of students and other members were present at the meeting held in Harris Hall.

National Tube To Interview Seniors

Mr. Gould, a representative of the National Tube Co., will be here Monday, October 19, to interview Seniors in Mechanical and Metallurgical engineering in regard to prospective jobs with his company. Yesterday, representatives were here from the Navy Research Laboratory and the interviewed Seniors in all branches of engineering. Tuesday, October 20, the United States Civil Service Commission will be here with representatives from all their departments for the purpose of expecting applications. This year all the red tape will be done away with, and jobs will be offered on the spot without the usual procedure. This is a good chance for any seniors who wish to work for the government to get in. October 27, men from General Electric will be here to interview Seniors taking courses in Electrical, Mechanical and Metallurgical engineering. Also, on November 5, the Radio Corporation of America will have representatives here to interview seniors in all branches of engineering.

Academy of Science Holds Meeting

The regular meeting of the College Academy of Science was held last Wednesday at 7:30 in room 204 Norwood Hall. Ed Mochel called the meeting to order. After the minutes of the last meeting were read, the guest speaker Dr. Mann was introduced. Dr. Mann gave a very enlightening address on The History and Background of the Missouri School of Mines. Dr. Mann exhibited pictures of former Deans of the school and also of the original campus and surrounding sites.

The members discussed plans for an outing designed to raise more members. Announcements of this will be made soon.

All Services To Speak To Students

Representatives from the Army, Navy, Marines Corps, and Coast Guard will be here November 4, and 5, to present to the students a complete picture of the possibilities of enlisting in their various branches. There will be an hour and a half student assembly assembly after which there will be a room assigned to each of the services where students will be interviewed and have explained to them the various branches.

Going on the assumption that each student is willing to help in the war effort, the board will be here to tell the student what he can do. The student will have the privilege of determining which service he wants to get into and the representatives will determine whether he is qualified. As the Army has been primarily interested in M. S. M. through its R. O. T. C. course here, it will have first choice. Students will be enlisted in the E. R. C. first through their own choice and then by their standing and the number of men the school can handle. Then, by agreement with the Army, the rest of the services will be allowed to enlist men from what is left over.

The idea behind the enlisted reserve is to create a reserve of men, trained in various technical subjects, and with several years of college experience behind them and the age that would necessarily go with this experience. At this time we probably have enough of such men but we have no reserve.

If students were taken out of college new and sent to officers training school for ninety days to be graduated a second lieutenant they would make good platoon leaders. Why not use this procedure then with all students instead of waiting till the finish college? The answer is that the man taken out of college would probably never be more than a good platoon leader, at least not until he had a couple of years experience. He would not make a good company or battalion commander whereas the man graduated from college with age and experience behind him would probably be able to advance from platoon leader to company commander in six months and be able to take over a battalion in another six months and not do a bad job of commanding any of them.

The plan then is to keep these men in school taking courses selected for them by the service they are enlisted in. Then in two or three years when a reserve of officers is needed, it will be available.

As to whether the school will offer the courses selected by the War department, it will either

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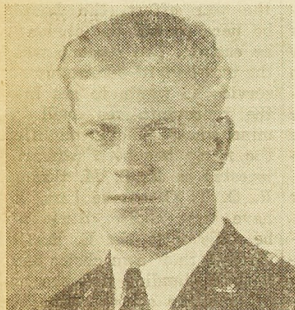
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In The Campus Spotlight

The popular freshman, Mohavic, completes the trio as secretary-treasurer.

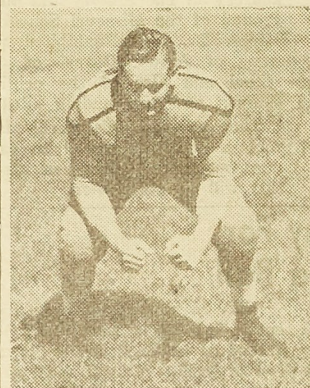
During the evening the obstacle course was given a good workout. The easiest and fastest ways of getting over the wall and fences were discussed and illustrated.

Yesterday, October 16, the junior class held one of the most stimulating elections in its history. The election began very informally under the sponsorship of one hundred and ten milling upperclassmen, and was presided over by the president of the class to date.

Four men were nominated for the presidency of the class namely—Ralph Feldhaus, Willis Clark, Harold Butzer, and R. H. Kendall. However two of these men were withdrawn, leaving Feldhaus and Clark to be voted upon. Feldhaus carried the election by a vote of fifty-two to forty-five.

The vice presidency was run between the two capable candidates, Warren Helberg and William Christman. The tally for vice-president finally scored fifty-five to forty-four, in favor of Warren Helberg.

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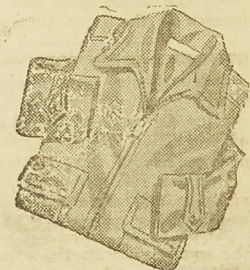
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APO Scrap Drive In Full Swing

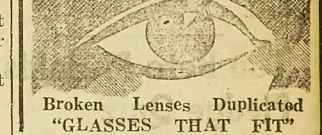

They will furnish guides for the parents on Parent Day Oct. 24. These men will conduct parents about the campus. This will be a great assistance in displaying the various departments of the campus.

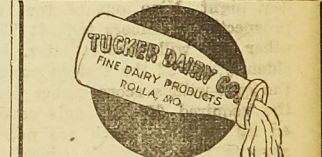

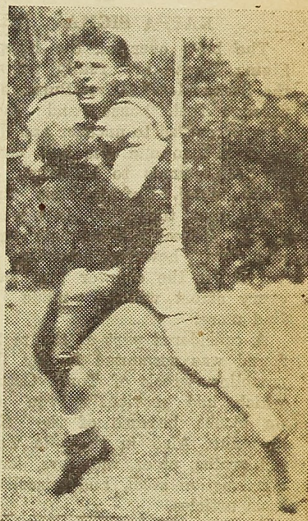
Glee Club To Sing At Football Games
