Six Men Receive James Awards

Last Friday morning, convocation ceremonies were held in the school auditorium in Parker Hall for the purpose of distributing the Lucy James Awards.

There was a slight change in the program which was published in the last issue of the MINER. President Frederick Middlebush of the University of Columbia, was scheduled to give a talk on the subject: "Our World Crisis", and also to distribute various honor awards, but under circumstances President Middlebush could not be present.

The Lucy Wortham James awards were given to six of the students of M. S. M. The following men received these awards:

The awards, which are in the form of \$200 scholarships were distributed by Dr. C. V. Mann, head of the drawing department of M. S. M. Dr. Mann also gave a talk on the background of the James award.

The history of the James Awards is an interesting story. Mr. James owner and operator of the Meramac Iron Works near Meramac Springs, was accused of being opposed to the operation of a school of mines and metallurgy here in Rolla. However, his true attitude was later shown when he provided the finances for four students in this school. His practice has been continued by the representatives of the James estate. The number of awards given have increased in the last two years. Five awards were made last year; the number was increased to six this year.

Immediately following the ceremony, in which the graduates were addressed by Rear Admiral Alfred E. Montgomery, U. S. N. Commandant, Brown and his classmates pinned on their "Navy Wings", distinguishing mark of the Naval Aviator.

Miners Drop Basketball Openers Washington and Westminster

Several Prospects

Now Up Well in Games

Coach Hafeli's Miner quintet opened a fast see-sawing game with Washington University of St. Louis, last Friday night by a score of 55 to 46. After being out in the first half the Miners (the Bears even in scoring during the second half. The Miners always in there picking away at the Washington lead, but lacked necessary drive to overcome reserve power that Washington held.

The game was a free scoring affair as the score indicates. Jack Anton, All-Valley Star last year, the blistering pace by scoring points for the victors, while Leo Spinner, and Don Smith, scored and 13 points respectively for the Miners. Leo Spinner was truly in his shooting, and seemed to be everywhere on the floor at the time, which greatly perturbed the opponent team. Don Nelson, freshman newcomer on the Miner squad, showed in a very commendable performance in his first appearance wearing the Miner colors.

Washington opened the game on a free throw in the first minute of play and jumped to a 11 to 10 advantage after seven minutes of the first half had passed by. Washington forged ahead again on several field goals to lead the Miners 20 to 13 half way through the first period. The Miners managed to climb within three points of the Bears, but a hot rally by the Miners put them ahead 33 to 24

as the half ended.

The second half developed into a real battle between both teams, with each team matching the other in scoring. Each team wound up the second half scoring 22 points apiece, the first period margin gained by the Bears providing the margin of victory over the Miners.

A bright spot in the Miner's scoring was their ability to make 12 out of 16 free shots. The game was a rather rough affair as well as a scoring race, with 17 fouls being chalked up against the two teams, 12 against Washington and the remainder against the Miners.

The game was better than expected from the Miners for their first start of the season, and if this game is a preview of what is to come, the Miners will break into the winning column more than once this year. The Miners journeyed to meet the Billikens in St. Louis last night and they were expected to give the Bills a close battle.

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


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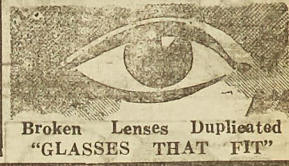



War Training to Be Continued on MSM Campus

The School of Mines and Metallurgy in the cooperation with the United States Office of Education will continue to offer certain intensive Engineering and Science courses under authority of the Engineering, Science and Management War Training Program. The courses are to be of college grade, but no credit toward a degree can be granted. No tuition will be charged since the entire program is financed by Congressional Appropriations.

The student has only to furnish his text books and subsistence. The purpose of the program is to train workers, both men and women for more responsible positions during the War effort. The courses will consist of a group of subjects offered for sixteen weeks starting Monday, January 4, and ending April 24, 1943.

Over 500 students have been enrolled in the Missouri School of Mines program and practically all of them, satisfactorily completing the various group training, have been placed in vital War Industries or with various Government Agencies engaged in the War effort.

A recent survey of the Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that labor requirements indicate that by the end of 1943 there will be twenty million persons employed in War Industries compared to eleven million as now employed, but planned expansion of the Armed Forces will remove large numbers of young men from industry who will have to be replaced by older men and by women. It is expected that five million women not now in the labor market will be employed in War Industries by the end of 1943. It is evident, therefore that tremendous training needs exist, particularly for the training of women and older men not now employed in the War effort.

To Meet War Needs.

The War training program at the School of Mines is especially designed to meet these needs and preliminary applications will now be accepted by the School of Mines for enrollment in the Spring War Training program.
