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# Church to become UMR theatre

The University of Missouri-Rolla and the First Baptist Church of Rolla have entered into an agreement allowing UMR to use the building at 7th and Cedar as a home for UMR's theatre program. The building will be called the Cedar Street Center. The agreement is for one year with options to renew.

Jim Jensen, Baptist spokesman, said, "This is a happy circumstance where all parties will benefit. This building, which has been vacant since the construction of the new Baptist Church, has suffered the

deterioration which normally occurs with lack of use. We were willing to enter into an agreement with UMR at no charge to them, with their provision to make the building operable again and maintain it during their occupancy."

The facility will be managed as part of UMR Auxiliary Services on a self-supporting basis. John Vaughn, UMR director of Administrative Planning, said that no state-appropriated money will be used for remodeling. He said that about half, or \$22,000, of the initial cost will go for portable equipment such as

theater seats and lighting that can be used in other locations at a later date.

Remodeling of the building will include the construction of a stage with proscenium and backstage area. There will be tiered auditorium seating for 400, storage and rehearsal space in the basement and a few meeting rooms on the balcony level.

"The Cedar Street Center will help fulfill, on a temporary basis, a long standing need UMR has had for a performing arts stage," said Dr. David Oakley, professor of music and co-chairman of UMR's Auditorium committee. "The last theatrical stage on campus was the one

in Parker Hall. It was converted to the Registrar's Office when enrollment increased substantially in 1964.

"UMR has had a theater program for years, and students have been working under the most adverse circumstances. For every production, they have had to construct additions to lectures stages and work without backstage facilities. I'm pleased that Dr. Margie Boston, assistant professor, joined the faculty last fall and is teaching credit courses in theater.

"We will probably schedule most of our student productions there and a

number of our performing arts series events. With 14 UMR music and theater and other groups, this means some 40 or 50 UMR activities each year."

According to Jess Zink, director of Auxiliary Services, UMR groups will use the Cedar Street Center most of the time. He said, "The center will also be available to the community for such events as piano recitals, children's theater, concerts, senior citizens' activities and city recreational activities. It will also be available as a supplemental facility for Rolla school activities if there are con-

licts for use of their own space.

"The fees for such use will be comparable to those presently charged for use of UMR's University Center. When tickets are sold for admission to an event, the fee will probably be based on a negotiable percentage of the ticket sales."

Events will be scheduled by the University Center reservationist. UMR will provide limited bus service for students from campus.

The UMR campus master plan calls for a combined auditorium-Music-Alumni Building.

### Board of Curators approve leases

The University of Missouri Board of Curators in late May after plans to expand on-campus housing were stymied because the University could not sell revenue bonds for construction.

The University's original plans to expand Thomas Jefferson Residence Hall due to increasing enrollment had to be set aside when UM

did not receive any bids on the sale of revenue bonds to finance the project.

Because the market is still not favorable to the sale of bonds, UM treasurer Donald S. Holm Jr. said UM plans to borrow \$6.4 million by bond anticipation notes. When the revenue bonds are later sold, the notes would be repaid.

The Thomas Jefferson project calls for 372 more spaces in the dorm to bring capacity to 891. An earlier bid request brought a design proposal for a 12-story ad-

dition. The new bids will specify the number of spaces needed, not the number of floors.

Meanwhile 10 locations will be used to house students. The four newly-leased locations are: Holiday Inn, Rolla Rancho Motel, MaC Hall, and the third floor of the Phelps County Bank.

These newly leased facilities, and housing space at six other locations, will enable UMR to accommodate 415 students in off-campus housing.

The other leased locations are: Little Piney Motor Lodge, Coachhouse Inn, Rustic Motel, Plaza Motel, Interstate Motel and the Thomas Building.

All properties are being leased for nine months except MaC Hall, which is being leased for 12 months so that it may be used for freshman orientation.

During the 1980-81 school year, 464 spaces were rented off campus, but some of those leased facilities are no longer available.

### UMR ranked in Gourman report

Five of the departments in the University of Missouri-Rolla's School of Mines and Metallurgy have been ranked in the top 10 nationally in the third edition of the "Gourman Report."

That report, which is prepared by Dr. Jack Gourman, rates undergraduate programs in American and international universities. The report surveyed 98 academic programs in 1,744 colleges and universities.

The UMR disciplines which were ranked in the top 10 are: geological engineering, second; metallurgical engineering, third; mining engineering, fourth; ceramic engineering, fifth; and petroleum engineering, sixth.

The report evaluates an institution's academic

programs and non-departmental areas on the basis of data submitted by the institution itself in the form of a questionnaire together with supplemental reports and private investigation.

Among the factors taken into consideration are: organization of the institution; total educational programs offered and degrees conferred; age of the institution and the individual program being considered; admission requirements; number of students enrolled; teaching staff and teaching loads; physical facilities; curricular content, and research.

### School of Mines appoints Dean

Professor Robert V. Wolf has been appointed assistant dean of the School of Mines and Metallurgy at the University of Missouri-Rolla effective July 1.

"Professor Wolf has served the University for many years with distinction and I am very pleased that

he accepted the appointment as assistant dean of the School of Mines and Metallurgy," said Dr. Don L. Warner, dean of the School of Mines and Metallurgy.

"His knowledge of the history of the School and his acquaintance with many of its alumni should be very helpful in charting the School's future direction and

in achieving the alumni support that we will need," he added.

Wolf, a professor of metallurgical engineering, holds B.S. (1951) and M.S. (1952) degrees in mechanical engineering from UMR. He joined the UMR faculty in 1951 and served as acting chairman of the department of metallurgical and nuclear engineering in 1970-71. He also has served as chairman of the UMR Academic Council and the University of Missouri Patent and Copyright Committee.

In addition, he belongs to the St. Louis Engineers' Club and has served as secretary-treasurer of the Missouri Valley Regional Foundry Conference, secretary of the MSM-UMR Alumni Association and a key professor for the Foundry Educational Association.

## Show some sense; Save some money

This weekend, midnight collectors left hazardous intersections unmarked; blind corners, blinder; and you, less protected. The annual harvest of traffic signs, viewed by some as just another college prank, is especially threatening when new drivers and pedestrians are navigating unfamiliar streets. Such vandalism contributed to the death of a student less than two years ago. Show some sense and save a life. If that doesn't move you, realize that the fine for possession of such a gem is \$500. Wal-Mart facsimiles are a better buy.

While we're giving advice, let's pass along more information in the same vein. New students should be aware that city vehicle stickers are required on all automobiles and motorcycles registered in the name of a Rolla resident. A bargain rate of \$1.75 will carry you from now until January, 1982. Get them at the City Collector's Office, City Hall, 900 Elm, and avoid that sinking feeling when a road block rises before you.

Wondering what it means when a friendly policeman suggests a lower volume on the stereo? It means two strikes and you're out. Visit number two can be accompanied by a summons, a fine of \$100 and court costs of \$14. That can tweak your woofer.

In case you haven't noticed, parking space is at a premium. You don't get a 10% tolerance on two-hour

parking just because it's government work, so check your ticket to see if fast feet will keep the fine at an affordable level. Yellow zones, no parking zones and private driveways are no-no's. Hang your favorite bumper over the white lines downtown and chalk up another one.

## Record enrollment at UMR

Classes started Monday at the University of Missouri-Rolla with an unofficial on-campus record enrollment of 6,763.

This is a gain of 799 over the same time last year, the previous record.

Regular registration ended Friday, Aug. 21. Late registration continues.

Paul Ponder, registrar, said that he expects the official enrollment figure at

the end of four weeks to be around 6,800. (That figure does not include co-op students who are off-campus for their work semester, students at UMR's Engineering Center in St. Louis, and those enrolled in other off-campus extension courses.) The official enrollment last fall at the end of four weeks was 6,039.

Robert B. Lewis, director of admissions, said that the large number of requests for

admission reflects both the employment situation and UMR's reputation as an outstanding technological institution.

"There is an exceptionally good job market for engineering and science graduates who are finding excellent positions at high salaries," he said. "In addition, UMR has the reputation of providing a quality program in these fields."

## CIPAS offers English course

The Center for International Programs and Studies (CIPAS) of the University of Missouri-Rolla will offer an intensive English course, English as a Foreign Language, Sept. 14-Dec. 10.

Students may enroll for the total program or for any of eight sections offered: writing, listening comprehension, structure, reading, vocabulary, preparation for the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) examination, technical reading, and a supervised laboratory.

Classes are geared for students at an intermediate level of the English language, approximately at a 400 level or above on the standard TOEFL examination.

John M. Morgan, instructor of English at UMR, will teach the course.

The meal program encompasses three meals per day, Monday through

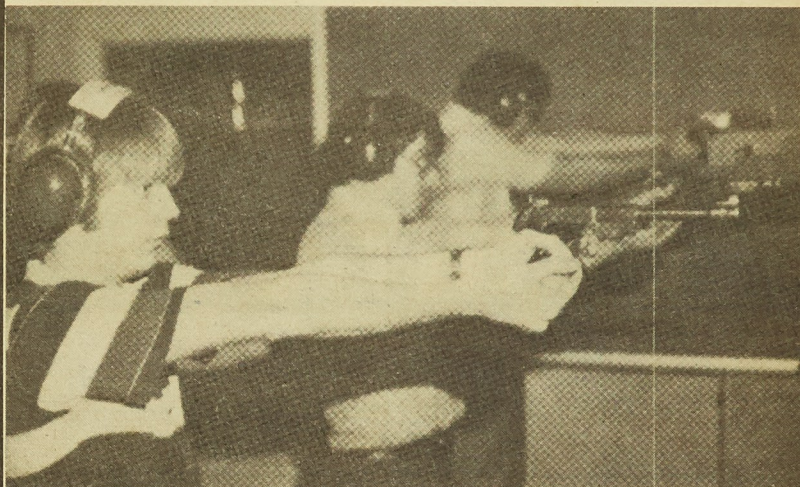
Saturday and breakfast and lunch on Sunday. The cost is \$470 per semester payable in total or through an established payment plan.

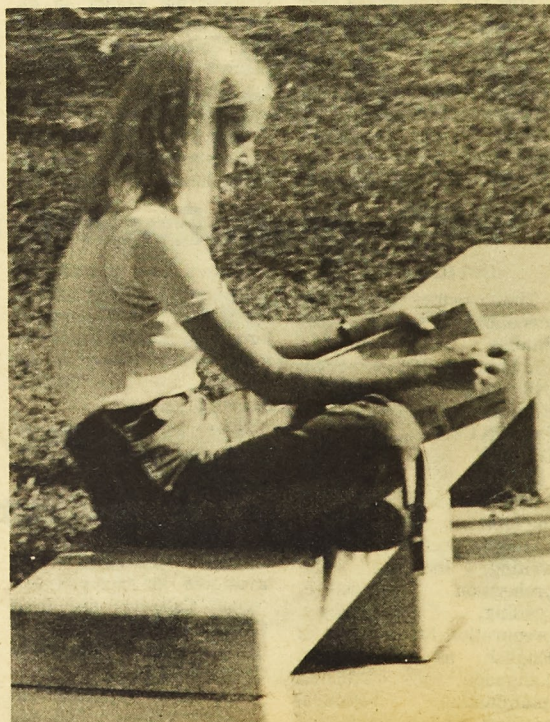

## KUMR / Arts and Sciences join forces

KUMR-FM public radio station on the University of Missouri-Rolla campus and the UMR College of Arts and Sciences will join efforts in communications, according to Linda Flentje, KUMR general manager.

"In addition to public broadcasting, KUMR will interact with UMR's speech and media studies program," Flentje said. "On July 1, when KUMR becomes a part of the College of Arts and Sciences, the station will have greater access to faculty and student resources."

Dr. Sam Geonetta, section head of the disciplines of speech and media studies, said, "With KUMR's

becoming a part of the College, interaction of students and faculty with professional broadcasters will have a firm academic basis."

Geonetta said that UMR is currently seeking a faculty member who would hold a position both in the College and at KUMR.

UMR offers a minor in technical and scientific communications within the speech and media studies program. In the minor, studies can choose from courses such as introduction to broadcasting, mass media and society, communication theory, principles of speech, business and professional speaking, technical writing,

advanced composition, and the engineer as writer.

Flentje said, "This August marks KUMR's eighth birthday. The station strives to serve the fine arts programming needs of residents in South Central Missouri. In addition to the fine arts segment of the schedule, KUMR also provides listeners with bluegrass, jazz, and public affairs programming."

"Using the resources on the UMR campus, as well as those of the surrounding area, the station includes as much programming of a local nature as staff time allows."

An ongoing series featuring local personalities,

as well as public affairs commitments, such as broadcasts of the Rolla City Council meetings have been a part of the regular schedule since KUMR went on the air.

"In addition, the station has an active community involvement policy, sponsoring such events as an annual art exhibit in conjunction with UMR Parents' Day festivities. Candidates' Night forums offer voters an opportunity to hear the views of all candidates running for public office."

"The latest project is the KUMR-sponsored 'Community Volunteer of the Year' award."

doing everything nobody else wants to. Also, she'll take over in case the editor-in-chief is incapacitated by angry readers or a good party.

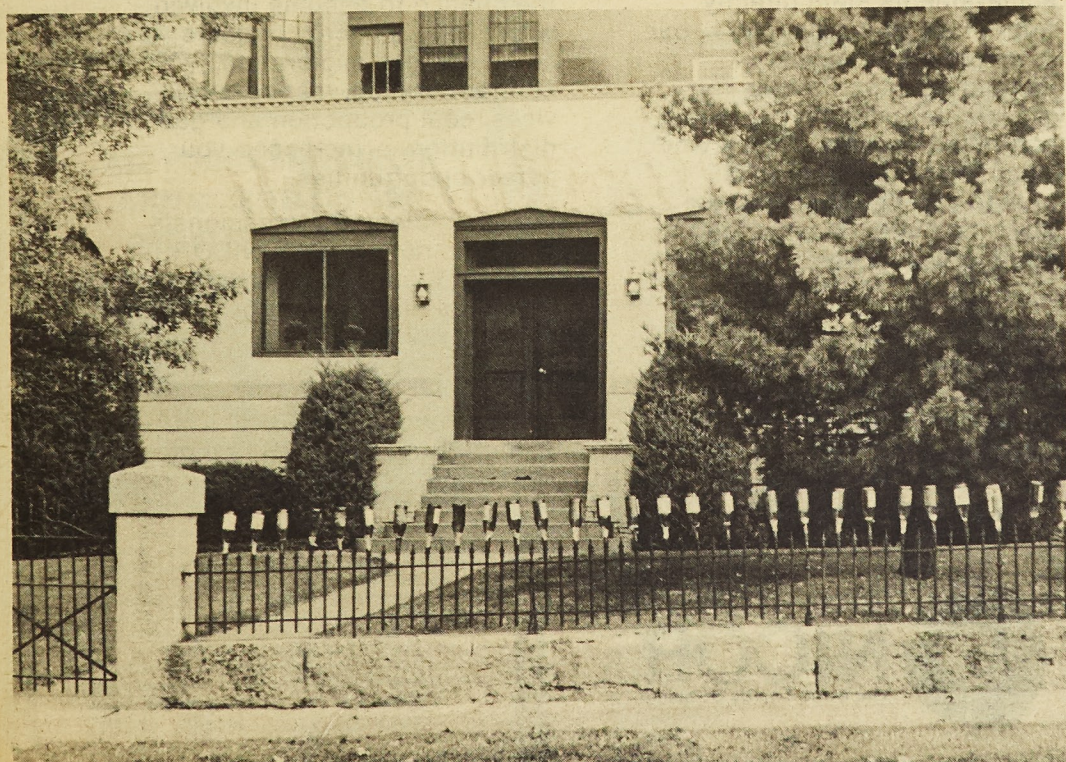
