This show "Twice Blessed" starring Gail Patrick and Preston Foster has just finished playing in St. Louis. The members of St. Pat's Board have 40 cent tickets for service men and High School students. Miners get a date and your tickets and take a well deserved break after mid-semester and before you start the home stretch.—See you at Jackling Gym for the Homecoming dance Nov. 10th and at the Uptown the following Wednesday or Thursday. Come on fellows, let's have a big turn out and show the fellows the old Spirit is still here.

The Miners make their final appearance for this season on the gridiron Saturday when they tackle Kirksville Teachers College here in Rolla. This will be the last game that Carney Fessler, tackle, and Jack Nomi, quarterback, will put on their silver and gold jerseys and play football for Missouri School of Mines. These two boys with Syl Pagano, regular guard who was hurt in the St. Louis U. game, will graduate in May. The game will be a feature of the first M. S. M. Homecoming celebration in two years.

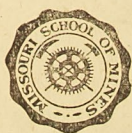
The dope on the Kirksville team is rather limited. Coach Vince Geringer opened the season with ten freshman and a junior in this line-up. Kirksville hasn't fielded a varsity football team in three years, so their team will have just as little experience as the Miners. They opened the season by tying a strong Missouri "B" team that beat the Miners 25-0 two weeks later. The next weekend, in their second appearance, the Kirksville team travelled to St. Louis to take a 92-6 beating from St. Louis University. Three weeks later, St. Louis U. could only score 32 points against the Miners. Before last week's game in Carbondale, Ill., Kirksville had won one game, lost two, and tied one. Their line averages 190 lb per man, and so will be approximately 10 lb heavier than the Miners.

Disregarding any comparison of the two games mentioned above, the Miners are going to be out to win their final game Saturday. After losing four straight, they will be digging in and fighting in traditional Miner spirit. Outside of the few mistakes in the opening quarter the Miners played their best game of the season against St. Louis U.

In the dressing room after the game, the boys were happy and high spirited. It was a lot different after the Springfield game in Springfield week before last. The disappointment, the disgusted at-

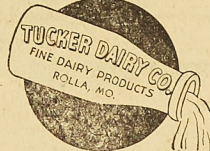

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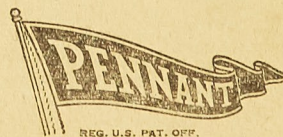
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
