## Smith fills post

Neil K. Smith, director of business services at UMR, has been named vice chancellor for administrative services at UMR. The appointment is effective July 1.

Joseph D. Wollard, UMR executive director of administrative services, will retire this summer. Following his retirement, the position of executive director will be discontinued.

"I am pleased that Mr. Smith has agreed to accept this position," said UMR Chancellor Joseph M. Marchello. "He is well-qualified and I am confident will provide the unit with effective leadership. I look forward to working with him."

"Mr. Wollard has contributed outstanding professional service to UMR during the 17 years he has

been associated with the campus," he added, "and he can be proud of his many accomplishments."

Smith's appointment is part of a restructuring of administrative services that was initiated earlier this year after Wollard announced his intention to retire.

That reorganization will result in a reduction of staff in administrative services, according to Chancellor Marchello. In addition to the vacated executive directorship, the position of director of business services also will be discontinued and duties associated with the position will be reassigned. Several other activities in the department also will be redistributed to other highly qualified administrators in the unit.

"Following Mr. Wollard's decision to retire, I discussed with UM President (James) Olson the

possibility of restructuring administrative services through direct promotion of one of the unit's administrators," Chancellor Marchello said. "It was announced that the reorganization would proceed in this manner."

"It also was announced that at least half of the salary funds from the vacated executive directorship will be made available to re-establish the directorship of the Graduate Center for Materials Research," he added. "The remainder will be used for the reorganizational changes that will consist of transferring the duties of the executive directorship to other administrative services staff members."

These announcements were followed by a two-month review during which the UM vice presidents, members of the ad-

ministrative services staff, UMR's deans and other campus administrators were consulted about the reorganization.

"A number of persons provided advice and suggestions about the proposed reorganization, and I am grateful to them for their assistance," Chancellor Marchello said.

Smith joined the UMR staff in 1971 as grants and contracts officer and was named director of institutional studies in 1974. He was appointed director of business services in 1979.

Prior to coming to UMR, he served as mortgage loan representative with Commerce Bank of University City, St. Louis; a registered representative with Bache and Company Inc., St. Louis, and assistant manager of personnel at the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis.

Mr. Smith will be the new vice chancellor for administrative services, filling the post Mr. Wollard held for 17 years.

## Papa Nau missed in EE dept.

For many years, Dr. Robert H. Nau has been a fixture in the electrical engineering department. This semester students in Dr. Nau's EE281 course, a service course in basic electrical circuits for non-EE majors, found themselves without a professor in March.

Dr. Nau first had to go to Colorado to have preliminary tests and then underwent open heart surgery on March 10, according to Dr. S. Derald Morgan, chairman of the EE department. Dr. Nau is "doing quite well," Dr. Morgan said.

His health problems,

however, left approximately 280 students without a teacher. Therefore, the EE department had to "scrape together a situation to finish the class," Dr. Morgan said.

The situation presented a large problem for the department, which was already in a vulnerable position due to the absence of Dr. McPherson. "We don't have any staff to substitute when someone gets sick," Dr. Morgan commented. "Dr. Van Doren was already teaching three classes. We arranged for Dr. Van Doren to finish lecturing on the material and then use the teaching assistants for the review for the final."

The biggest problem, according to Dr. Morgan, is that "if a professor gets sick,

there's no money to replace him. Everyone is already overloaded, so if someone is asked to substitute he is carrying a serious overload." Dr. Morgan said that he has "argued for the university to have some funds for department chairmen to have sick leave substitutes. There are no funds after the start of the year — there's no sick leave policy for faculty at all." Worse than that, he says, is that there is no way to solve the problem if you have an extended illness.

Dr. Morgan was able to get a "few dollars" extra for Dr. Van Doren to pay him to finish the course. These dollars came from "money generated by the faculty from grant release dollars

from research," he said.

Several students enrolled in the course are naturally upset by the situation. Melanie Tindley, a junior in engineering management, said she "doesn't know what to expect for the final." She feels that the final grade computation should take the situation into account.

Randy Wood, a junior in mechanical engineering, said he "didn't know what to expect from one week to the next. If they knew Dr. Nau would be out, then they should've arranged for the class to be taught the entire semester by one person."

Chris Laheman, a senior in chemical engineering, agrees that things have been somewhat confused. "I don't think the class is one-fourth

as good as it would have been with Dr. Nau," she said.

"Students have to be a little patient on this one," Dr. Morgan said. "I apologize that they didn't get as good a course as they liked but we did the best we could with the resources available."

Dr. Nau will be returning to teach EE281 both this summer and in the fall, yet the basic problem remains. The EE department, for example, has had four professors in the last five years out for an extended time for open-heart surgery. "The odds are at least 80 percent of this happening again," Dr. Morgan said. He pointed out that his depart-

ment has eight people over 56 and six of these are over 60. Therefore, a sick leave fund would be of great help.

As an aside, EE283, the second service course for non-EE majors, was accidentally omitted from the fall 1983 class schedule. The department caught the mistake on Monday and therefore students were able to preregister for it. As of now, it will be offered from 3:30-4:20 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. This is because this "is such a large class to schedule that we have to do it when it won't interfere with the student's major classes," Dr. Morgan said. "However, I'm going to suggest that we change the time to 3:30-4:45 p.m. Monday and Wednesday."

## South Tower nearly complete

The new South Tower of UMR's Thomas Jefferson residence hall complex is nearing completion, and furniture is starting to arrive.

"It is likely that the new addition will be in use this summer," said Jess Zink, director of auxiliary services. "The South Tower will

add 410 spaces, just about the number of students who are in university-leased housing this year. UMR will now have 1,550 living spaces available in the two towers of TJ and the five quadrangle halls," Zink said. "We will no longer house students in motels." UMR also offers married student housing facilities.

The \$7 million TJ addition

contains 11 stories and brings the total number of spaces in the Thomas Jefferson complex to 940. Floors two and three are reserved for women; men will occupy the fourth through 11th floors.

Joseph D. Wollard, UMR executive director of administrative services, said that UMR's housing situation this fall is a real

turnaround from that of previous years. "We're achieving our goal of providing quality housing to go along with our quality education," he said. "Without question, our student housing facilities are among the finest in the state."

UMR housing officials emphasize that residence hall living is a far cry from

the old dormitory room-and-board concept.

"For example, the TJ complex has many special features," Zink said. "It is all under one roof, with residents of both towers having access to all facilities without leaving the building. There are two large general-use lounges, one with a sunken conversation area, fireplace and large-screen

cable TV; game rooms and a fully equipped fitness room; a convenience supply store, and the newly expanded cafeteria that seats 350 at one time. Another big attraction is the large, heated outdoor pool, with a patio

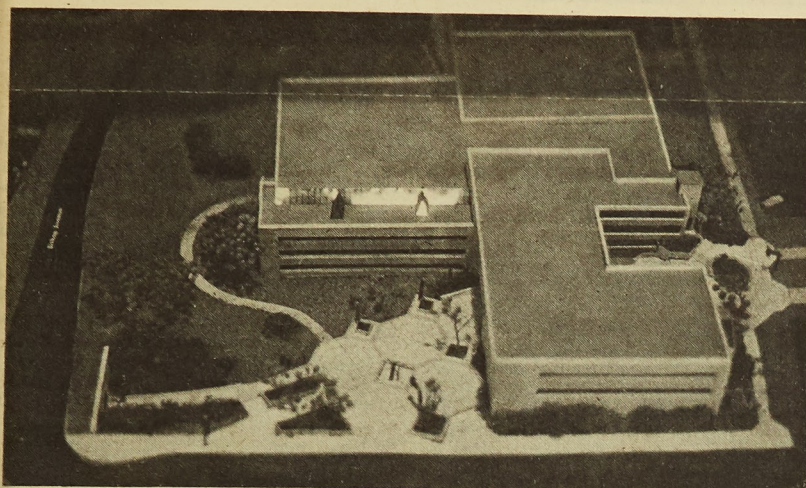

## New look for golf course

Grab your clubs and head for the newly renovated UMR golf course. About \$8,500 and the hard work of Manager Stan Busch, greenskeeper Jim Duncan and student worker Russ Chappell are being put into a well-organized project. The course will be open during and after this undertaking, which should be completed in a week or so.

The driving range will be open full time instead of just during the evening. The range will sit on what was once the fairway of hole No. 1. New fencing will separate it from the rest of the course.

To accommodate for the placement of the driving range, a new No. 1 tee box will play to the old No. 2 green. The greens after this drop one number until hole No. 7, which boasts both a new tee and new green.

Hole No. 8 features a new tee box plus a drain for the green which, ha ha, doubles as a water hazard.

The tee for the difficult finishing hole will be moved back, making it a par 5 instead of a par 4. This results in a regulation par-36, nine-hole course.

The beauty of the UMR links will be enhanced by the addition of 37 trees (count them, golfers, 37). They were donated by H.D. Thomas, a retired alumnus

whose hobby is growing trees.

Special thanks go to Bill Summers, a horticultural architect from Mizzou. Bill helps with the renovation by making contour maps, as well as creating a display to be placed in front of the pro shop.

## T.J. to gym

As always, the campus at UMR is under continuous change, according to Joseph Wollard, executive director of administrative services. Several new projects will be started this summer.

One of the university's goals is to install a continuous pathway from T.J. to the Gale Bullman Multi-Purpose Building. This trace would consist of a series of sidewalks and possibly a walkway over Bishop Avenue (Highway 63).

Part of the trace will be constructed this summer. The area south of the Electrical Engineering Building and east of the Library will have a network of sidewalks with a footbridge over the creek. The trace will be the walkway entering and leaving the footbridge. This is a continuation of the path that comes from the T.J. tube to the campus.

The construction of this walkway near the EE Building will be postponed. An elevator shaft from the

EE Building will be constructed at the southeast corner of the building. When this construction is finished that portion of the trace will also be finished.

Another elevator will be installed on the south side of the Physics Building. Along with this elevator will be appropriate ramps and sidewalks leading up to it.

Plans for this summer also include preliminary work on the Mineral Engineering Building to be located at the northwest end of the campus.

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## Govt. should expect something in return

An open letter to Rep. Bob Edgar, 7th District, Pennsylvania.

Dear Rep. Edgar:

In an open letter you wrote, which appeared in my college newspaper, you outlined to President Reagan your reasons for opposing the Solomon Amendment, which requires male students to be registered for the draft before they can be eligible for financial aid from the

government. I feel there are several issues stated in your letter which assume things which are simply not true.

First of all, you state that the amendment is "contrary to basic principles of American government." By this statement, you imply that the government is obligated to provide financial aid to all students, regardless. I feel this is a false assumption. The government began financial

aid programs as just that — aid to those students who needed a bit more financial support to finish their educations, and who the government saw fit to receive it. It was not designed, and indeed, cannot become, an unlimited pool of money to finance everyone's college educations.

You also call upon the education community to work for legislative repeal of the law and to help "repudiate the concept that

it represents." As I see it, the concept that it represents is one of fair play. If the government is offering this financial aid, why shouldn't it receive something in return (namely, its own defense)? The government has the right to rally troops in the event of a national emergency, and I feel it also has the right not to financially support those who would turn their backs on their country in a crisis.

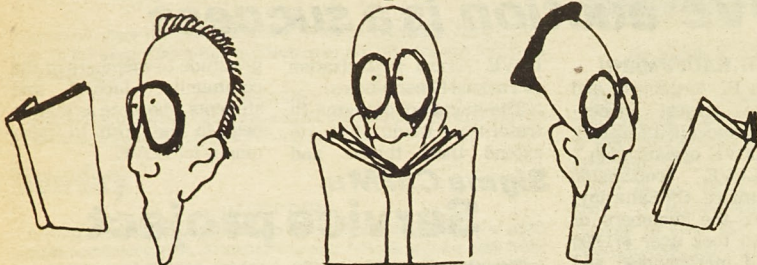
Thirdly, you state that the Solomon Amendment is a tool for inducing non-compliant people to register, and for "exact[ing] punishment" against those who would not comply with draft registration. I feel you have an incorrect view of the amendment. It is not for spotting nonregistrants; rather, it is to ensure that those who receive from the government will also give what they can towards

defending the way of life that has been created for them. And what if it were used to spot nonregistrants? Bear in mind that, barring the few cases of religious obligation, nonregistrants are lawbreakers. They refuse to follow a federal law. Do you defend these people?

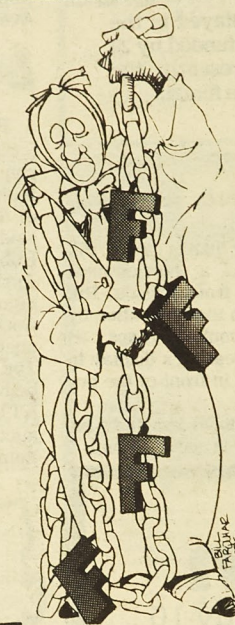

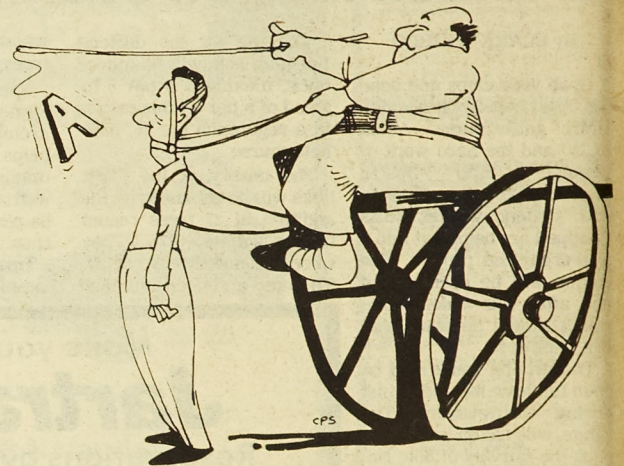

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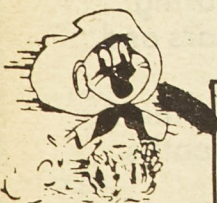

# Ohm's Law is wrong

The electrical engineering department made an announcement Wednesday that is likely to cause international controversy.

The announcement stated that "Ohm's Law is wrong" and "the worldwide scientific community must put forth an all out effort to get the law rewritten in accord with the latest findings."

Ohm's Law, named after its developer, Engelbert Z. Ohm, has for many years provided the basis for all electrical engineering and until now has never been successfully challenged. However R. Schroeder, a longtime E.E. department technician and noted authority on simple series circuits, has in fact challenged the law, and he says he has a device that can substantiate his claim.

Strange as it may sound, the device is comprised of a series connected transformer, knife switch and small light bulb, all of which are mounted on a piece of wood. According to Schroeder, the device "clearly demonstrates that electrons flow through open circuits and never flow through conducting switches." Ohm's Law in effect states the opposite, so to quote Schroeder, "Ohm's Law is wrong."

Schroeder has already invited many electrical engineering professors to examine the device and hopes soon to have world leading scientists and authorities on single series circuits to do the same.

Some of the professors who have already examined the device have been heard to say, "That's really something," "Wow," "How

is it possible?" and "I'll have to think about this awhile."

Just what impact all of this is going to have on electrical engineering of the future is hard to predict at this time. One authority has said that Schroeder's device has great possibilities in the home as an energy saving device because when the kids are forever leaving unused light switches on, the lights will really be off.

## Softball finishes season at 8-16

The Lady Miners finished up their 1983 season last weekend at the MIAA tournament at Maryville. Last week's 1-4 record brought the team to its 8-16 final mark.

In the last regular season competition, UMR dropped two makeup games to Southwest Baptist last Tuesday. In both games the two teams played each other very

close, with 2-1 and 5-1 finals. The Miners had five hits and two errors in each game. SWB had five and three hits respectively, and two errors apiece in the games also. For the day, Anita Tikey, Lisa Frumhoff and Judy Redel all had two singles. Pitchers Leta Judd and Sue Applebaum each took a loss.

In the tourney, the Miners played CMSU on Friday, absorbing a 10-1 loss. The

team had a bad game all-around with only four hits and five errors. Leslie Behm had two singles in the contest. Judd was the Miner hurler.

Later that evening UMR took Lincoln to the cleaners with a 19-1 victory in five innings. Outstanding performances at the plate included Behm's two singles, a single and a double for both Applebaum and Stephanie

Kutterer, and a two-run double and a grand slam homer by senior Anita Tikey. Applebaum tarted out on the mound and was relieved by Carmen Baker in the third. Preston felt the team was taking out their frustrations of the first game on Lincoln.

On Saturday it was UMSL that sent the Miners home with a fairly even game ending up 7-4, Riverwomen. The Miners had eight hits in the exciting game. Baker went 3-for-4, Applebaum had a single and a double, and Miller stretched a single into a close homer on UMSL errors. A defensive highlight happened when Applebaum, at first, threw a

runner out at home to turn the double play. Preston, was apparently satisfied with the season finale. "We did some really good things out there," she remarked. UMSL went on to capture third in the conference with Northeast and Northwest in the first two spots respectively.

UMR's Carmen Baker and Cecilia Gutierrez were selected for the second team all conference. Diana Miller received an honorable mention. Miller was also honored at the UMR All-Sports Banquet Monday. Her .328 batting average was ninth in the conference with three doubles, two triples and a homer. She was third

in the MIAA with eight stolen bases. Diana, who usually caught but put some time in at left field, was "an aggressive player both offensively and defensively. She often played hurt, but you could never tell," said Preston.

When asked about the season Preston was only disappointed with the record, and realized that "it's a start." The 1984 team will be losing several of its old standbys, but 12 players will return. They will be joined by a new coach who will guide them through some tough competition. Sarah Preston will be devoting more of her time to cross country coaching.

The UMR baseball team ended the week by adding two more losses to their record, as they were defeated by Washington University in a double-header at Washington University. "We played really well against Washington University, but we just couldn't get the big hit to fall in for us when we needed it," said Coach Broyles. The Miners lost 4-3 and 6-4 as the luck just wouldn't help them out.

"Kuethe pitched really well for us in the 2nd game, and Meyer gave up only two hits in the first game, so it would have been nice to pull those two games out for them," said Coach Broyles. The pitchers performed well but most of the problems came from the plate.

In the first game the Miners started off the hitting in the second inning when D.J. Steagall hit a one-out single and then was brought home with a two-out single by Chris Nisbet. Then the Miners' other two runs came in the fifth inning when Bradbery walked with two outs and then Mike Schafer and Craig Thomas both hit singles, bringing in two runs and bringing the Miners' total score to 3.

In the second game the

Miners didn't start off hitting until the sixth inning when Tim Meyer, Steagall and Kevin DeBont each got one-out singles to load the bases. And then Dan Walters hit a smashing line drive that should have gone past the first baseman. But with a fantastic dive by the first baseman the ball was amazingly caught and first base was tagged for an unassisted double play by the first baseman. The Miners came back strong in the seventh inning when they came up with four runs, but still fell short as Washington University tallied up five runs in the seventh to beat the Miners 6-4.

Although the Miners have not had a very good hitting season with the Miners' team average being .247,

Coach Broyles stated, "Steagall and Mike Shafer have really hit the ball well lately and have had great seasons." Steagall has batted a respectable .397, hitting 27 out of 68 times at bat, placing him fifth in the MIAA in batting, and in the last week Steagall has hit .527, earning him the honor of MIAA Player of the Week in baseball.

The Miners this year were rained out most of the season allowing them to play only 22 games. Their record to date is 4-17-1 and they have just lately started to get the ball rolling, and have got a tough road ahead. "We finish up the season at Wichita State, so it will be our toughest competition of the year," stated Coach Broyles.

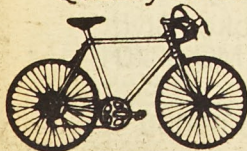

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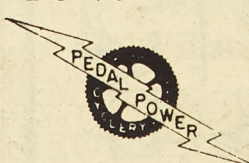

Curators and UM officials working closely with Rolla campus representatives made the quick turnaround possible in UMR's housing.

Wollard pointed out that no state appropriations are involved in building or renovation of the residence halls. "The projects are funded by revenue bonds, and the housing operation is self-supporting," he said.

Zink said that upgrading of the North Tower, the original Thomas Jefferson Residence Hall, will begin this summer and is expected to be completed by the summer of 1984. The seven-story luxury residence hall, built in 1966 by a group of private investors, was purchased by UMR in 1976 for \$1,130,000. The \$300,000 renovation will include such things as adding freezer and cooler space for the expanded food service; roof repair; caulking and tuckpointing of exterior brick; painting and repairing balconies; repairing and resealing parking lots; interior painting; replacement of floor coverings and ceiling tile; installation of additional safety equipment, such as improved smoke detectors and emergency lighting, and refurbishing laundry, conference and physical fitness rooms.

Also, renovation is continuing on resident halls and cafeteria located in the quadrangle. A 10-year project which began in 1979, the renovation will cost between \$1.5 and \$2 million. Phase five will be completed this summer and includes reroofing, plumbing repair, tuckpointing and modifications. The major part of previous projects involved interior renovation of Rayl Cafeteria and Kelly Hall, the oldest of the halls.

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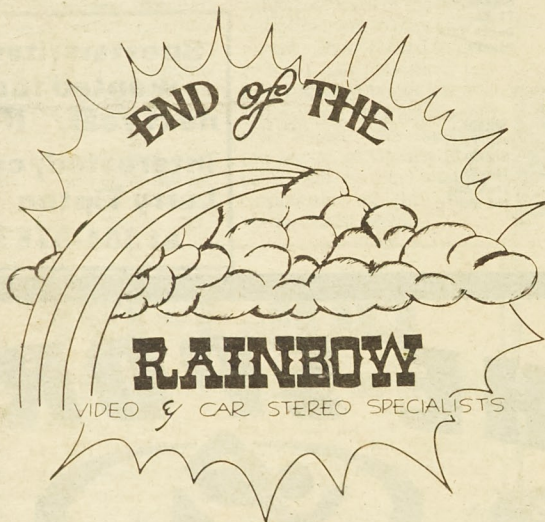
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
