## Varsity Begins To Scrimmage First Games To Be Oct. 6th

Because most of the football squad are boys who have never played organized football, Coach Hafeli spent the first two weeks of the season on fundamentals. Last week's practice centered around learning plays through dummy and team scrimmage. Wednesday and Thursday of last week, two selected teams ran plays against the remainder of the squad. Friday, two elevens scrimmaged in the rain. The coach thinks that hard practice and determination will fit the team for their first game Oct. 6th. This game will be played here with the Missouri U. "B" team.

Don Schultz and Marty Leonard, fullbacks, are expected to do most of the team's kicking this year. Jack Nomi and Art Schmidt, quarterbacks, are practicing spot passes to be used from the "T" formation. All the offensive plays are being run from this position. Schultz is also slinging passes from his fullback spot. Jack Rother looks like a sure start at left end. Although he weighs only 165 pounds, Jack makes that up in his pass catching ability and speed. Don Matthews is probably the most versatile line man on the squad. He will be called upon to play center, tackle, and guard. Clark Miner, halfback, has been in the bench with a sore back, and Rigo Saenz, big tackle, has had a sore foot.
