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750 To Receive Diplomas In 100th Commencement

More than 750 candidates will receive degrees at University of Missouri-Rolla commencement exercises Sunday, May 13, at 2 p.m. at the UMR Multi-Purpose Building.

Dr. James C. Olson, chancellor of the University of Missouri-Kansas City, will deliver the commencement address.

N. T. Veatch, recently retired as managing partner of Black & Veatch, Consulting Engineers, Kansas City, will be awarded the Doctor of Engineering degree—Honoris Causa.

In 1915 N. T. Veatch joined E. B. Black to form the firm of Black & Veatch, Consulting Engineers. Veatch's service, with consequent management responsibilities, has been continuous since that time.

The firm's outstanding accomplishments in the municipal and private utilities field reflect Veatch's personal interest in this important phase of the firm's activities. Under his guidance and direction, the firm has an impressive background of experience in design of central station power

generation, transmission and distribution facilities. In the field of water supply and water pollution control, the firm numbers among its clients many of the larger cities of the United States. Veatch is a registered professional engineer in 24 states.

Veatch received his B. S. degree from the University of Kansas in 1909 and was given the professional title Civil Engineer by that university in 1924. He is a member of five honorary societies and 16 professional and technical societies. He has served on the board of

directors or as a director of 11 business and civic organizations and has been on the board of trustees of the Kansas University Endowment Association since 1958. He is a member emeritus of the board of trustees of the University of Missouri-Kansas City.

In addition to several honors from several professional societies, Veatch received the University of Missouri Honor Award for Distinguished Service in Engineering in 1966.

Professional degrees will also be awarded to 11 distinguished engineers at the UMR Spring Commencement.

Eventful Greek Week Ends With Sunny Day At Races

This past weekend marked the end of another very successful Greek Week here at UMR. Thursday evening the annual IFC Banquet was held and the IFC's selection for Man of the Year was announced. Of the six candidates who were all quite deserving of the honor, Steve Robertson of Phi Kappa Theta was chosen. The runners-up were John Schucart of Kappa Sigma, Dave Barczewski of Pi Kappa Alpha, Steve Bergholdt of TKE, Buddy Bruns of Phi Kap, and Gary Pariani of Kappa Sigma.

On Friday the IFC held interviews for all of the Queen candidates selected by the houses. Of these 19 women, Joyce Kremer representing Delta Sigma Phi was chosen to reign as Queen of Greek Week 1973. Her court consisted of Pam Dorste - Kappa Alpha, Kendra Harris - Sigma Phi Epsilon, Kathy Niederstadt - Phi Kappa Theta, and Jeanne Norton - Sigma Tau Gamma.

Friday evening the Carnival was held at Lion's Club Park. Nineteen fraternities and one sorority participated in this event with all proceeds going to the Rolla Cerebral Palsy School. Of those involved, TKE was honored with the first place trophy for their booth decorations with Lambda Chi Alpha coming in second. Tau Kappa Epsilon booth collected the most money with Lambda Chi coming in a close second. John Hixson, the man behind the carnival, estimated that \$1200 will be donated to the School and he considered the event successful and enjoyable for all.

The incomparable Greek Games were held Saturday afternoon under beautiful weather at the Elysian Fields. The games began in early afternoon with the famed Chariot Race which was won for the second year in a row by Kappa Sigma. Kappa Alpha placed second in the event. The results for the rest of the Games were as follows: Keg Toss - 1) Acacia, 2) Sig Tau, 3) Theta Xi; Six Pack Relay - 1) Pi KA, 2) TKE, 3) Lambda Chi; Rat Race - 1) Beta Sig, 2) KA, 3) Sig Tau; Balloon

Bust - Kappa Sig, Beta Sig, and Delta Sig tied for first; Tug of War - 1) Sig Nu, 2) TKE, 3) Sig Tau; Limbo - 1) KA, 2) Sig Ep, 3) Lambda Chi.

In the final results of the games, Kappa Sigma and Kappa Alpha finished in a first place tie with 12 points apiece. The results for the Overall Greek Week title found TKE to be the winner followed closely by Lambda Chi, Kappa Alpha, and Kappa Sigma.

Rick Sauerwein should be commended for his fine efforts in conducting the Games and all members of the Greek system here at UMR are to be commended for their participation in Greek Week 1973.

Early Appropriation Bolsters Financial Aid

Early passage by Congress yesterday of a bill to fund student financial aid programs provides the first assurance to college students that federal financial aid will be available next year, according to Allan W. Purdy, University of Missouri director of student financial aid services.

"By getting this action before Congress goes home for Easter vacation," Purdy said, "it speeds up by four to six weeks the time campuses will know the amount available to their students for next year."

With the uncertainty of some federally funded programs, Purdy said that students now have some reassurance that financial aid programs will be fairly well funded next year and that those who received help this year may expect at least some help next year.


The Nixon Administration had requested a similar total of \$872 million but wanted \$622 million for the new BOGs, \$250 million for the work-study program and no new funds for SOGs or the NDSL program.

Purdy said that although the level of funding for the existing financial aid programs has remained the same, the amount campuses across the nation receive will be down slightly because there are more participating schools today than last year. He added that it is too early to predict precisely how much the University of Missouri will receive.

According to Purdy, how soon individual schools will be able to notify students whether they will receive financial aid will be up to individual campuses.

Jack Phillips Selected Miner Of The Month



Zeta Tau Alpha Readies For Formal Installation

Joyce McClelland, field secretary for Zeta Tau Alpha international fraternity for women, will visit the Eta Theta chapter of Zeta Tau Alpha at the University of Missouri at Rolla from May 1-8, 1973. She will assist the chapter in preparations for the installation activities connected with the chapter receiving its charter and becoming an active chapter of the fraternity.

Founded in 1898 at Longwood College, Farmville, Virginia, Zeta Tau Alpha was the first woman's fraternity to be chartered in the state of Virginia and the only one ever to be granted a charter by a special act of the legislature.

This year, as ZTA celebrates its Diamond Anniversary, there are Zeta chapters and colonies active on 127 college and university campuses in the U.S. and Canada. There are approximately 250 ZTA alumnae groups, and total membership of the fraternity is 65,000.

The scholarship is a result of Tau Beta Pi's "Freshman Friends" coupon drive.



Tau Beta Pi is a national engineering honor society.

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




Quad: Before And After


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THANK YOU

And in a great final scene, as the entire cast joins arms, Dick steps forward to sing that famous Allan Jones' hit, "Donkey Serenade."



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
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Proposed Student Activity Budgets

The UMR baseballers played a double header Saturday against Central Missouri State and a doubleheader Monday against Washington University. The Miners came out on the poor end, as they lost three of the four games.

In the Warrensvurg games the Miners won the first game 7-5 in eight innings. Mark Smith started things in the eighth with a base hit and advanced to third on a base hit by Steve Holcomb. Bobby Ajhar then scored him on a pinch hit. Dave Walling

followed with a triple, as Holcomb scored, and Ajhar apparently scored. But he missed third base and was called for the final out of the inning. John Peters retired the side in the bottom of the eighth to save the win for Terry Douglas.

The Miners appeared to have the second game won early as they scored six runs in the first and one run in the second to jump to 7-0 advantage. But CMS bombed Mike Burrell for seven runs in the second and third innings and went on to win 11-8.

In the Wash U doubleheader, the Miners couldn't get anything going as they dropped both games, 6-2 and 5-0. Brian Flynn opened the first game for the Miners, and took the loss. Terry Douglass evened his record for the four game set as he lost the second game.

These same scores counted in a dual meet with Northeast Missouri State University that was held at the same time. In this meet, the Miners weren't so fortunate as they lost, 10-8. This was the first of two times that the Miners were to finish behind Kirksville.

The second time was the following day as the Miners took on Kirksville, Southern Illinois

The sprinters continued in their improving ways as they prepare for the tough conference meet. The mile relay, 440 relay, and 880 relay all turned in best times for the year. In the 440 yard relay, the team finished in a tie for second with Missouri-Columbia. In a

season's best of 42.4 seconds, Floyd Harris, Sam Brown, Tom Wycoff and Jim Wassiloh all received medals for this relay, and the same four came back to finish third in the 880 yard relay. Their time for this relay was also a season best of 1:27.9. The other relay to turn in a season's best time was the mile relay squad of Rich Weaver, Mark Snowden, Tom Wycoff and Brian Trower. Although only finishing seventh they turned in a fine time of 3:21.0.

UMR also had two individuals receive medals in the open division. Curt Simmons finished fifth in the shot put and Steve

Smith finished second in the triple jump with a jump of 46' 4 3/4".

Mike Schepplin is continuing to close on the three mile school record of 15:06.0. In the 480 high hurdle shuttle relay the team of Cal Curdt, Rich Weaver, Stu Dunlop and Jack Gevecker won their heat in 1:04.8 but were eliminated in the semi-finals.

The track squad has one more meet in preparation for the conference meet as they travel to Warrensburg for a triangular meet with Southwest Missouri and Central Missouri, then after exams they will travel to Southeast Missouri for the conference meet.

Trap and Skeet Team Finishes First in State

The UMR Skeet team participated in the Fifth National Intercollegiate Skeet and Trap Tournament April 27 and 28. The first team of Kessler, Grace, Ellis, Schlemper, and Holt won first in state out of nine teams. Mizzou was second and UMR's second team finished third in the state. Team members on the second team were Hinkle, McKinney, Mauzy, Whiteside, and Franklin while Henderson and Stanza shot as individuals in the tournament.

Overall in a field of 41 teams from throughout the nation the two teams finished 10th and 13th respectively. Some of the teams competing in the tournament were the Airforce Academy, West Point, Texas A and M, and Cornell. Among the individual competitors included Tony Rosetti, Olympic champion and three other members of the Olympic team.

Grace, Ellis, and Kessler ended up third, fourth and fifth in the state respectively. Kessler took second in his class. Grace, Ellis, McKinney, Mauzy, Whiteside, Schlemper, and Hinkle all ended up in the top ten in their classes. Kessler, McKinney, Ellis, and Hinkle also received patches for shooting 25 straight in the tournament.
