## UMR students come to aid of CP school

When fire struck the Cerebral Palsy School in Rolla nearly a month-and-a-half ago, it gutted the inside of the building and caved in the roof. The insurance company settled for \$180,000, covering the cost of rebuilding the main structure but leaving much of the total loss uncovered.

Bonnie Lewis, director of the school, had much to be concerned about. Ninety-seven handicapped children, from infants to teenagers, depended on the school for their well being and development.

Although supported partly by the State, most of the school's support came from charitable donations. The cost of rebuilding would have to come from more donations from the surrounding community.

It was at this point that many UMR organizations

mobilized to put the Cerebral Palsy School back in business. The list of student organizations rising to meet the challenge is impressive and shows no lack of creative ideas when such an effort as this calls UMR students to action.

Some notable efforts include:

The American Society of Civil Engineers organized a salvage effort March 3 at the old school site.

Rev. Stephen Faletti of the Newman Center organized people from Newman, from the Veterans Club, and from several UMR fraternities to collect money at intersections downtown.

Theta Tau's Casino Night, held March 14, raised money amid widespread participation.

Some students from the Engineering Mechanics senior design class are building a custom designed adjustable table for the school.

Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity is holding their 22nd annual benefit chicken dinner on Sunday, March 25, from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the fraternity house. Tickets are available in advance or at the door for \$3.

Another very creative fund raising activity comes from Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. They will hold a mud-wrestling event on Saturday, March 24 at the Manor Inn featuring professional lady mud-wrestlers. Tickets can be obtained at the fraternity for \$3.

Also that weekend will be the Delta Sigma Phi Little sisters raffle drawing. Tickets must be obtained before then from a little sister or at the fraternity.

## LUMIN is active, but not user-friendly

Exactly how many of you have felt like kicking that so-called wonder-bug of technological innovation that sits so stoically at the UMR library entrance, daring anybody who attempts to enter its hallowed portals. It's called LUMIN (Libraries of the University of Missouri Information Network) and is no doubt the darling of the dotting UMR library staff, whose defense of the system borders almost on idolatry. Its multi-faceted features are obviously a great boon to all library users; some are indeed fascinating. And yet why do we see students sorting cards in those obsolete drawers even when the LUMIN terminals happen to be relatively free? Says one UMR undergrad, "The whole point of automation is to make things faster, and whatever the plusses of the LUMIN, it wouldn't be complete until it becomes at least a split second faster than locating a book on the card-catalog." The pity of it is that LUMIN is unquestionably faster than sifting through those moth-eaten cards; if just

one command lists all the titles you want on the screen, the card catalog has obviously been rendered an obsolete superfluity—that is, if you were so diligent as to obey the manual to the last letter and circumvent those unnerving 'bleep-bleeps' that have now come to be accepted as part of the cacophony of the ground floor library sounds. Of course you can do it sans the bleeps. To say otherwise would be an aggravated insult on the intelligence of any self-respecting UMR student. And even so, it is absurd to expect people to have the necessary familiarity with the computers to use them effectively—after all it is a card catalog, and not some machine that tests your computer skills, even though that may be thrilling. As Jean Isen, the Director of Public Services of the library so readily accepts, the users' friendliness of the program leaves much to be desired, and everything is being done to rectify this.

The COM-catalog which is the brainchild of the four library directors of the University of Missouri system is

in actual operation only in UMR. This is because UMR is the only place that has completed the retrospective cataloging which essentially means the conversion of the existing catalog to machine readable form. It took the UMR library staff two and a half years to complete this tedious process, half of the four year gestation period of this idea. Since UMR completed its job earlier than the others, we have in effect consented to be the guinea pigs of this system for the rest of the UM campuses. At present UMR boasts a holding of approximately 140,000 titles (300,000 volumes). The rest of the approximately 900,000 titles catalogued in the LUMIN Data Base are at the other three UM campuses.

Though it may not be user-friendly as yet, the programming of LUMIN is ingenious, as those of you who have had a shot at it have found out. You are able to search for books by subject or author's name. If you are not sure of the name just punch in your closest guess, using a code that acts as a wild card,

and you might get your books listed anyway. If you are not sure of the exact term to be used for books in your area of interest, just plug in a search for subject headings. (This feature obviates the necessity of going through the Library of Congress subject headings,

those intractable red tomes that eventually frustrate you.) Boolean searching is the most ingenious feature of LUMIN, though it needs some work in the area of user compatibility. Boolean search allows you to look for specifics; for example "Shakespeare, not the Sonnets"

or "Einstein, not relativity". The initial programming for LUMIN has been purchased at the Washington Library network and perfected at the

## New meal service plan to become available next year

Rolla, Mo. — The Housing Office at the University of Missouri-Rolla will offer UMR students who live off campus a new 14-meal-per-week food service contract program beginning with the 1984 fall semester.

This program will be available only at the University Center cafeteria and features breakfast, lunch and dinner Monday through Thursday with breakfast and lunch being the only meals served on Friday.

According to Gary Welty, administrative associate with

UMR Auxiliary Services, the program was created because of requests from students. "This program is intended for those students living off campus who want the convenience of having their meals prepared for them during the week but who have the means to fix their meals on the weekends," he said.

"We feel this is a very good plan for off-campus students who want well-balanced meals at a reasonable price," he added.

The cost of the plan will be \$500 per semester, which can be paid on either an installment or a semester basis. Con-

tracts for this program will be available at the UMR Housing office, 212 University Center-West, in May.

In addition, an 18-meal-per-week plan is available for the 1984 summer session at the Thomas Jefferson Residence Hall Complex. This plan, which features three meals per day Monday through Saturday, costs \$335. Contracts for this program will be available at the Housing Office in mid-April.

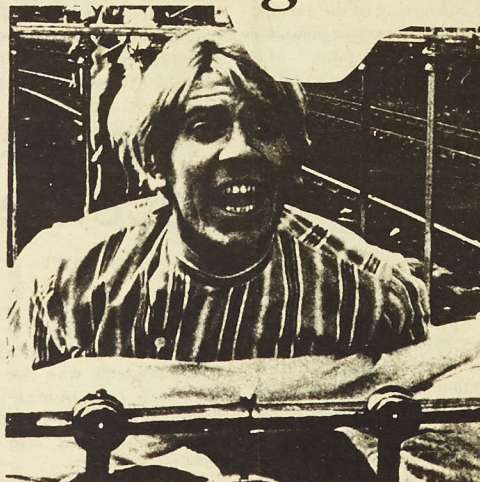

Rolla, Mo. — Missouri Secretary of State James C. Kirkpatrick was awarded the Chancellor medal by the University of Missouri-Rolla in a St. Patrick's ceremony Friday, March 16, on campus.

The medal, which is authorized and sponsored by the MSM-UMR Alumni Association, honors individuals who

have contributed to the well-being, growth and development of UMR-Rolla. It was presented by UMR Chancellor Joseph M. Marchello.

"It is particularly fitting to present this medal to Mr. Kirkpatrick during St. Patrick's festivities on campus," Chancellor Marchello said. "Throughout his distinguished career as Missouri's secretary of state and through

his long association with UMR, Jim Kirkpatrick remains an enthusiastic supporter of St. Patrick's activities. It is a privilege to honor such a citizen of Missouri and friend of UMR-Rolla."

Kirkpatrick has served as secretary since 1965. He is a editor of the Warrensburg Star-Journal and the Jefferson City News-Tribune. For 18 years, he and his son, Don,

published the Windsor Review, and for two years, the Lamar Daily Democrat.

Kirkpatrick's many organizational offices include: past-president of the National Association of Secretaries of State, past-president of the Missouri Press Association, and past-chairman of the Missouri 4-H Foundation.

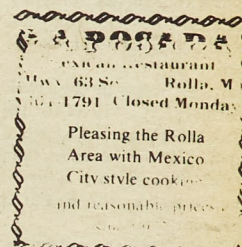
He has served as a member

Central System located in Columbia, using Assembler and PL 1. Programming for LUMIN is still done by the Central System at UMColumbia. This is the reason the system is down from 5 to 8 p.m. daily.

The Director of the UMR library, Mr. Ron Boley, says that he expects to do away with the now archaic card-catalog system in one year's time. He is confident that it can be done. A back-up catalog will be kept in reserve on microfiche, which will be generated by using the COM (Computer Output Microfiche) method. Dial-access will be another feature that will be incorporated in LUMIN. This means you can dial LUMIN and get its catalog on your home or office terminal. You can also expect these terminals to mushroom all over the library, so you won't have to journey all the way to the

ground floor to do your search. Though on-line catalogs are not exactly the latest things in libraries, such catalogs are still rare, and as Mr. Jim Cubit, Director of Mechanical Services qu... "UMR is one of the front-runners with on-line catalogs on college campuses." With its improvements that the library staff promises, LUMIN looks to be about one of the best things that has happened to UMR for some time.



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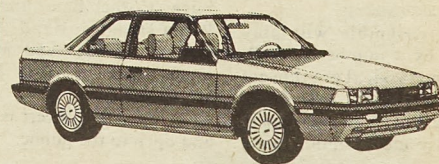
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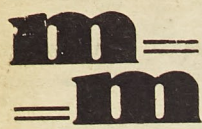


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## Students coping with sickness

"It is hard to concentrate when you don't feel well," says UMR freshman Carol Beardsmore. Although this fact seems incredibly obvious, many students don't realize the true, surprisingly severe significance of this statement until they fall sick and have assignments due and tests to take.

A staff nurse at the UMR infirmary says, "It seems like more kids than usual have had flu or colds this February than usual—maybe not a great percentage more, but it is apparent."

Brochures given out by the Student Health Service say that colds are caused by about 200 different types of viruses and most of these are transmitted through the air via cough and sneeze droplets.

The flu is viral too, but there are just two main types of flu viruses. They are spread

the same way, but they are different from cold viruses and can lead to a more serious illness.

Colds and flu seem epidemic during February here in Rolla because of several factors, according to infirmary staff nurses. The constant weather changes lower people's natural resistance. Too dry air indoors during winter makes it harder for their respiratory system to fight infection. And people come back from spring break with new viruses to share.

Although you are immune to a virus for about four months after you suffer with it, there are always other, different ones on the loose.

The best way to avoid colds is to stay healthy with a proper diet and amount of rest to keep up resistance and to try to minimize contact with people who have colds and flu by using separate

dishes and by keeping at a distance.

"It's very simple. When I get sick, I don't study," says student Sheila Johnson. If you do try to do school work when you are not healthy, "you feel frustrated and get eye strain," says freshman Michele Rost who has missed two weeks of classes due to feverish allergic reactions and an infection. She adds that if you are unfortunate enough to be ill for a long time, you cope by "running around frantically trying to catch up and talk to professors about make up work."

Most professors seem sympathetic toward students who have fallen behind because of illness. A staff nurse said, "The professors that have called over here, when I explained the student's symptoms, seemed to think it's a good excuse."

Dr. John Roberts from

UMR's mathematics department says, "Illness is an excuse [for missing tests]." He adds that although ten point quizzes are even harder to arrange makeup work for than exams are, "if the student informs me within a reasonable time period, I'll do something about it." Although Dr. Roberts is concerned about students who skip and claim it was sickness later, he says, "About all you can do is take the student's word for it."

Of course, once a student misses a few classes, possibly tests, and has not been working well for a few days, he falls behind. "It took me forever to catch up again," said Maureen who was ill for two weeks in early February.

Mary Mahler says, "I was sick for a week and I had five tests the next week. I didn't do too well on those tests." Mary went to review classes with a

fever of 103°

A college student is under strenuous, fast-paced pressure to do probably the most and best mental work in their lives. Sickness under these conditions, when one can not be excused since the work is not physically demanding, is a

prime example of how unfair life can be. A student may receive much useful sympathy and advice from his peers and university supplied institutions like the infirmary. However, in the end it seems that the best advice, as Mary Mahler put it, is "You just have to stick it out."

### Student Loan Repayment Program

The Missouri Army National Guard is pleased to announce its participation in a Student Loan Repayment Program. The National Guard will repay, annually, a portion of "any loan made, insured, or guaranteed under part B (Guaranteed Student Loan) of the Higher Education Act of 1965, or any loan made under Part E (National Direct Student Loan) of such act, after 1 October 1975" for each year of satisfactory service performed in the Missouri Army National Guard. Loan repayments will be the greater of \$500 or 15% of cumulative total loans plus interest due. The National Guard will continue to pay until the loan(s) is repaid, service in the Guard is terminated, or until six years of satisfactory service have been completed. Under this arrangement it is possible that some students, obtaining maximum loan amounts, may have over \$11,000 of loans and interest repaid by the Missouri Army National Guard.

The Missouri Army National Guard also offers a \$4000 Educational Assistance Bonus to qualified individuals enlisting in specific units and or in specific job skills. Individuals qualified to receive this bonus may receive up to \$1000 per year for up to four years as reimbursement for tuition and other covered expenses. Qualified individuals may receive a \$2000 \$1500 cash bonus in lieu of the \$4000 of educational assistance if it would be to their advantage to do so.

This information may prove invaluable to students who are trying to manage the spiraling cost of post-secondary education without creating financial chaos. 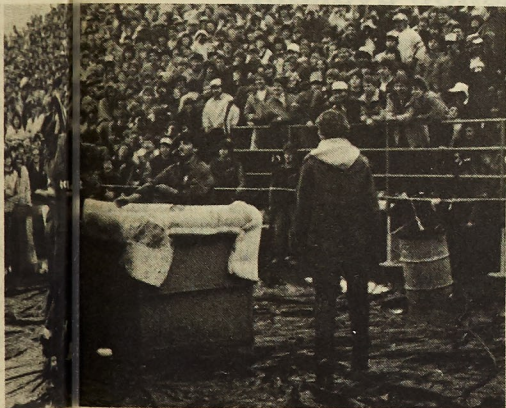

# Baseball returns from the sun

The University of Missouri-Rolla baseball team opened the season in Panama City, Florida this past week, participating in the Gulf Coast Classic. What follows is a game-by-game synopsis of how the Miners fared down South.

**Monday:** Marietta College 6, Miners 5. Defending NCAA Division III national champions held the Miners scoreless through four innings before UMR erupted for four runs in the fifth. Greg Nelson opened the frame with a double and Vernon Huggans followed, reaching base after being hit by a pitch. Mike O'Dell, Tom Murphy, and Mike Schafer each delivered run-scoring singles. Brad Lee ended the scoring, punching a two-run single to give UMR the lead. That advantage was short-lived, however, as Marietta scored three times in the bottom of the sixth.

Trailing 6-4 going into the seventh, the Miners threatened as Huggans ripped a single and scored on an error. Murphy promptly singled, which placed runners at first and second base. Schafer then sacrificed to advance both runners. The next hitter was intentionally passed, loading

the bases for Chris Nisbet. UMR gambled with a squeeze play that would have scored the tying run. However, Nisbet was called out for interference after he and the first-baseman collided in the basepath. That nullified the score and handed the Marietta squad the victory. Reliever Mike Stone was saddled with the loss after he replaced starter Gene Meyer. Both pitchers allowed just one earned run, the other five coming as a result of Miner errors.

**Miners 5, Ripon College 3.** After a near-upset earlier in the day, UMR took their frustrations out on Ripon College, getting a strong pitching performance from righthander Dave Kuethe. Scattering seven hits while going the distance, Kuethe fanned eight Ripon hitters.

The Miners wasted no time in building a lead as they scored in the first frame. Murphy singled, then came home on a two-out Greg Nelson safety. UMR picked up two more tallies the next inning on a walk, two singles—one an RBI-single by Brad Lee—and an error. They capped their scoring in the sixth when Rick Nelson drew

a walk and was moved up a base by a Huggans single. Lee then belted a one-out double, scoring both runners.

Lee had an outstanding day at the plate, hitting a .714 clip and collecting five runs-batted-in. Defensively for the Miners, shortstop Brian Callihan was the standout, handling 11 chances without an error.

**Tuesday:** Troy State 14, Miners 2. Miner freshman southpaw Dave Woodson encountered an awesome hitting barge in his first college start as Troy State exploded for eleven runs—eight of them unearned—over the first three innings. Another freshman, right-hander Alan James, fared better after replacing Woodson, giving up just one earned run over the final three innings.

UMR's only tallies came in the fifth inning when John Viehman doubled and scored on a Vernon Huggans safety. Brad Lee then doubled home another run to end the Miner scoring.

**Wednesday:** Valparaiso 11, Miners 2. Division II power Valparaiso scored early and often against the Miners, getting four runs in the

opening frame while picking two more an inning later. During that time, UMR pitching issued five walks. Valparaiso added to their lead in the fourth with four more tallies and rounded out their scoring in the top of the sixth by way of a solo home run.

Two solo roundtrippers, one by Brad Lee in the first and the other coming on a Chris Nisbet blast in the fourth, was all the offense UMR could muster, registering only two more hits the rest of the way. Miner starter Aaron Epperly took the loss for UMR, whose record fell to 1-3 on the young season.

**Troy State 12, UMR 4.** The big first inning again hurt the Miners. Troy State lashed out five hits which resulted in five runs, opening a sizeable gap before UMR countered with a run in the bottom of the frame. The second inning saw more of the same, with opposition gaining three more runs on four hits.

UMR pulled to within four in the third inning when Brad Lee doubled, scoring a man and coming coming home himself on the third Troy State error of the game. UMR added a lone tally in the seventh on Mike Schafer's

RBI-single. After a rocky start, Miner starter Dave Palmer retired 14 of the next 15 hitters he faced—at one point nine in a row—but to no avail as the Troy State lead was insurmountable.

**Thursday:** Valparaiso 4, Miners 1. Senior southpaw Gene Meyer pitched a fine ball game, yet still came out the loser as Miner hitters could manage only two hits against Valparaiso. Meyer

gave up single runs in the first two innings, then shut down the opposition, retiring eleven hitters in succession before being reached for two unearned runs in the sixth. The Miners' only score came in the seventh inning when Mike O'Dell scored on Brad Lee's ground out. Meyer scattered seven

## Swimmers place 9th at nationals

The NCAA Division II Championship meet was held March 7-10 at Hofstra University in Hempstead, New York. The UMR Men's Swimming Team was there and finished in 9th place with a total of 100 points, the most ever accumulated at the Nationals by the Miners. Northridge California State took first place with 319.5 points. According to coach Bob Pease, the meet was very successful for UMR, but not as good as hoped.

The Miners had ten All-Americans at the championship. One of these All-Americans was freshman

Martin Rodseth who came in third place in the 500-yard freestyle with a time of 4:36.83. Chris Aria, a six-time all-American at the meet, placed tenth in the 200-yard individual medley with a UMR record-breaking time of 1:56.42. Also in the 200-yard I.M. was Paul Perich, who came in right behind Aria with a 1:56.91. Derek Coon, who came in 16th place with a time of 1:57.29, and Scott Carney, who took 19th with a time of 1:57.77. In the 50-yard freestyle, Arthur Hovater

## Mens track

# UMR impressive in opener

The men's varsity track team opened the outdoor season last Tuesday with a meet at SMS, Tulsa University, School of the Ozarks, UMR and the host team all competed. The Miners were the only ones to put up a fight against Southwest, but it wasn't quite enough. Southwest won the meet with 97 points, followed by UMR with 72 points, and then School of the Ozarks and Tulsa U., with 18 and 8 points, respectively.

UMR had some good performances in the running events. It is where SMS outscored them, winning every running event except two. UMR performances are listed below.

In the 200-meter dash, Ike Illoputaile was second with a time of 22.89 seconds. Ike was also 4th in the 100-meter dash. In the 400-meter intermediate hurdles, Brian McGownd was second in 57.99 seconds. John Borthwick won the 1500-meter run in 4:02.79, and he placed third in the 800-meter with a time of 1:59.28. Brian McElroy placed second in the 400-meter dash with a time of 51.03 seconds. In the 110-

meter high hurdles, Scott Finke won in a time of 14.6 seconds, and Mark Givens was fourth in 15.26 seconds. Also placing in the 1500-meter run were Mike Deamer (running unattached), third in 4:03.9, and Dan Lichtenwalner, 4th in 4:07.8.

Placing in the 3,000-meter steeplechase were Joe Henze, 2nd, 9:49.2, and Craig Scott, 4th, 10:37. In the 5-kilometer run, Keith Smith was fourth with a 15:36. UMR pulled second place in the 440-yard relay and the mile relay, barely edged out by SMS in each event (43.47 seconds and 3:27, respectively).

In the field events, SMS

and UMR came out even in points, with a strong showing by the Miner weight men. UMR pulled one and two in the shot put, with Bob Gorham throwing 49'3 1/2", and Mark Galliardi's throw of 48'6 1/2". In the discus, UMR took first, second and third. Freshman John Henry won with a throw of 147'5", followed by Mark Galliardi, 142'7 1/4", and Bob Gorham, 137'. In the javelin, Bob Gorham placed again, throwing 156'10" for third place. Scott Finke had another excellent day vaulting, winning the event with 15'0". He also placed third in the high jump in 6'0". Tim Carter was

second in the high jump with 6'2" and was fourth in the triple jump with 38'6". Tom Apel placed third in the triple jump with a 40'9 1/2" leap. Allen Randell placed fourth in the long jump with 20'9 1/2".

All in all, it was a good day for the Miners. This was the strongest overall team performance yet, so things are looking good for this year's team.

placed 11th, tying the varsity record time of 21.55 seconds. Chris Aria placed again in the 100-yard backstroke, coming in 6th with a time of 53.22 seconds. Paul Pericich received 10th place with a time of 54.56 seconds. Derek Coon took 5th place and made a varsity record time of 59.21 seconds in the 100-yard breaststroke. In the 200-yard freestyle, Rodseth made a varsity record time of 1:43.48 and a 10th place finish. Scott Carney came in 11th place in the 100-yard butterfly with a time of 51.60 seconds. In the

200-yard backstroke, Chris Aria touched in at 4th place with a 1:55.77 and behind him in 9th was Paul Pericich with a 1:58.92. Derek Coon took 3rd place and made a varsity record time of 2:07.77 in the 200-yard breaststroke. Twelfth place was taken by Scott

Carney in the 200-yard butterfly with a time of 1:54.93.

This was the first National Championship in which the Miners have scored in all three relay events. In the 800-yard free relay the Miners took 12th place with a time of 7:01.01. The relay team consisted of Rodseth, Aria, Mark Shlanta and Mark Wuttig. UMR received 9th place in the 400-yard medley relay with swimmers Aria, Coon, Carney and Hovater, setting a record time of 3:30.70. Finally, in the 400-yard freestyle relay, the Miners got 10th place with another varsity record-setting time of 3:10.32. This relay team consisted of Rodseth, Hovater, Aria and Danny Mattle.

This year was the first time UMR scored points in both diving events, thanks to sophomore John Staley. On the 3-meter diving board, Staley placed 7th with a total of 411.80 points. Freshman Dale Heuser finished 20th in the 3-meter competition. Staley received 6th place in the 1-meter diving event with a point total of 427.15.

MIAA foe UMSL in a Tuesday afternoon double-header at the UMR baseball field.

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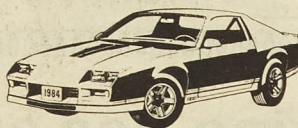
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Groundwaves

Department as one of six Missourians outstanding in their dedication to highway building in modern times; the National Notary Association Award for his leadership in reforming the state's notarial statute; the Harry S. Truman Special Recognition Award for public service from the City of Independence; and the Sigma Tau Gamma Distinguished Achievement Award and recognition as one of the nation's top "Taus."

The primary visual elements in the UMR Chancellor Medal are the intertwined initials "UMR," the word "Rolla," a circle and a triangle. These elements symbolize the excellence of the institution and its completeness, continuity and stability.

The initials indicate the closeness of the relationships that exist between the University, the state of Missouri and the Rolla community. "Rolla" indicates the identification of the word and town with UMR since its founding as the University of Missouri School of Mines and metallurgy in 1870. The circle indicates the University's completeness and continuity, while the triangle, which ties all of the other elements together and which traditionally has been an engineering symbol, represents the mission of the University (education, public service and research) and the UM-Rolla's three academic units (Arts and Sciences, Engineering and Mines and Metallurgy).

The medal was designed and executed by Robert V. Wolf, professor of metallurgical engineering and assistant dean of the School of Mines and Metallurgy.

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
