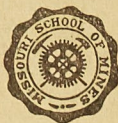

MINERS LOSE 25 - 0 TO M. U. "B" TEAM

Last Saturday, October 6, M. S. M. opened its 1945 football season against the Missouri U. "B" team. The game was played at Jackling Field.

Although the Miners dopped the decision, they fought hard. Statistics show the teams even, but the experience of M. U. against the greenness of M. S. M. was the difference. This will be corrected with more competition however.

The boys played hard and demonstrated a variety of plays that kept the opposition guessing. Carney Fesler at tackle, Syl Pagano at guard, Jack Rother at end, Sherman Dempsey at guard, Don Mathews at center, and Frank Hequembourg at halfback were particularly impressive. They continually broke through to smash up plays and hand M. U. a series of losses. Hequembourg sparked a Miner drive to the M. U. 3-yd. line with a 35-yd. dash around end in the second quarter. The flame was quieted though when a Miner aerial was intercepted on the 3-yd. line.

The scoring was done in the first, third and fourth quarters. Pierce went over from the 1-yd. line for M. U. after an attempted quick kick by fullback Don Shultz was blocked. Broaders converted from placement. Later in the period, McHenry took a short pass and crossed the goal line. M. U. failed to convert. In the third quarter McHenry again received a 30-yd. pass to count. The conversion was wide. Mais registered the last tally on an off-tackle plunge from the 2-yard strip. The placekick was again wide.

Although the boys lost they are looking forward to the game with Springfield next Saturday. The rooting section last week was rather feeble. Let's come out Saturday and cheer the team on to victory!

AS A MINER SEES IT

Before a word is spoken about the things the Miners do or the Miners themselves, I have a few words that must come first. I have been disappointed many times in my life but one of the biggest disappointments that has ever happened to me happened to me last Saturday. I am speaking of the attendance at our first football game. One of the funnier remarks that I heard was said when Miss Mertz came out on the stage to lead the cheers, someone next to me leaned over and whispered, as he looked up at Ruth, "I don't think I have ever seen Miners written with a better background."

The bonfire under the able leadership of Nomi, Alvarez, Miller and Buterbaugh was quite a success. The freshmen were nice little fellows and did just exactly as they were told and had a great time doing so. I don't think there was one who did not enjoy the speakers from Jersey, Brooklyn and Texas. Mr. Andre Dasso kept the boys in stitches with his shouting of orders, and you all know that South American accent. After the bonfire everybody went to the Rollamo and rested up while watching Jack Benny in "The Horn Blows at Midnight." Keep it up upper-classmen, keep those freshmen on the ball, some of them need it. During the course of the evening Nomi and Pagano received a few cheers from small groups of fellows. The boys would yell, "yea Jack, Yea Nomi, you got the best go," or maybe it would be

Syl Pagano. After one of these cheers Fred Richardson wanted to know what was all this cheering about "tobasco."

I am a little disappointed with Dick Hefelflinger. During the course of the game Dick was pulled out and put back in quite a few times. After a while Dick got a little irritated and on one occasion, when called out he threw his helmet on the ground and in general made known his resentful attitude. That is the wrong attitude Dick. The coach has reasons for taking you out and putting you back in.

Speaking of the coach, I think he should mend his ways too. When a player comes off the field it is the custom for the coach to walk out and throw a coat over his shoulder or shake his hand or give him a few words of encouragement, not just sit on his rusty-dusty and watch the game. The fellows need this kind of encouragement whether winning or losing; that's one thing the players get up and fight for. How about that Haf., don't you think I am right.

There is one more thing I would like to bring up before I finish this column. Last week, after the students in one of the power plant lab courses had completed their work they thought it would be permissible for them to leave, so they left. 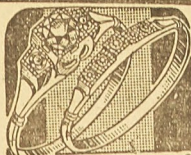

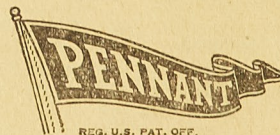
