Dear Bill:

At a meeting of the Faculty of Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy on June 12, 1945, the student paper, The Missouri Miner, was the subject of considerable discussion. Faculty members felt that a number of articles had appeared in the Miner which were unfair to certain members of the Faculty. The Faculty felt that the spirit of cooperation, as exemplified by articles in the paper, was not entirely what it should be; that Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy will be able to fulfill its functions better if students and Faculty work together harmoniously.

The Faculty, therefore, without dissenting vote established the requirement that the Editor of the Missouri Miner shall report to the Faculty, through the Dean, upon request the author of any article appearing in the paper.

I take this occasion to notify you of the Faculty action. At the same time I wish to assure you that the members of the Faculty are anxious to work with you and to help you produce a paper of which we may all be proud.

BOARD OF CURATORS TO VOTE ON FUNDS FOR STUDENT UNION

The meeting of the Board of Curators that was to be held last Friday, June 15, has been postponed until the first Friday in July. This meeting is to be the reorganizational meeting of the Board and it was postponed in an attempt to enable all of the members to be present.

The main topic under discussion will be that of the Student Union for the Missouri School of Mines which is to be located in the old Garage next to Harris Hall. A year ago at a meeting of the Board, it was agreed that an appropriation of Five Thousand Dollars be granted for the purpose of such a Student Union. However, the School Architect set an estimate for completely remodeling the building to make a good location at the cost of Twenty Thousand Dollars. The question of increasing the appropriation to the amount needed is to be put before the Board at the next meeting. Work on the project has been held up pending action by the Board.

and handsome!

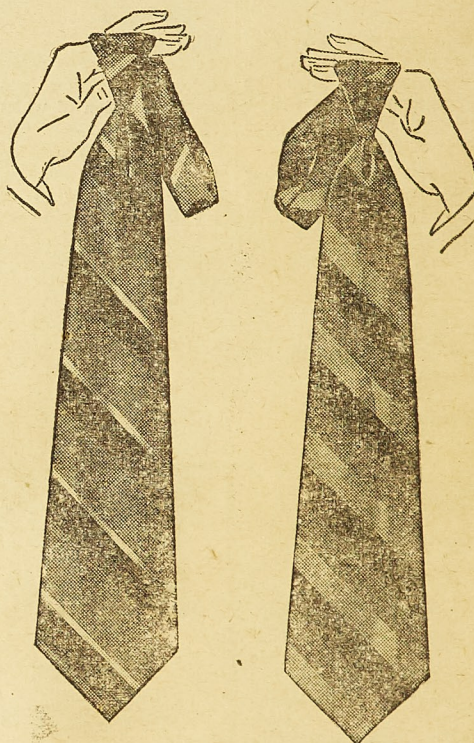

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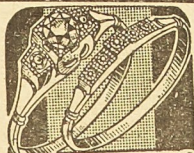
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
