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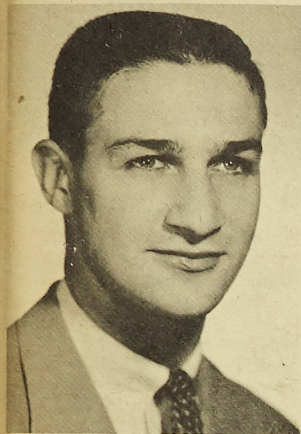
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Mike Bertorello Is May Blue Key Man-of-Month

MSM Spelunkers Help Search for Lost Boys

Last Monday morning Eric Johnson, Dave Giratos, Gary Schevers, Gary Bower, John Gebhards, Al Dunnivant, and Joel Jurgens of the MSM Spelunkers Club, searched the Muench Cave, near Newburg, for three lost youths. The boys, Dwayne Sheldon, Louis Leake and Don Money-maker, all of Newburg High School, were exploring the cave all Sunday, but when Dwayne's father came to get them at dusk, they did not show. Soon a search of the cave was organized under the leadership of Sgt. Tom Pasley, and the MSM Spelunkers were asked to help.

The cave, which is classified as "wholly unexplored," was entered by a team of spelunkers early Monday morning. Chalk arrows and other signs the boys had left for guides were found as the team progressed. Deep in the cave the Miners found the boys' names

marked on a stone. With the main cavern totally explored, the search was carried to the side caverns in the hope that the youths were there, but no boys. When the spelunkers emerged they reported the cave "thoroughly searched," but had no helpful information about the lost boys.

A report soon arrived that the boys had been seen at a nearby store late Sunday. The MSM Geology Department then asked about the possibility of the boys getting turned around and entering the wrong cave. Prof. James Maxwell, who coordinated the effort, reported that seven caves were located within walking distance of the store and that some 50 men would be needed to search these in one day.

Luckily this search was unnecessary as the boys showed up, hungry and tired, at a nearby farmer's house; they had been lost in the woods around the area.

ASCE TO HOLD ELECTION OF OFFICERS NEXT WEEK FOR THE FALL SEMESTER

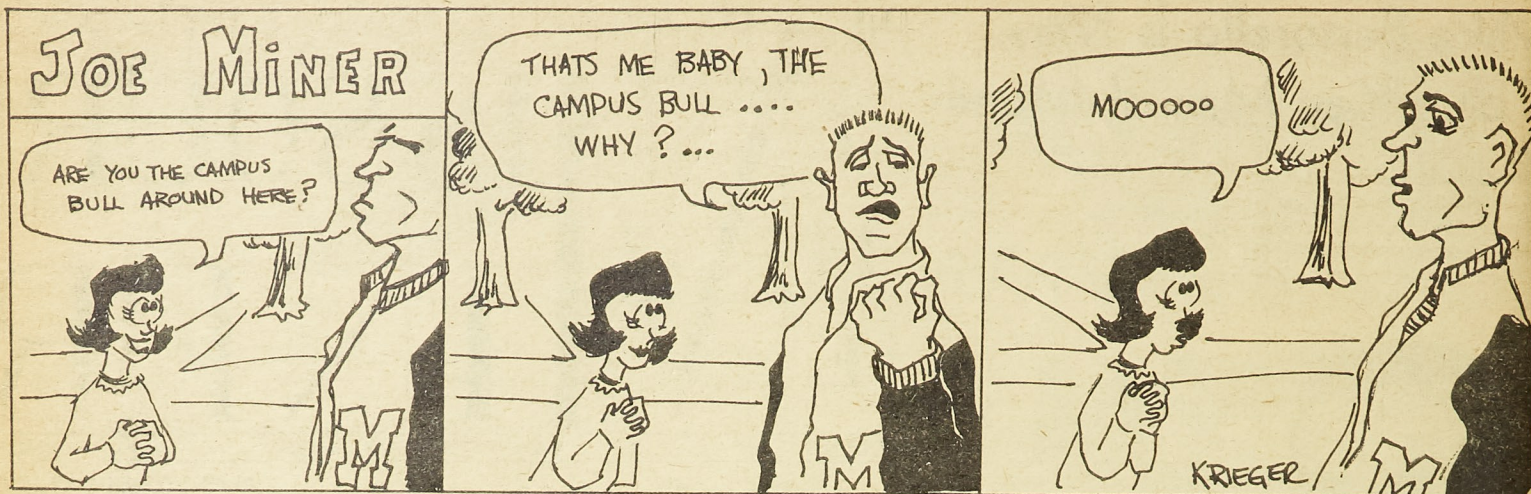

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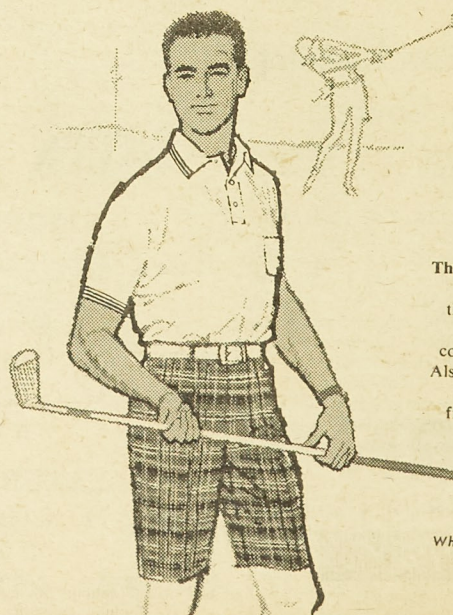
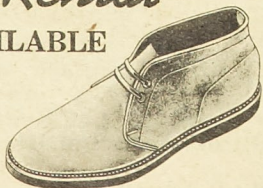
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Pershing Rifles Place Fourth in State Meet

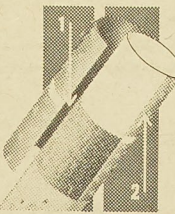

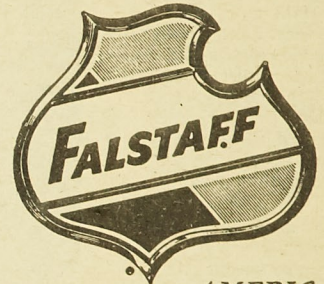
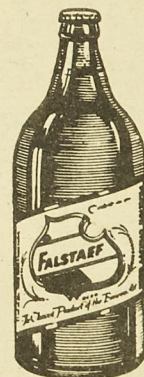

Phi Kappa Theta's final softball record is five wins and two losses. Congratulations to all the fellows who participated in the games and also those who provided our staunch cheering section.

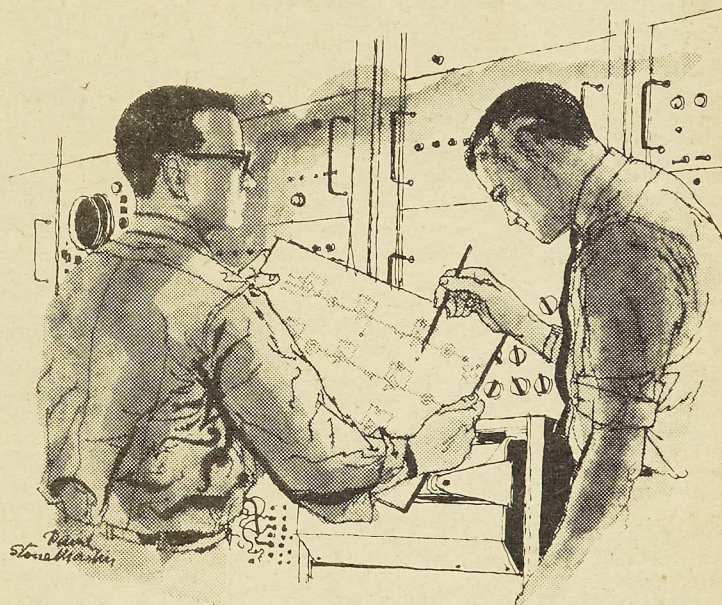

the golf enthusiasts. Don Gunther and Paul Blood took sixth place in last Saturday's intramural golf tournament.

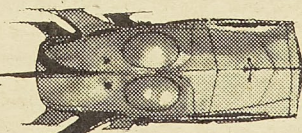

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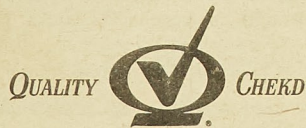

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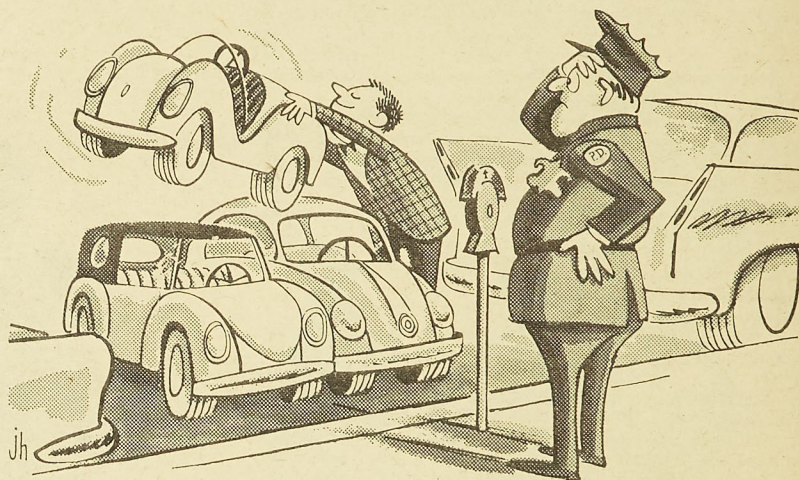
