86th Commencement Exercises To Be on Jackling Field May 31

The 86th annual commencement of the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy will be held on Jackling Field on the campus of the school on Sunday, May 31, according to an announcement by Dean Curtis L. Wilson.

The commencement exercises will begin at 10:00 a. m. Sunday with the baccalaureate address delivered by the Reverend H. S. Anglin, Superintendent of the Rolla District of the Methodist Church. Reverend Anglin's topic will be "Worth of a Man."

The graduating exercises will be held at 5:00 p. m. on Sunday afternoon, again on Jackling Field, with Major General Emerson Charles Itschner, Chief of Engineers, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C., giving the commencement address. His subject will be "The Engineer of the Future." There is a total of 496 candidates for degrees. The degrees will be conferred by Dr. Elmer Ellis, president of the University of Missouri.

As a feature of the commencement exercises the Board of Curators of the University of Missouri will be hosts to the commencement party and prominent visitors at a noon luncheon on May 31st. James A. Finch, Jr., of Cape Girardeau, president of the Board, will preside. He will also announce at the commencement exercises the various gifts which have been made to the School of Mines and Metallurgy during the past year.

Another feature of the exercises will be the presentation of gold medals to the living members of the class of 1909, the medals being in recognition of their fifty years of service to the engineering profession.

Fifty-four of the graduating seniors will be commissioned as Second Lieutenants in the Reserve Corps of the United States Army.

This is the first outdoor commencement the school has held since 1950. With the large graduating classes following the war the school authorities were forced to hold outdoor graduating exercises as there were no facilities available for seating the large numbers involved and for several years the exercises were held on Jackling Field. At the commencement in 1950 a torrential rain,

starting in the midst of the program, sent faculty and students in academic costumes scurrying to Parker Hall to complete the exercises under cover.

Last year the exercises were held in the high school gymnasium which seats approximately 3,000. There was an overflow crowd and with the larger number of graduates this year on the recommendation of the Commencement Committee, under the chairmanship of Professor Leon Hershkowitz, Dean Curtis L. Wilson decided to try Jackling Field again.

Maj. Gen. E. C. Itschner Will Address Graduates

Major General Emerson Charles Itschner, Chief of Engineers, United States Army, Washington, D. C., who will deliver the commencement address at the graduation exercises at the School of Mines and Metallurgy on May 31, 1959, will be granted the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Engineering, Honoris Causa, in recognition of his outstanding ability and world wide experience in the engineering field, according to an announcement by Dean Curtis L. Wilson.

General Itschner was graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1924 and in 1926 he received a degree in Civil Engineering at Cornell University. In 1934 he came to the School of Mines and Metallurgy as Professor of Military Science and Tactics, remaining until 1936. During this period many graduates of the school were trained in advanced

military under his supervision and later played important roles in engineering military operations as a result of World War II and the Korean War.

During World War II General Itschner held many highly responsible positions. When the Air Force construction program was at its height, he was in charge of Air Force construction for the Chief of Engineers. Later, as Engineer of the Advance Section Communications Zone in Europe, he was responsible for heavy construction within the areas of the armies which entered through Northern France. The planning and initiating of the reconstruction of the Port of Cherbourg was one of his responsibilities. Another was the rehabilitation of all railroads, ports, hospitals, depots, barracks, coal mines, steel mills, and public utilities in the American sector of Northern France, Belgium, Luxembourg, and Germany, and the construction of hundreds of highway bridges in those areas. With the termination of hostilities in Europe, he was assigned as Base Commander in the Philippines.

At the conclusion of World War II, he served three years in Washington, D. C. as Chief of the Military Construction Operations Division in the Office of the Chief of Engineers. From 1949 to 1950, he was District Engineer at Seattle, Washington.

In September 1950, he was named Engineer of the First Corps and served 14 months in Korea during the period of rapid advance to the Yalu River and the

Geology Professor James C. Maxwell Chosen for IBM Training Course

Professor James C. Maxwell, Geology Department, has been chosen to attend an IBM Computer training course next month. The intensive course in the theory and operation of high-speed stored-program electronic computers is offered three times each year to properly qualified research workers. The course is presented by the Watson Scientific Computing Laboratory, operated by the International Business Machine Corporation in collaboration with Columbia University of New York. The Laboratory was founded by and named after Thomas J. Watson, Jr., President of IBM.

The Laboratory provides instruction for workers interested in applying numerical methods to problems in various fields of pure and applied science, and in the operation and design of large-scale calculating equipment. An important function of the Laboratory is to serve as a center for the exchange of information concerning mathematical and machine methods. The computing facilities of the Laboratory and special instructions are available to visiting scientists for basic research.

The course which Mr. Maxwell will attend is offered to research workers to assist them in the use of data processing equipment in the solution of their problems. The classes are divided into three consecutive parts, each of approximately one week duration. The first part deals with a simplified system for the use of an automatic calculator; the second and third include a more comprehensive treatment of the equipment of the Laboratory and more advanced aspects of programming.

Professor Maxwell will use the Laboratory's equipment to continue his research in the quantitative description of stream-eroded landforms.

Professor Maxwell was born near Boston, Massachusetts, and received his undergraduate education at Harvard. After graduation he worked for Boston University Physical Research Laboratory doing geophysical and photogeologic research in northern Alaska. He later resumed his studies with graduate work at Columbia University. While at Columbia University Mr. Maxwell was a member of the faculty as Lecturer in Geology. He joined the staff of the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy in 1956 as Assistant Professor of Geology. The experience which Professor

During the delicious dinner, the band enjoyed listening to stereophonic high fidelity records through the courtesy of Mr. Carl Hensley, Manager of Montgomery Ward, in Rolla. Bill Lynch, trombonist and toastmaster for the evening, introduced the speakers. Dr. Thomas R. Beveridge, Director of the Missouri State Geological Survey and Band Alumnus reminisced about the band as it was around 1940. Dr. Beveridge stated that although the band received their incidental fee free as payment for band participation, transportation was rather scarce. In fact, he remembers hitch-hiking to St. Louis and back for the Washington University - M S M football game. subsequent withdrawal. During the latter period he took charge of the demolition of military structures and installations in both the North and South Korean capital cities as the troops withdrew.

In April 1952, he was assigned as North Pacific Division Engineer, with headquarters in Portland, Oregon. In that post he was in charge of the civil and military programs of the corps of Engineers in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Western Montana, and Alaska.

He became Assistant Chief of Engineers for Civil Works in November 1953, with headquarters in Washington, D. C. On August 10, 1956, President Eisenhower announced the appointment of General Itschner as Chief of Engineers U. S. Army, effective October 1, 1956.

Among his decorations are the Legion of Merit with three Oak Leaf Clusters, the Bronze Star Medal, the Air Medal and the Purple Heart.

General Itschner will be accompanied to Rolla by Major General John R. Hardin, retired, who was Professor of Military Science and Tactics at the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy for the academic years 1930-1934.



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Tech Club Wins Track, Captures Intramural Trophy

With the school year slowly coming to an end, the final facet of the intramural sports program, track, was run off last week with the Tech Club cindermen coming out on top of the 20 clubs and fraternities who entered teams in the ten event meet.

Tech Club needed an impressive showing in this the final event of the year to gain the overall intramural championship. Sensing this, the Tech Club sweat suit and spiked shoe men, even though they failed to gain a first in any event, racked up seven second places, two third places, two fourth places, and one fifth place finish to wrap up the track title and the intramural title as well.

Brenning, McCrary, Henderson, Kite, Arimura, Early, Scroggins, and Spagnola accounted for the Tech Club's fine showing with their point making efforts.

Sigma Nu followed Tech Club in the meet standings largely on the shot put and discus efforts of Charles McCaw and the fine running of Jenkins and Howerly. McCaw all but put the 16 pound shot in orbit with his record breaking

heave of 43 feet and 2 inches.

Placing third was Kappa Sigma. The men of Kappa Sig gained their points on the first place heave of discus man Kemper. The other points necessary for their third place finish were garnered on the running of Welker, Oberkramer, and Brady. Kappa Sig took the 440 relay with a very respectable 46.8 clocking.

Paced by their freshmen speed merchant, Bob Elser and the second place finish of Robertson in the shot put, T.K.E. piled up enough points for the fourth place slot in meet standings. Elser was high point man of the meet with first in the 50 yard dash and the 120 low hurdles. He also anchored the Tekes third finishing relay team. Engineers Club, Kappa Alpha, Pi Kappa Alpha, Prospectors Club, Triangle, and Sigma Tau Gamma rounded out the first ten places.

Cinders Cool as Miners Hang Up Their Spikes for Another Year

The Miner cindermen broke even on dual meets with a 3-3 season and moved from last place at the conference indoor meet at Columbia to third place at the conference outdoor meet held at Rolla. The Miners' remarkable advance from last place to third came about because the Miners were hot and lucky at the outdoor meet where they placed in 13 of 15 events. Many of the team made their best effort of the season at the meet. Of the three dual meets we lost two of them by 2 points and 1 1/4 points, while SIU swamped us.

Jim Houseman scored 85 points during the eight meet season to give him an average of 10.6 points per meet which is .8 point higher than Eshbaugh's record of 98 points in a 10 meet season. Doug Irwin was close behind in second place as he scored 79.03 points, while Mike Vancil filled in third

place with a 68 point total as he captured first in the mile and two mile runs in five of the eight meets. Joe Gay was next as he scored 30 points while working with only one event, the discus. Next year Gay, who broke the school record in practice several times this year, is expected to beat the 1958 school record of 139' 8 1/2".




Don Gunther




