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Fifth Annual Science Fair Held April 13th, in Jackling Gym

The fifth annual South Central Missouri Science Fair was held April 13, 1961 in Jackling Gymnasium on the campus of Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy. The Science Fair was sponsored by MSM and Rolla Daily News.

The fair displayed scientific achievement of high school students. These displays usually result from subjects studied in science classes or may be of special investigations by a student in a scientific field of his or her interest.

The aims of a Science Fair are:

1. To focus attention on science.

2. To stimulate student interest

in science while in school.

3. To offer an opportunity for display of scientific talent through exhibits and demonstrations.

4. To develop the students' ability to think scientifically.

5. To encourage further work in the field of science in our schools.

6. To encourage and inspire in our youth the desire for scientific experimentations.

7. To provide a common meeting place whose high schools of South Central Missouri can compare courses offered.

From the aims mentioned above one can see the students, teachers and parents benefit from the fair. Above all this our

country's future progress and defense depend upon scientific education.

Any high school boy or girl from the 9-12 grades may enter the Science Fair, whose school is located in the South Central Missouri region. The areas of exhibits they may enter are as follows: Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics, and Earth Sciences. The Standards for Judging is based on the 100 point system. The points possible for each are as follows: Creative ability, 30 points; Scientific thought, 30 points; thoroughness, 10 points; Skill, 10 points; Clarity, 10 points; and dramatic value, 10 points. The Science Fair featured entries of student projects in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics, and Earth Sciences. These projects are the efforts of the students beyond the normal scope of instruction in the science classroom. The entries were judged and appropriate awards made.

Engineer's Day combines with the Science Fair to bring to MSM's campus the students who are interested in engineering and science as a profession.

Students from the following

high schools participated in the Engineer's Day from Missouri: Arora High School; Bonne Terre High School; Bolivar High School; Eureka High School; Flat River Junior College; Ilmo-Scott City High School; Joplin High School; Liberal High School; LosKong High School; Morley Central High School; St. James High School; Richmond Heights High School; Normandy High School; and Harris Teachers College in St. Louis; Stoutland High School; Webb City High School; Willow Springs High School; and Windsor High School. These students visited each of the departments of instruction on the campus and viewed especially prepared displays.

Subject: Greek Weekend Chariot Race. The chariot race that will be run the Saturday afternoon of Greek Week during the Greek Day games will be conducted under the following conditions.

The Chariot

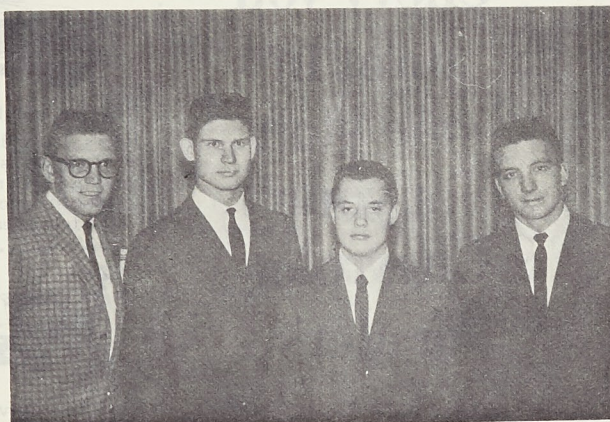
1. Two wheeled with a maximum of a 50 in. wheel base.
2. Wheels: optional size.
3. Powered by two teams of four men each pulling two abreast.
4. One rider who must remain on the chariot in a standing position during the entire race.
5. Chariot must be well marked with fraternity's name or initials.
6. Any part of the chariot considered unsafe to the rider, team or other teams will be disqualified.

The Race

1. Thee elimination heats of five chariots each will be run at the beginning of the games.
2. The five fastest chariots will compete in a championship race at the end of the games.
3. The races will be run over a course as designated and marked by the chariot committee.
4. Any interference with another chariot during any part of the race will result in a disqualification.
5. Any chariot leaving the normal course of the race will be disqualified.
6. Teams will alternate once in relay fashion.
7. The chariot must run the race in the same condition that

Miner Editorial

PRESENT HAHMS!

Within the last few days a series of events concerning the Military Department has been brought to the attention of the MINER. The object of this editorial is to clarify the situation and correct unfounded rumors.

The first occurrence was the issuance of an order by P. M. S. & T. Colonel G. R. Taylor that the basic R. O. T. C. cadets would no longer be required to salute advanced military students with the ranks of Cadet Officers. This order was met with wholehearted approval from both the basic and advanced students, for they professed the attitude that they were not as yet officers and members of the Regular Army, and therefore saw no necessity for the salute, which is the official army method of saying "Hello" with the traditional respect due to officers.

However, shortly following this order came another order from Colonel Taylor's office which countermanded the previous order and reestablished the former status quo, which deemed the salute necessary.

The MINER, in order to ascertain the reason behind the issuance and change of these orders, interviewed the main persons responsible for the confusion.

Colonel Taylor, when asked about the change in orders, stated that he had decided that the requirement for saluting should be abandoned. However, he continued, Cadet Brigadier General Lawrence L. Hoberock came to his office and requested that the orders be changed, because "... the respect for the Senior Cadets will suffer." Cadet General Hoberock told Colonel Taylor that the Senior Officers had decided that they would like the old rule to be enforced. Wishing to please his Cadet Senior Officers, Colonel Taylor naturally complied with Cadet General Hoberock's request and issued the second order.

But when the MINER talked to Cadet General Hoberock, he was reluctant to discuss the matter. When he finally did, he stated that the affair had nothing to do with him, but was the sole matter of the P. M. S. & T. and that he had nothing to do with Colonel Taylor's decision.

The MINER'S attention was drawn to this subject by the frequent disagreement and complaints that numerous Senior Officers voiced when they became aware of the change in orders.

The MINER feels that Cadet General Hoberock could have acted in a way which would have better displayed the integrity of a Senior Officer, in both his actions and his statements.

Although, as Colonel Taylor said, the semester is practically over and does not warrant another change, it would be advisable for someone in authority to hold a meeting of the Senior Officers and have them vote as to their desires.

We know that Colonel Taylor is just acting in the better interests of the cadets, and we feel that the entire situation was not a product of his.

Dr. Fuller Announces Graduate Student Help

Dr. Harold Q. Fuller, Professor of Physics and Chairman of the Department of Physics at MSM, has announced that three of the School's spring graduates have received assistantships to continue study on the graduate level. All three will receive the degree ofachelor of Science-Physics from the School on May 28th.

Leroy Henry Alt will return to MSM as a graduate assistant in the Physics Department. Alt received honorable mention from the National Science Foundation's Graduate Fellowship Program. While at MSM Alt has been a member of the Baptist Student Union, the Independent's Club, the Mathematics Club, was a student assistant in the Physics Department, received a Phi Kappa Phi award, was Vice-President of Sigma Pi Sigma, a member of Tau Beta Pi, received a Gold Key Award, was recipient of an Alumni Scholarship, and has been on the honor list since he has been at MSM.

Raymond Francis Smith, Jr.,

will continue graduate study as a research assistant in Physics at Virginia Polytechnic Institute. Smith was a transfer from Kansas City Junior College. Since his transfer to MSM, Smith has been elected Vice-President of the Mathematics Society and Treasurer of Sigma Pi Sigma. He is also a member of Tau Beta Pi and has been on the honor list since being at MSM.

Wayne LeRoy Sievers has received a graduate assistantship in Physics at Oklahoma State University. Sievers was a recipient of a General Motors Scholarship for his four years at MSM. He also received a Phi Kappa Phi award and was a member of Sigma Pi Sigma, Gamma Delta, the Independents Club, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers and the American Rocket Society. He was frequently on the honor list.

All three assistantships are for one year beginning in September 1961, however all may be renewed with satisfactory service.

Immediately following the initiation, a banquet was held at the Houston House in honor of the new members. Vice-President

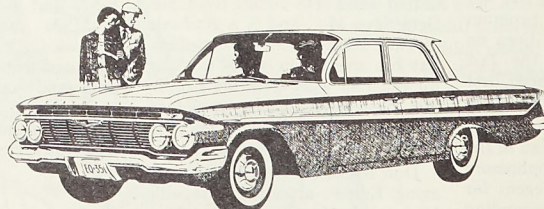
Larry Hoberock served as toast master for the occasion and also presented a gold key to John Dore for submitting the best wooden key.

The Missouri Tau Lambda Chapter of Pi Tau Sigma is justifiably proud of its new members and welcomes them to the fraternity.

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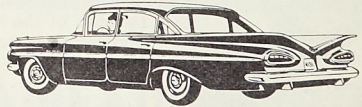

worth noting that all work of construction of exhibits must be done by the exhibitor. Teachers may aid only through supervision.

The awards were given out Thursday afternoon. The two grand prize winners will be sent, with round trip expenses paid, to the National Science Fair that will be held May 10-14, 1961, in Kansas City, Missouri. These winners must comply with the rules and regulations of the national Science Fair, that are as follow:

1. Individually made exhibits only may be entered in the 12th National Science Fair.
2. Students must be in the 10th thru 12th grades of a secondary school or equivalent.
3. Maximum width of the exhibit should not exceed 48 inches, and the front to back measurements should not exceed 30 inches.
4. Exhibits containing animals must conform with "Regulations for Experiments with Animals."


Also a Scholarship is awarded by the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy. A student desiring to compete must be a senior in high school, be interested in attending MSM, excel in scholarship and be in need financially.

A very Special Congratulation go to the following for their achievement in science. First Grand Prize going to Michael Tilland Johnson of Lebanon High School. Mr. Johnson being a 17 year old senior was awarded the Cup on his exhibit titled, Experimental Linear Acceleration, in the field of Physics. Mr. Johnson stated he had spent about 300 hours on the exhibit. Second Prize winner goes to George Arthur Kastler, also a seventeen year old senior at Lebanon High School. The title of his exhibit was "A Survey County, Missouri, in the field of earth sciences. The Scholarship winner was James Lee Felty, a seventeen year old senior of West Plains High School. His exhibit was titled "Experimental Determination of Plancks Constant" in the field of Physics. The winner of classes were as follow: Biology, first place to Judy Davis of Lebanon on Space Food, second place to James Price of Houston intitled "Galvanotropism"; Physics, first place went to James Lee

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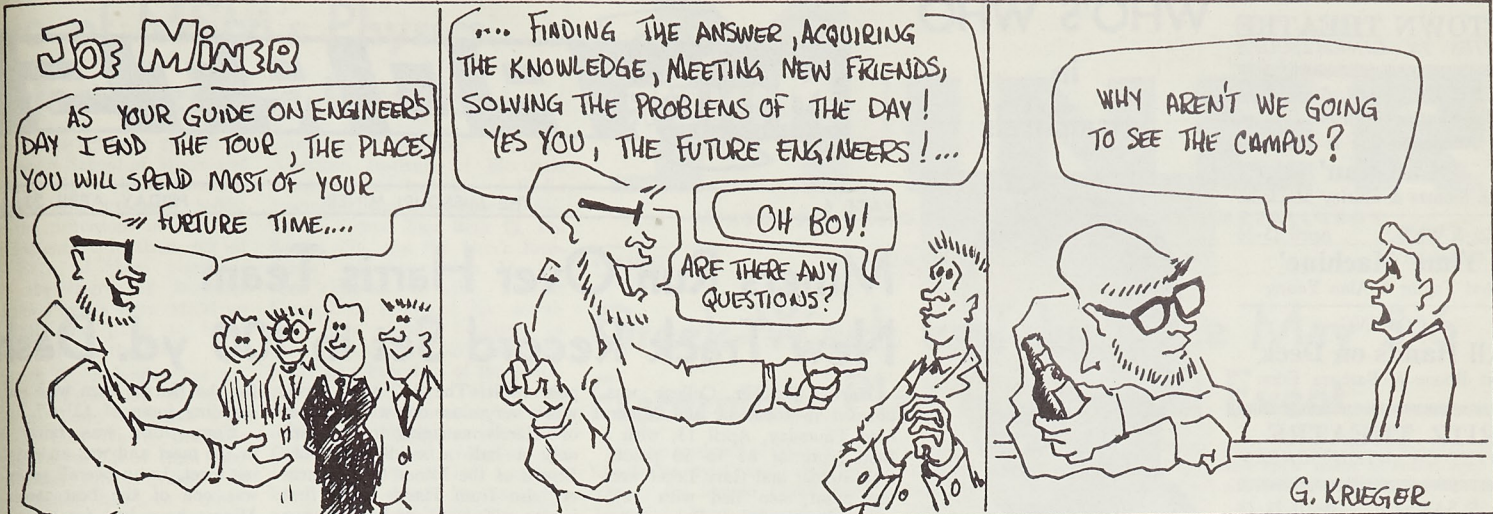

Les Brown's band is known all over the world through his years with Bob Hope on Radio and TV, his recordings on Decca, Columbia, Coral and Capitol, and his personal appearance tours as well as his tours before armed forces units in Europe, Japan, Alaska, Korea and many other far countries.

Les is a graduate of Ithaca Conservatory of Music, New York Military Academy, and Duke University. He was somewhat of a child prodigy. At the age of twelve he was playing the Rudy Wiedoft solos that were a part of every saxophonist's repertoire of that era. At sixteen he was featured soloist with Conway's concert band.

At Duke University Les played tenor sax with the Duke Blue Devils, his first two years at school. He became leader of this band his junior year, which under his leadership became one of the best college bands ever known. In 1936 Les took the Blue Devil Band to Budd Lake, New Jersey, for the summer. Through this engagement the band recorded for Decca and made world transcriptions. After a year of travel, the band disbanded.

Les headed for New York, and as well as playing dates as a sideman, turned to arranging. He did both stock arrangements for publishers and "specials" for such leaders as Isham Jones, Red Nichols, Ruby Newman, and Jimmy Dorsey. In 1940 Les organized the "Band of Renown", which has moved steadily forward to number one. Les early adopted the policy of surrounding himself with the best possible sideman, and paying the best possible salaries to keep these men together. This policy has paid off in a cohesive playing unit. There has been far less turnover in the personnel than is common in most such organizations.

The name Les Brown has become a symbol of good, danceable music throughout the continent. Time Magazine recently quoted him as saying: "We prefer sound to noise, we prefer the beat over effects, we prefer consonance to dissonance, and we like the melody if it's good." This seems to have been the formula of success of the Band of Renown and its personable leader, Les Brown.

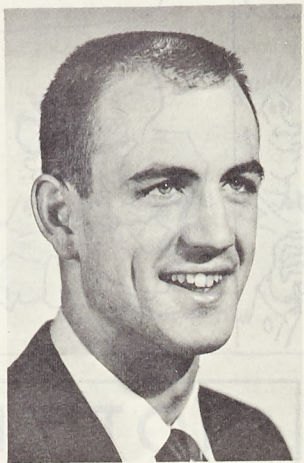

Miners Run Over Harris Team
New Track Record Set in 100 yd. Dash

Harris Teacher College was downed in track by the Miners here Thursday, April 13, with a final score of 81 to 50 points. Bob Steiner and Gary Leger were top point men tied with 11½ points for the meet. Bob Steiner won first in the mile with a time of 4:41.1 and first in the 880 yard dash with a time of 2:07.2. Gary Leger won first in the low hurdles with a time of 0:26.7 and first in high hurdles in 16.4 seconds. The Miner teams placed first in all but four events. The 2-mile run was an outstanding one this meet. It was one of the best runs in this event for more than two years. Les Sheets won this event with a time of 10:33.3. Vyto Jusonis won first in the shot put with a distance of 42 feet followed up by Terry Wargo and Joe Gay who placed second and third for the Miners. In the high jump, Jay Alford and Collier from Harris tied for first with 6'00". The discus was won by the Miners by Joe Gay with a distance of 129' 10". Dennis Heeger jumped 21' 2.5" to win first in the broad jump for the Miners.

Ted Plaska threw the javelin 153' 6" to win another first for the Miner team.

Harris won first places in the 440 yard dash, the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard dash, and the

pole vault. The 440 yard dash, was a very close one with Hopper of Harris managing to win with only a half a stride over Lee Brown of the Miner team. Turner, also from Harris, won first in the 100 yard dash, setting a new track record of 9.9 seconds. Turner also won the 220 for Harris in a time of 0:22.5 seconds. Jackson of Harris won second in both of these events. Collier won a first in the pole vault

for the Harris team with an outstanding jump of 12' 6".

Competition was fairly keen in the meet and was an outstanding meet. In an overall sense, this was one of the best meets the Miners have had for some time. Harris was weaker in field events this being where the Miners gained a considerable number of points over the Harris team. The Miners now have a one and one record so far this season.
