ENROLLMENT SHOWS GENERAL AND CHEMICAL ENGINEERING MOST POPULAR COURSES

The total enrollment for this term is one-hundred ninety-five, as released by Mr. Hubbard's office Wednesday.

Class figures show eighty-eight Freshmen, twenty-eight Sophomores, thirty-seven Juniors, thirty-one Seniors, and one graduate student.

Of the above listed Miners, there are thirty-five registered for General Engineering, with thirty-two in Chemical running second. Next popular of the courses is Electrical Engineering, with thirty enrolled. Mechanical, Civil, and Mining have been chosen, respectively, by twenty-five, twenty-three, and eighteen students. Ceramics, Petroleum,

Geology, and Science, represented by six, five, three and two, respectively, seem to bring up the rear this term.

This enrollment, larger than that of several previous years seems to foretell a much larger school in semesters to come after victory.

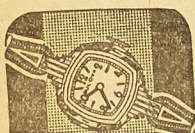
