Complex Kissing Catches Cash In Continued Coed Inquiry

The University of Missouri at Rolla has just announced the approval of a recent research proposal submitted by the NLRPF (National Ludicrous Research Projects Foundation). The foundation has agreed to grant UMR a sum of \$40,000 for another two year continuation of the popular multi-departmental project, *Dynamics of Lipstick Distribution*. Dr. Smooch, M.E. Department, and presently unselected representatives from the Chem. Eng. and Social Studies Departments will head the investigations. Research assistants, as in the past, will be selected from the expected grad and undergrad Miner volunteers.

This project to date has provoked more observation, research, and experimentation than any other attempted by these departments. Miners have spent countless hours in attempting to determine the laws governing the distribution of lipstick and its resulting effects on the basic metabolism of the body.

Two observations were readily made by the participants in the laboratory research:

1. When two surfaces meet, one of which is coated with lipstick, a certain distribution of the substance takes place.

2. The amount of lipstick distributed is directly related to such

features as pressure, number of applications, areas of transmitter and receiver, temperature, length of contact, light intensity, passion, and last, but not least, the pucker factor (similar to a slide rule fudge factor).

Continued experimentation conducted in parked cars during party weekends, at the athletic field and other secluded places which the faculty know nothing

about, has indicated that pressure is one of the most important variables. Reports show that distribution is a direct function of the pressure. It was found that, when pressure increased, lipstick flow increases up to a maximum. At the maximum pressure, a state of equilibrium exists between the two surfaces.

There is an inverse proportion. (Continued on Page 3)

Last month, two members of the UMR staff received their I-A draft classification. The two recipients of this honor were Drs. Boil Maker and U. R. Sawfit. Just last week, they both received orders to report to Fort Wood for their physicals.

It seems there was some confusion about registration requirements, and they did not have the required fifteen or more credit hours to obtain a 2-S deferment. It was too late when the administration realized its mistake because the six weeks to drop or add a course have passed.

The ever alert Rolla draft board made note of this fact. Due to their raised quota they needed men and these two were called to serve their country.

Both Dr. Maker and Dr. Sawfit attempted to appeal their case to General Nestle, but they did so in vain. The chief of the selective service said he must adhere strictly to the rules set up by the commission. His only comment was that they should have taken Reserve Officers Training.

Yesterday, draftees Maker and Sawfit reported to Fort Leonard Wood for their physicals and aptitude tests. They passed both but were told they were deficient in mechanical knowledge. They are to report in May for their basic training.

This increase is due to the unexpected cost of the modern facilities provided for all residents of the hall, at no extra cost, and the lack of tenants living there this year. The room and board for an academic year will be \$1369.00 as opposed to the \$1050.00 for this past year. This price increase is expected to take effect immediately.

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UMR Student Union Addition Now Ready for Use by Miners

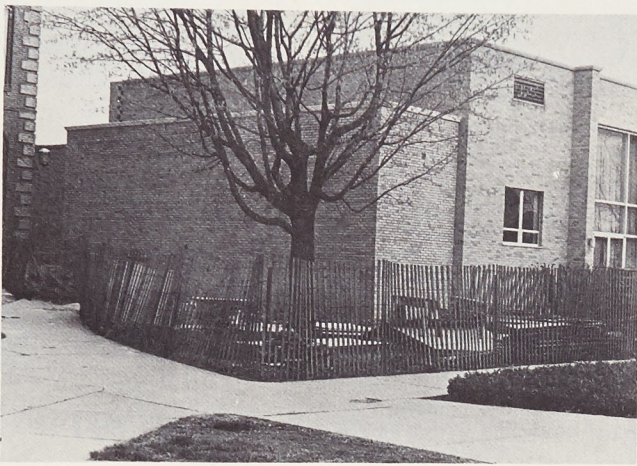
Construction has recently been completed on the much needed Student Union addition. Adjacent to the west wall of the original Student Union building, the new section was constructed under the three million dollar UMR contract with the Herman T. Crackzer Construction Co. The elaborate design and ornate beauty of the structure are beyond words — it is certain.

The sprawling new addition promises to open new vistas in Student Union activities . . . as soon as someone finds a way to get into it. In an interview with Mr. Bill Crackzer, Program Director, and Mrs. Berninda Smarvey, Assistant Program Director, Mrs. Smarvey reasoned correctly that if we tore down the original Student Union Building we would have a big, big, doorway! And as soon as he composed himself again, Mr. Crackzer had several suggestions for solving this problem. One was to tunnel through the floors of all the buildings on campus and install trap doors??? Another suggestion was to tear it down, ship it to St. Louis and ask Mayor Cervantes if he'd like to buy another Spanish Pavilion. ality between lipstick distribution and the light intensity. As light becomes brighter, less and less lipstick is distributed. The amount dispensed in total darkness, all other variables remaining nearly constant, approaches infinity.

It is obvious that the area of the transmitter and the receiver will directly affect this distribution by limiting the amount transferred. Surface conditions also affect the transference of lipstick, as there is a greater distribution when the two surfaces possess good absorption.

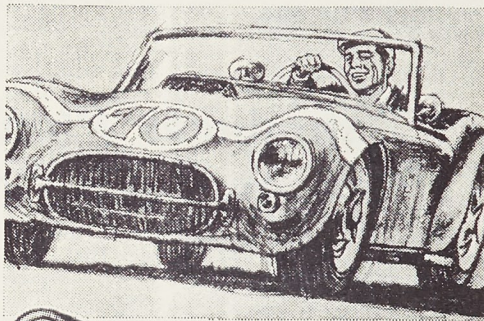
Temperature, passion, and time of each application are all closely related variables, each of which has a direct effect on distribution. Experiments proved that passion increased as the temperature increased. Temperature increased as direct result of the number of applications and the increase in the length of each application.

Securing the necessary data for the use in the equations requires that tests be conducted under various conditions. As a general rule, college women are most

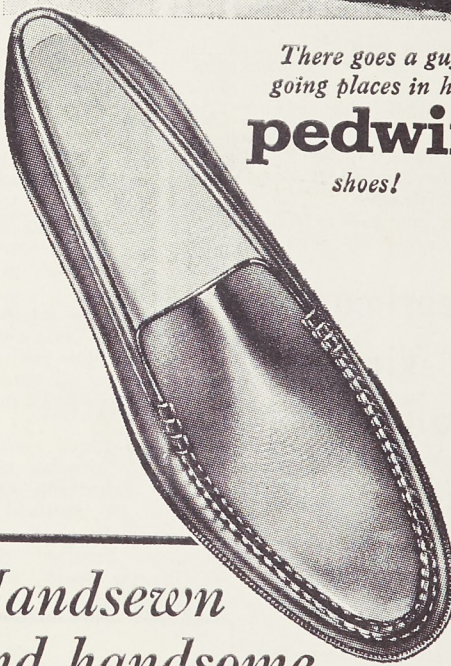
eager to aid as laboratory assistants in running the tests. However, care must be exercised to insure that passion does not disturb the experimental conditions, and women are notoriously known for upsetting the scientific data with this device.

Besides the women, (who make up the second of two willing surfaces) the only other experimental apparatus necessary is the lipstick and a standard 200-mesh rich linen handkerchief with notes as to temperature, pressure, light intensity, etc. As many as 150-200 determinations may be run in the course of an evening under normal operating conditions. If the signs of passion are very strong, the procedure has been to disregard the results of the test, but to continue the experiment until all signs of passion are dissipated.

Experimentation and research on this project will resume immediately upon receipt of funds and appointment of research assistants. The school has promised to keep the *Minor* staff informed of results, and we'll let you know how the researchers are making out.

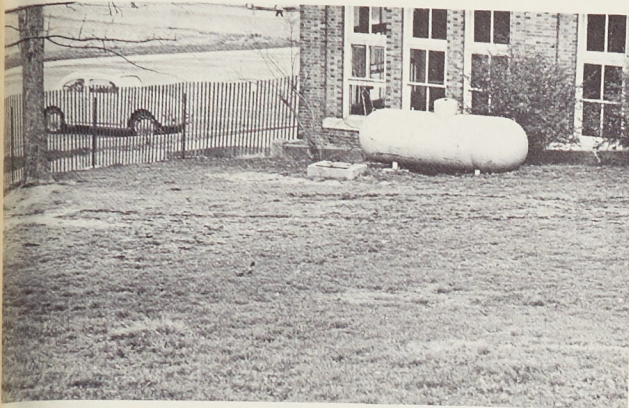

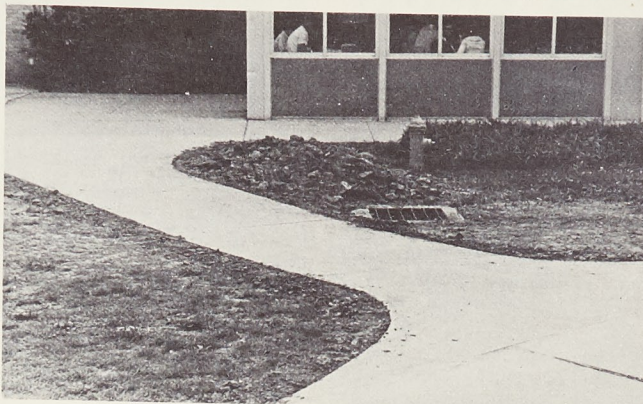

Chancellor Breaker Announces New Breakthrough in Grading

ROLLA, Missouri, April 1 (UBO) — A major breakthrough in the deadlocked grading dispute was announced today by Dr. Maker Breaker, in hopes that the long standing conflict will be settled peaceably. He said that he would ask the Campus Commission to vote Friday on the proposal.

An 'undercover' news reporter said that Breaker made his proposal only after "intense behind the scenes consultations" with his highly competent staff members, his wife, and his teddy bear.

The proposal, as outlined by Dr. Breaker, would allow students to grade their instructors and submit their recommendations to the Condition Commission, to either make or break the particular instructor on a semester basis. In the opinion of Dr. Breaker, "Since the students are in daily contact with their instructor, it is they who should be able to give us an unbiased report of the instructors' progress. After all, since we (UMR) are merely a stepping stone for the instructors toward a DECENT job, it seems only fair that we give them all the help we possibly can."

Dr. Breaker went on to give us some of the specific details of the proposed program, "the student would be expected to give weekly (or daily — would you believe bi-daily) short quizzes on simple material not found in the required textbooks. These short quizzes should be rather simple in nature so that they may be worked in at best, a half an hour . . . after the allotted ten minutes, they should be picked up (with a sly smirk) and graded — by school standards:

99-96%	A
95-95%	B
89-86%	C
85-80%	D
79-??%	F

When we asked about hourly exams for the instructors, Dr. Breaker replied, "I see no need for hourly examinations, pop quizzes should be a fair enough basis for grading. Of course, the usual 10-60% of the grade should be determined by personal opinion and number of absences. I wouldn't expect the instructors to be graded any harder than we grade the students, ha! ha! The instructors should be allowed a reasonable number of absences — 3, for when could a situation possibly arise when an instructor should miss a class? The only permissible excuse would be if he were working on a research project — undoubtedly more important than teaching."

"All of the students would be expected to co-operate in this affair," Dr. Breaker expounded, "This plan cannot hope to succeed without the co-ordinated efforts of all of the students in each and every class. Each student should submit his grade to a pre-appointed student 'recorder' who would then average the submitted grades and take them to the Condition Commission." "The grades," Breaker added, "should

then be posted, say, two or three weeks later — in keeping with faculty policy — so the instructor is kept guessing as long as possible."

"Of course," says Dr. Breaker, "Professors should be graded harder than measly instructors, as Doctors should be graded MUCH harder than Professors. For just as in our dealing with graduates and under-graduates, as they progress along the slimy road of education, instructors should have greater devotion to their work and be expected to give their all (and then some) to their chosen field of endeavor."

When asked if he thought any of the students would become rebellious and attempt to 'take out their hostilities' on the instructor by grading them unfairly, Dr. Breaker replied, "Why don't be ridiculous, why would there be any ill feelings — all we ask is that the students use the same high standards and fair practices as used by my staff and associates in THEIR grading!"

The proposal will be voted on Friday by the Campus Condition Commission.

Faculty Votes for Varsity Gross-Out Squad

The University of Missouri at Rolla will continue its reputation as one of the most unique campuses across the country with the addition of a new varsity sport next fall. The Varsity Gross-out Squad will embark on the first season of its kind anywhere. Juan Bickers will direct the new team in its premiere year.

UMR's Faculty Athletic Committee voted unanimously to establish the sport after a multitude of favorable comments were received on performances at this year's basketball games. Informal groups of students often gathered to gross-out players, cheerleaders, or spectators, and several half-time intermissions were enlightened with their talents.

Several gross-out leaders were approached with the idea of forming these talents and skills into a school-supported unit, and the organization of the sport has initiated from these contacts. Students interested in trying out for the squad should contact Coach Bick-

Details on the season forthcoming this fall are as yet incomplete. The Athletic Department is presently scheduling other schools for competition and it is expected that the season will consist of at least 19 meets. Travel will be international since there are a limited number of gross-outs in the United States. Trips are already scheduled for visits to Kiev, New Delhi, Phan Rang, and the LBJ Ranch.

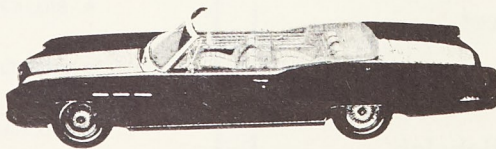
