Rain, Rain, go away . . . and don't come back

Heavy rains fell across nearly all of the Midwest last week, dropping up to two feet of rain in some areas. The torrents caused some of the worst flooding ever, claiming 13 lives and forcing over 50,000 people from their homes.

Closer to home, the rains also caused major flooding from lakes and rivers, with some of the worst hit areas being the Missouri cities of Hermann and Cedar City. The floods in these cities, especially, were caused not only by

some of the 91 broken levees in the area, but also by the necessary decision of some engineers to open overflow valves to relieve the problem of swelling lakes and reservoirs. Another director result of broken levees and overflowing lakes was the closing of Interstate 70 at different times between Kingdom City and Kansas City.

The deluge of rain caused nearly every major river in the area to leave its bank. The Mississippi River at St. Louis reached its second highest point ever when it crested at 40.5 feet, 10.5 feet over its flood stage. The highest crest on record as 43.2 feet, and that

occurred in April of 1973.

Other points along the Mississippi were also well above their respective flood stages. At Clarksville, the crest was a 33.7 feet, 8.7 feet above flood stage. At Winfield, the river crested at 35.5 feet, 9.5 feet over its flood stage. In Grafton, the water reached 29 feet, a full 11 feet above its flood stage. In Alton, water was 10.5 feet over at 40.5 feet. South of St. Louis at Chester, Ill., the Mississippi was at 40.5 feet, about 8.5 feet over flood stage and at Cape Girardeau the water reached 43.5 feet which was 11.5 feet over.

Along the Missouri River, the water



reached 36.2 feet, some 15.2 feet above the flood stage at Hermann, and in St. Charles it was 12 feet above at 37 feet. On the Meramec River, the water in Pacific was 7 feet over flood stage at 22 feet, and in Eureka it was 8 feet over flood stage at 26 feet. It reached 25 feet in Valley Park, 9 feet above its flood limit, and the water reached 38 feet in Arnold, an incredible 16 feet over the flood stage.

The rain has apparently subsided for a while, and the predictions are for more dry weather, much to the relief of those people in low lying areas.

Student Council receives funding requests for 1987-88

Student Council has received funding requests for the 1987-1988 year. If all requests are granted by the Board of Curators, fees will increase \$8.95 for each full time student. However, this does not have to be the actual increase. You have the opportunity to cast your vote on the matter using the Student Activity Fee Referendum that you will receive from your Student Council representative or may be obtained at locations in the library and near the hockey puck.

Here is how the various organizations plan to spend your money: (NOTE: \$X.XX/FTE is funding increase in dollars per student based on nine thousand full time students in 87-88.)

Athletics: requesting an inflationary

increase of \$2.45/FTE for maintenance and institutional support. Athletics gives aid in grants to 175 students at UMR and entitles all students to use the athletic facilities, participation in intramurals and free admission to intercollegiate events hosted on our campus. 320 students are involved in sixteen sports, making it the second largest in the MIAA. Yet, there is only enough money to grant 64 of 99 full scholarships that may be granted, which is second to last in the conference. Even with a funding increase, Athletics will operate with a \$70,000 deficit.

Auxiliary Services: requesting an inflationary increase of \$1.45/FTE for operational expenses related to the University Center. Budget deficits caused by ongoing bonded indebtedness, inflationary cost,

declining enrollment, changes in usage fee structures, and metered utilities, necessitates greater income. Student Activity Fees represent 13% of the revenue and student income for the various service operations (Bookstore, Food Service, Game Room) is significant. The feeling exists that an inflationary increase would appropriately cover the student obligation to the University Center.

Cheerleaders: requesting a \$.15/FTE increase for new mats and insurance. As a new independent organization, the Cheerleaders are trying to minimize other insurance problems and increase safety by purchasing new practice mats. he Cheerleaders will be purchasing their own shoes and equipment.

Golf Course: requesting a \$.10/FTE

inflationary increase. the increase is to maintain the course while enrollment declines.

Intramural Sports Facilities: requesting an inflationary increase of \$.10/FTE for either new lights or a sprinkler system for the intramural fields.

KMNRR: requesting NO INCREASE. They will make do with current funding to help hold the line of Activities Fees.

Missouri Miner: requesting NO INCREASE. They can offset lack of funding through better management and advertising revenues, instead of increasing activity fee funding.

Rollamo: The yearbook is requesting a \$.50/FTE increase. It has been three years since the last increase. Declining enrollment with nearly constant publishing cost, while the staff has

been paid less than may other comparable campus jobs has forced a requested increase. Rollamo fees are paid only once a year.

Saint Pats Board: \$.05/FTE increase. No explanation was given in time for this article.

Student Council: requesting a \$.55/FTE increase to cover equipment purchases for other organizations and general higher operating expenses.

Student Union Board: requesting a \$.30/FTE increase. This increase is to fund fuller insurance coverage, a forced increase in projectionist's costs for the technical committee, re-opening of the

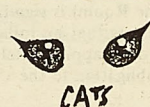

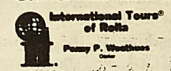

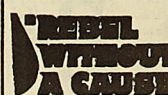

It is a federal violation to kill an unborn eagle. If one is caught killing an unborn eagle, one could be fined \$5000 and be sentenced to a year in

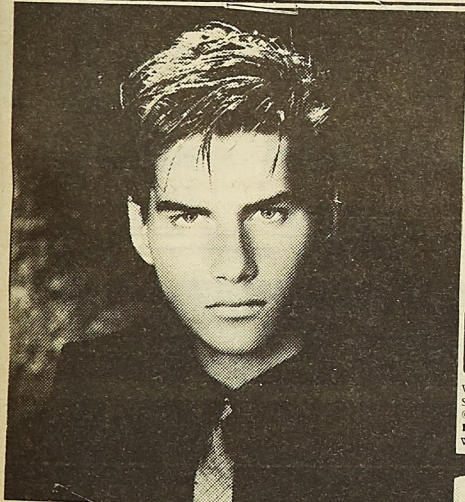

Defense excels in 13-3 Miner victory

The football Miners defense told the story in a mud match last Saturday, stopping Northwest Missouri Bearcats offense cold and posting a 13-3 victory.

The Miners cashed in on the turnover scoring on the first play from scrimmage on a 15-yard run by half-back Mike Vehige. This was all they needed, as the Miners went on to win

the game 13-3.

The win gave the Miners a chance to get back into the MIAA championship picture, giving them a 1-1 record in conference play and a 4-2 record overall.

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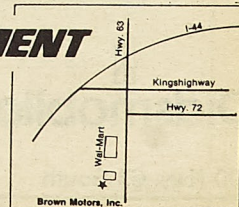
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Women's Soccer

Debbie Lewis matched Tieber by also scoring two goals, but her stand-out maneuver of the evening was a one-touch volley into the goal on a cross by Sally Puhlick.

UMR's fifth goal was scored by midfielder Mary Gasper, whose hard, solid shot proved too much for the goalie to handle.

The first victim to fall to the women on the road trip was Quincy College. Despite the Lady Hawks rousing cheer at the beginning of the game, they were defeated 2-1, as UMR came back from a 1-0 deficit. This match marked the first in a very long while that the Miners managed to come from behind to win.

After the Quincy goal, apparently a fluke that happened during the first few minutes at play, UMR went straight to work establishing their dominance.

Sally Puhlick scored the tying goal, dribbling through the Hawks' defense to put the ball away past the goalie at the end of her run. Some minutes later, forward Cathy Georgevitch booted a soaring shot that dropped right in behind the goalie and put the Miners up 2-1. At this point, it was just a matter of playing solid ball and making no mistakes for Quincy to capitalize on.

After a restful day spent in exciting Quincy, Ill., the women traveled to Kirksville to meet Northeast Missouri State University. The NEMO Bulldogs lost to UMR 4-2 in the home opener, and as the women have improved dramatically since then, there was no reason to think NEMO would prove too much to handle. This was indeed the case, and the Miners won easily 4-1.

Saturday was another fine day for Lisa Tieber, as she made two goals for UMR to begin the scoring. Debbie Lewis contributed a well-placed goal to make it 3-0, but the prettiest goal of the day was a Mary Gasper-Sue Shrum combo, on a free kick some 10 yards out to the right of the area. Shrum placed the ball at the far post to a wait-

ing Gasper, who headed the ball in past the keeper and two defenders.

NEMO did have the final say in scoring, though, as they deprived Missy Warfield of a shutout by scoring on a breakaway in the final minutes of the game.

The women travel to Texas this weekend, where they will meet Texas A&M and Hardin-Simmons College. But, the next time you can see the Lady Miners play is Sunday, Oct. 26, when they play the University of Louisville at 1 p.m.

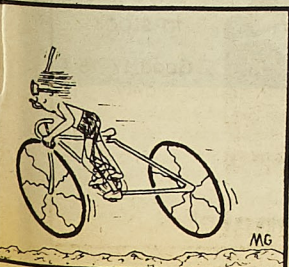
