# On UMR's excellent intercollegiate sports program

Dear Students,

I am very pleased to be invited to write a monthly letter addressed to UMR students through your Miner newspaper.

Your opinions are important to me, and it is my plan to discuss topics of interest to you both in this column and at my "Brown Bag Lunches," to which you are invited. (Be sure and mark Oct. 2 on your calendar for the second "Brown Bag Lunch" to be held from 12 to 1:30 p.m. in the Mark Twain Room,

University Center-East. Bring your own lunch; coffee, tea and soda will be provided.)

Because this column coincides with football season, I would like to talk a minute about the men and women who take part in UMR intercollegiate sports.

UMR has an excellent intercollegiate sports program, and I am very proud of the accomplishments of our scholar/athletes, on the field and in the classroom. As I quipped to the UM Board of Curators at the last meeting, "Miner athletes pass calculus as well as the football."

During the spring semester, 18 percent of all UMR intercollegiate athletes made the honor roll. Their grade point average was 2.73. Sixteen of them made straight A's.

Some of the sports sporting the highest GPA's included women's cross country with a 3.7; men's swimming with a 3.13; and men's cross country and tennis, each with a 2.87.

During the last academic year, Dave Moellenhoff, a six-foot eight-inch center for UMR's basketball team, was named to the GTE/College Sports Information Directors of America

National Academic All-American Basketball Team. And, 15 of the top 30 male scholar-athletes in the MIAA were from UMR, while 2 of the top 20 female scholar-athletes were from this campus.

All of this is in addition to the fact that the UMR football team, last year, once again led the conference in the total defensive yards allowed. The UMR swimming team finished eighth in the nation in the NCAA's Division II—the highest finish ever for a Miner swimming team. And UMR's Ryan Sharkey became the first Miner to earn

All-American status in track and field for his performance in the javelin throw at the NCAA Division II Track and Field Championships. Sharkey finished seventh nationally with a throw of 201 feet, 6 inches.

We're proud of our UMR scholar-athletes and their coaches. This is a good month to salute them.

I shall look forward to writing my next column in a month for you UMR students.

The program will make quarterly cash awards ranging from \$10 to \$50 to persons submitting suggestions that are implemented and prove to be beneficial to the University.

An annual awards dinner will be held to honor individuals submitting the ten best suggestions from the previous calendar year.

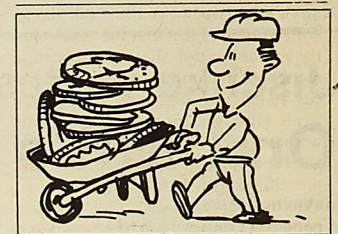

**UMR sophomores** interested in a career in government service at the federal, state or local level are invited to apply for a 1987 Harry S. Truman Scholarship. Established by Congress in 1975, the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation operates an ongoing educational scholarship program designed to provide opportunities for outstanding U.S. students with potential leadership ability to prepare for careers in government service. In April 1987, the Foundation will award 105 Scholarships nationally. The DEADLINE for all 1987 applications is Dec. 1, 1986. UMR can nominate three students for the 1987 competition. The scholarship award covers eligible expenses up to \$6,500 per year for the junior year, the senior year, and two years of graduate study. To be eligible, students must be full-time sophomores working toward or planning to pursue a baccalaureate degree, have a "B" average or equivalent, stand in the upper fourth of the class, and be a U.S. citizen or U.S. national heading toward a career in government. Interested students should submit a letter of application, a statement of career plans, a list of past public-service activities or other leadership positions, a current transcript, and a 600-word essay discussing a public policy issue of their choice to Professor Donald B. Oster, Truman Scholarship Faculty Representative, 124 H-SS Building by Oct. 31, 1986.

**Students wishing to receive additional financial aid** (College Work Study or long-term loan) should inquire in the Student Financial Aid Office, 106 Parker Hall, anytime from Sept. 15 to Oct. 3. Students wishing to be considered for additional financial aid must have an established need as determined by a 1986-87 ACT Family Financial Statement. Students with the most need will be awarded financial aid first.

## UMR Library serves campus

Even though it is passed every day and used frequently by the student body, it is not appreciated as the fine institution that it is. I'm referring to the UMR library. Not only is the library well run, but it is also serviced by a hard-working staff. To find out more about the library, I talked with Jean Eisenman, assistant director for public service.

As Ms. Eisenman's title implies, she is in charge of public service. Her main role is to interact with the public which includes students, faculty, and townspeople. She also is responsible for the circulation desk, reference section, and the inter-library loan. Ms. Eisenman's counterpart is the assistant director for technical service. This person is in charge of preparation of books and cataloging. At present, there is no technical director.

Besides the directors, there is also a staff of industrious librarians and student assistants. The librarians are responsible for acquiring and arranging new

material. They also perform a teaching role by helping students find research material and by providing teacher files upon request.

Over the summer, the entire library staff undertook a major project. Fifty staff members working twenty hours a week bar-coded every book in the library. By bar-coding the books, they have made the process of checking books out more efficient.

The UMR library serves as a testing ground for all the University of Missouri campuses. As a result, the UMR library is the first to use the technical equipment which it has. For the past three years, all the books in the library have been put on computer, eliminating the need for a card catalog. Presently, they are working on a software system for better circulation of books. This will make checking books out more efficient.

Next time you're in the library, find out more about it. The library can be used as a study aid to help your academic success.

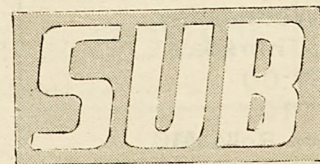
• Oct. 4, UMR Triathlon:

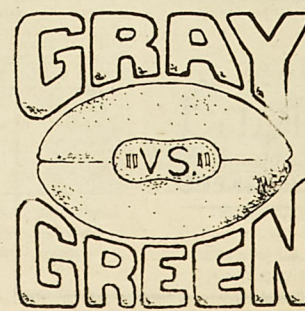


## The St. Pat's Board challenges IFC

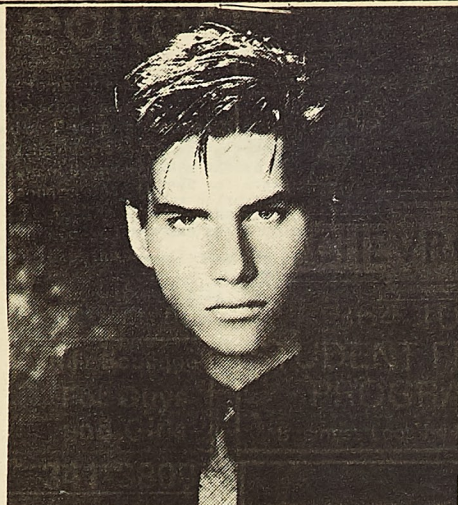

### UMR beats Evangel with help from Zacny

Jim Zacny, the kicker for the UMR football team was a key factor in helping defeat Evangel College Saturday in a nonconference game, 40-28. Jim Zacny, still only a sophomore, tied two school records Saturday. Zacny kicked four field goals to tie the UMR single-game record. He also tied the Miner career field goal record with 17. Zacny has two and one-half seasons left to demolish this record.

Last year Jim kicked 12 field goals and was ranked seventh in the NCAA Division II among place kickers.

The Miners, frustrated about their 37-14 loss to Pitt State a week ago, went after Evangel College right at the outset of the game last Saturday.

The Miners looked very strong on their opening possession, taking it to the Evangel Crusaders and driving them down the field to the ten-yard line. The Crusaders were shut down on offense decisively as the Miners stopped them cold on their first possession. Then the Miners went back to work scoring on

their next possession on a three-yard run by Lafayette Gatewood, who replaced injured Tom Reed.

Evangel got back into the game quickly when quarterback Danny Bowman launched a 69-yard pass to Randy Feazell. This set up an eight-yard scoring pass from Bowman to Pat Moran. The score went to 14-7.

It was all UMR after this, scoring 17 unanswered points before the half ended. UMR went into halftime with the score 31-7.

Evangel tried to rally, scoring a touchdown in the third quarter and a pair of touchdowns in the fourth quarter. But kicker Zacny kept pace with the crusaders, kicking four consecutive field goals for the Miners. He hit one in the second quarter, two in the third quarter and one in the fourth quarter, killing any hopes of Evangel making a comeback. UMR won the game 40-28.

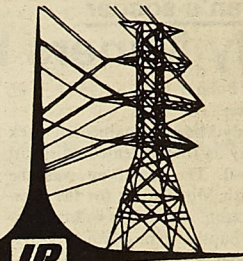

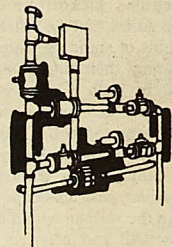
