1970 St. Pat's Celebration Ends

Float From Phi Kappa Theta Takes Top Honors Saturday

The St. Pat's parade was held in downtown Rolla, on Saturday morning March 14. The theme of the parade was "The Last 100 Years," celebrating UMR's centennial.

A total of 10 floats were entered, with Phi Kappa Theta carrying away the honors for their depiction of a rotating birthday cake, according to the theme "Happy Centennial-UMR." Beta Sigma Psi was second with "Engineering Dream," and "Dawn of a New Era," by Pi Kappa Alpha was third. Kappa Sigma was presented with a special originality trophy for their float entitled "UMR Time Machine." Another special award, for workmanship, was given to the

Prospectors Club for "A Proud Heritage."

Also entering floats into the parade were Sigma Pi, which was in charge of building the queen's float, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Tau Kappa Epsilon, Delta Sigma Phi, and MRHA. The parade also contained various musical and equestrian units, and dignitaries.

Last Friday night, the St. Pat's Cornation took place at the Multi-Purpose Building. The cornation which is the social highlight of the St. Pat's celebration provided a pleasurable evening for the large crowd of faculty and students.

The ceremony started off with the introduction of the special guests that were in attendance. Some of the special guests were Chancellor and Mrs. Baker, Jim Murphy, alumni president, and his wife, Miss Anita McLoughlin, retiring St. Pat's Queen, and all of the men that were

made honorary knights that evening.

After all the special guests were seated the queen candidates were escorted to the throne by members of the St. Pat's Board. The five girls that were elected to be in St. Pat's Court were then announced. The four special maids were Carolyn Breedlove, representing Sigma Nu, Annette Watson, from Kappa Alpha, Debra Lief, from Alpha Epsilon Pi, and Kathy Dunphy, representing Lambda Chi Alpha.

Miss Mary Beth Ruggeri, representing Pi Kappa Alpha, was

then announced as the 1970 St. Pat's Queen of Love and Beauty.

After the queen was placed in her throne St. Pat began to knight the six men the St. Pat's Board felt deserved special recognition for the work

they had done for UMR.

The honorary knights for 1970 were Raymond O. Laster, past president of UMR's alumni association, Colonel Ed Ousley, executive vice president of the Rolla Area Chamber of Commerce; Karl Moulder, UMR professor and past St. Pat's Board advisor; William Kratzner, director of the UMR Student Union; Gale Bullman, UMR professor of physical education; and also F. Stillman Elferd.

When the six candidates for knighthood were duly knighted, St. Pat left his throne and went among the students and guests incognito until the parade Saturday.

After the coronation ball was over, the Fabulous Flippers played at the dance. In addition to the band, there was a "light show" put on by a group from Kansas.

A large crowd danced to the music played by the hardrock band. The Flippers played songs that they had written themselves, and also many of the

Sing Out Missouri Concert To Be Presented At UMR

Sing Out Missouri will present their first 1970 concert at UMR's new Multi-Purpose Building at 8 p.m. Saturday, March 21.

Young people from 19 Sing-Out casts from all over the state make up the group which includes a chorus of 210 and an accompanying 40-piece band.

The Rolla concert will be one of two performances this year, with the other to be in August, at the Missouri State Fair at Sedalia.

Sing-Out Missouri is a part of the national and international Sing-Out movement. Members are high school and college students who stress, through music, the positive approach to problems of the day and

getting people involved. All Sing-Out casts are governed by the young people themselves and all musical arrangements, choreography direction, staging, handling of publicity and finance are handled by the young cast members. The director for the 1970 show is Edward C. Weldon, a senior at Normandy High School.

Local Sing-Out groups have been practicing for the statewide show for several months and state-rehearsal was held in St. Louis in January.

The cast of 250 plus a 35-member stage crew will have a busy day in Rolla before the concert. They will be guests of UMR for coffee and doughnuts and a morning tour of the campus before rehearsing all afternoon. The evening meal will be served by Rolla churches.

Paul Winter Consort To Perform In Student Union Ballroom Tomorrow

The Winter Consort is an exciting group of young musicians who are developing an original idiom of music, a unique synthesis of symphonic orchestration, folk music, and improvisation. And they'll be here in the Student Union Ballroom, Thursday, March 19 at 8:00 p.m.

The seven-piece Consort, which includes alto saxophone, cello, English horn, alto flute, classical and 12-string guitar, bass and a battery of folk percussion instruments, is an ensemble which blends to create a distinctive, rich sonority.

The music of the Consort draws from the whole scope of musical experience of Paul Winter and his musicians; years

of symphonic playing, the jazz experience of Winter's first Sextet, and exposure to the folk music of 26 countries in which

Winter has toured (with particular influence from Brazil, Israel, Africa and Bulgaria).

NASA Scientist-Astronaut Anthony Wayne England To Speak At UMR On Friday

This coming Friday, March 20, NASA astronaut Anthony Wayne England will be on the UMR campus. Mr. England will speak before two groups on this date.

At 3:30, he will appear at a seminar in the auditorium of mechanical engineering building. The topic of the seminar is "The Mission of Apollo 13." It is open to UMR students and faculty, and is sponsored by the student branch of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics and Sigma Gamma Epsilon.

At 8:00 that evening, Mr. England will give a lecture in the Student Union ballroom. The lecture will concern "The Future of Manned Spaceflight." This part of his visit to UMR

is sponsored by the Student Union Board, and is open to the general public.

Mr. England is married and has one daughter. He received a Bachelor and Master of Science degrees in geology and physics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and is currently a doctoral candidate there.

Mr. England was selected as a scientist-astronaut by NASA in August 1967. He has since

The group is modeled after the Renaissance Consort, one of the earliest instrumental ensembles. The name "Consort" meant a "family" of instruments, and the ideal of the Renaissance Consort was to achieve a homogeneous blend among the instruments. Only the warm, human-sounding woodwinds, strings, and percussion were used. The Winter group is a Contemporary Consort, using instruments of today, making music for our times.

The repertoire of the Consort is divided between original music and adaptations -- interpretations of an unlimited range of material: Bach, Gregorian chant, Ives, Gesualdo, Pete Seeger, Bartok, John Dowland, Bob Dylan, Lennon-McCartney, Purcell, Joni Mitchell, and ethnic things from many cultures.

Everyone in the Consort im-

provises. "We try to keep a balance between the written and the improvised," Winter explains. "We are involved in the whole spectrum of music: from the most highly-ordered to the completely spontaneous."

It would be difficult to label the Consort's music, and they feel it isn't necessary. They refer to the comment made by Louis Armstrong when he

was asked whether his music was folk music: "Man, all music is folk music. Did you ever hear a horse sing a song?"

Wrestlers Fifth In MIAA; UMR Plagued By Injuries

The Miner's wrestling team was on the road for the last time this season at Kirksville for the MIAA conference meet. Coach Keeton and the matmen were pitted against the teams of Central Missouri, Northeast Missouri State, Northwest Missouri State, Southeast Missouri State and Southwest Missouri State. The Miners were again plagued by injuries.

At 118 lbs. David Zale of the Miners lost to SEMO's Hunt by points. Next came another disappointment to the Miners as Les Robertson lost to Central's Matson, again by a decision. Wrestling 134 lbs., Len Thompson lost to Smith of Southwest by a score of 6-2.

Starting at 142 lbs. for UMR, Mike Richardson got a bye for his first match. On his match against Stallings he lost. But then in the losers bracket Mike finished strong by a win against Central and another against Southeast to take third place.

John Mathes at 150 lbs. was beaten by Northeast's James. At 158 lbs. two old "friends" were again face to face, Myers and Frimel. There was one difference in this meeting, however, it was Frimel who won. But Jack deserves credit for going out and wrestling with his side injured.

Jim Stewart got off to a good start by beating his opponent 6-1. Only to then have to wrestle Brian O'Brien who was the eventual winner at that weight class. Stewart put up a great fight but was eventually beaten. At 177 "Spider" Bob Morrison, wrestling with a broken hand, was defeated by Central 6-1. Kevin West wrestling 190 wrestled a good match but he lost it on points.

Finally, at heavy weight, there was the match between Gary McAlpin and Williams, after an overtime period Gary got the decision. It was between him and Beard of Northeast. Beard won it on points with Gary finishing second in the

tournament.

"This showing is not really representative of the UMR team. A team that was just formed, lacking sometimes in knowledge or strength, but never in determination. Morrison wrestling with his broken hand; Myers with his bad side; Anderson with his bad ear; Gregory and his dislocated toe; guys that even though they may be hurting keep going out there. Maybe they'll win, maybe lose, but always out there and ready for more. That's what makes this team good, a spirit that all of them have. I think the 5-3-1 record they compiled attests to that," said fellow wrestler Rick Pankau.

"Coach Keeton, guys, it's been a pleasure, painful at times, working with you. Congratulations and see you all next year," continued Pankau.

Inexperience Hurts UMR As Blacks, Golds Falter At K.U.

The UMR ruggerers were on the road again as they emigrated to Lawrence, Kansas March 7. The Kansas University Jayhawkers pulled clouds over the Rolla Black's eyes on an otherwise sunny day. Rolla commenced to play the defensive type game it had played on the New Orleans Tournament. KU had an aggressive and strong-running team that scored two tries (touchdowns), made a point after, and split the uprights on a penalty kick to beat the Blacks 11 to 0.

The crowd of several hundred stayed on the sidelines to watch KY's second team deal devastation to the Rolla Golds. Seventy per cent of the Golds had never played in or seen a game before. The only score

for UMR came in the last half of this second game when forward Paul Siebert (who played both games) converted a penalty kick for three points.

Good performances were turned in by forwards Bill Luth and Rip Ripley (who played both games). Now that varsity and intramural wrestling are concluded the ruggerers should be bolstered by several new men and the return of Jack Myers.

The team missed the presence of Mick Burke and Matt Rupp. The weekend was not a total loss; even though the Blacks lost their first game this year in regular play, both teams gained valuable experience.

The ruggerers are beginning to dig their cleats into solid turf for the rest of the season and will seek revenge when KU comes to Rolla to play two games on April 4.
