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Harry S. Truman Scholarship offered to Missouri juniors

The University of Missouri-Rolla has an opportunity to nominate three students for a 1991 Harry S. Truman Scholarship, offered by the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation.

The foundation is a federally financed institution created as a living memorial to the President from Missouri. The foundation reflects President Truman's high regard for public service, his understanding of government, and his desire to enhance educational opportunities for all Americans. Specifically, the Truman Scholar-

ship Foundation is looking for students who are currently juniors who have outstanding leadership potential and who intend to pursue careers in public service. Nominees must also be citizens of the United States or United States nationals. In addition, nominees must be in the upper third of their class.

The scholarship is an impressive one. Each of the 82 scholars selected in 1991 (one from each state and the remainder selected at large) will receive up to \$30,000 for tuition, fees, books, and room and board expenses. Each scholarship winner will receive \$3,000 for the senior year of undergraduate education. Scholars in

graduate programs granting degrees in one to two years are eligible to receive up to \$13,500 per year. Scholars in graduate programs requiring three or more years of academic study are eligible to receive up to \$9,000 per year for a maximum of three years.

Potential nominees should contact UM-Rolla's faculty campus representative, Donald B. Oster, Associate Professor of History, Department of History and Political Science, Room 124, Humanities-Social Sciences Building (phone: 341-4817). Potential nominees should contact Dr. Oster no later than November 1, 1990, as the final submission date to the Truman Scholarship Foundation is December 1, 1990.

Lamar served on the staff of the State of Missouri Division of Finance as an assistant bank examiner, senior assistant bank examiner and bank examiner from 1975 to 1979.

Lamar and his wife, Melinda, are the parents of three daughters, Christina, Jennifer and Kathleen. He has been active with the Rolla Khoury League and the Rolla Area Girl Scouts.

International News Headlines--the week's events in review

SWEDEN AND NORWAY—Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev was awarded the 1990 Nobel Peace Prize for promotion of international peace, including championing political change in Eastern Europe and helping to end the cold war. Gorbachev, the first Communist head of state to receive the Peace Prize, brought sweeping political change to the Soviet Union and revolutionized the Kremlin's foreign policy since he came into power in 1985.

Two Americans and a Canadian captured the Nobel Prize in physics for finding nature's smallest known particle, the quark. Their research at the Stanford linear accelerator 20 years ago produced these subatomic particles that since have acquired the names Up, Down, Strange, Charm, Beauty, and Top. The Nobel prize for chemistry went to an American for developing simpler ways to make complex chemicals that "contributed to the high standards of living and health and the longevity enjoyed...in the Western world". Three Americans were awarded the Nobel Prize in economics for their central role in the development of finance economics as a scientific subject exposing the underpinnings of the financial markets that are the key to the success of a free mar-

ket economy.

PERSIAN GULF-A relatively quiet week in the Persian Gulf Crisis brought different interpretations among analysts. Some think it is a lull before the storm: that the United States must act soon if there is any hope of saving Kuwait after its having

been looted and essentially disassembled by the Iraqi military occupation. Others note that the U.N. sanctions are beginning to take effect and time may be all that is necessary. Iraq, which began the rationing of food last month, has now begun rationing gaso-

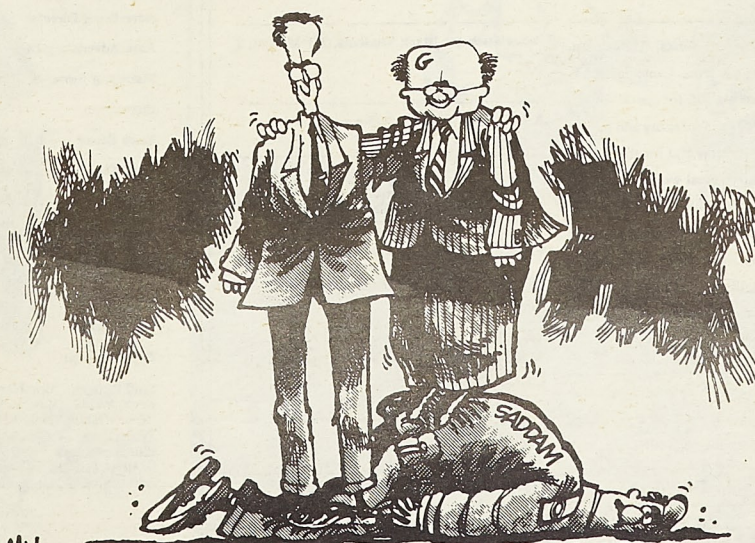
line as it lacks the chemicals necessary to refine its oil into more usable forms. Secretary of Defense, Richard Cheney, ruled out "partial solutions" to the Persian Gulf conflict and insisted that the United States would reject any compromise that leaves Iraq in control

of part of Kuwait. Without elaborating, Baker acknowledged that "signs" from Baghdad, the capital of Iraq, had indicated that Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein was seeking a compromise. Furthermore, Cheney asserted that the United States would keep forces in the Persian Gulf area as long as necessary to achieve its goals which include withdrawal of Iraq from Kuwait, restoration of the Kuwaiti monarchy, and assuredness that further aggression will not arise in the future.

ISRAEL: Twelve more deaths have been reported as Israeli police attempt to quell Palestinians in the occupied territories of the Gaza Strip and West Bank. The uprisings began last week when Israeli police fired on a crowd gathered at Temple Mount, one of the holiest sites in both Judaism and Islam, killing 19 Palestinians. Reportedly, the Palestinians staged a premeditated attack with stones on Jews gathered for a religious festival. Israel has refused to allow a United Nations delegation to investigate the killings, calling the need for a U.N. mission an "absurdity". The incident pits Israel directly against the United States, a long time ally. The United States had joined in the United Nations condemnation of the Israeli actions and even coauthored a resolution for this purpose. Israel is accusing the

"Disregard for fact"

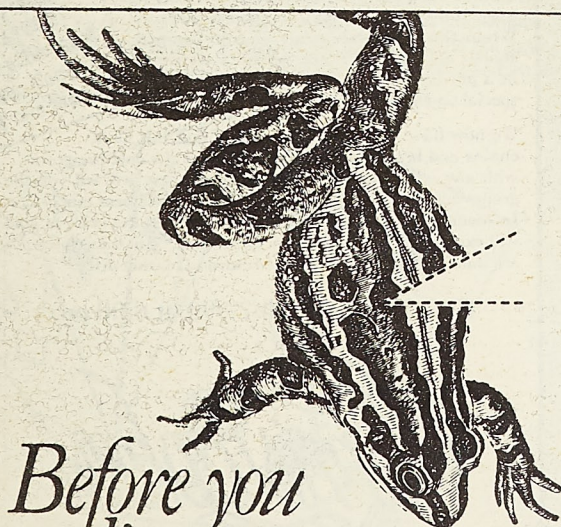
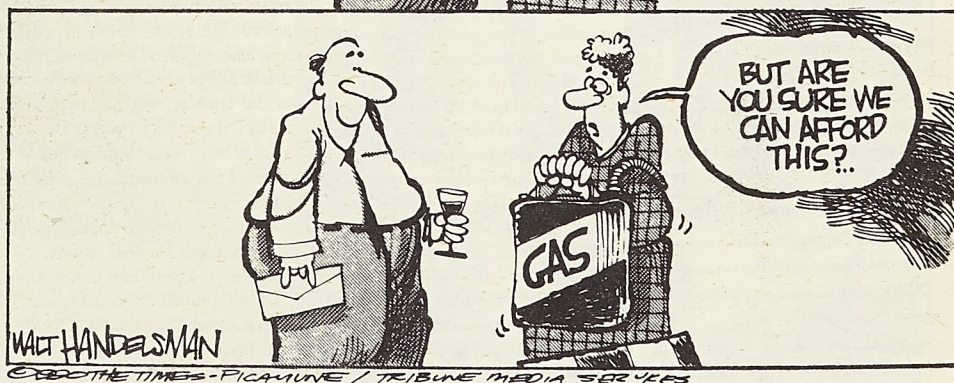
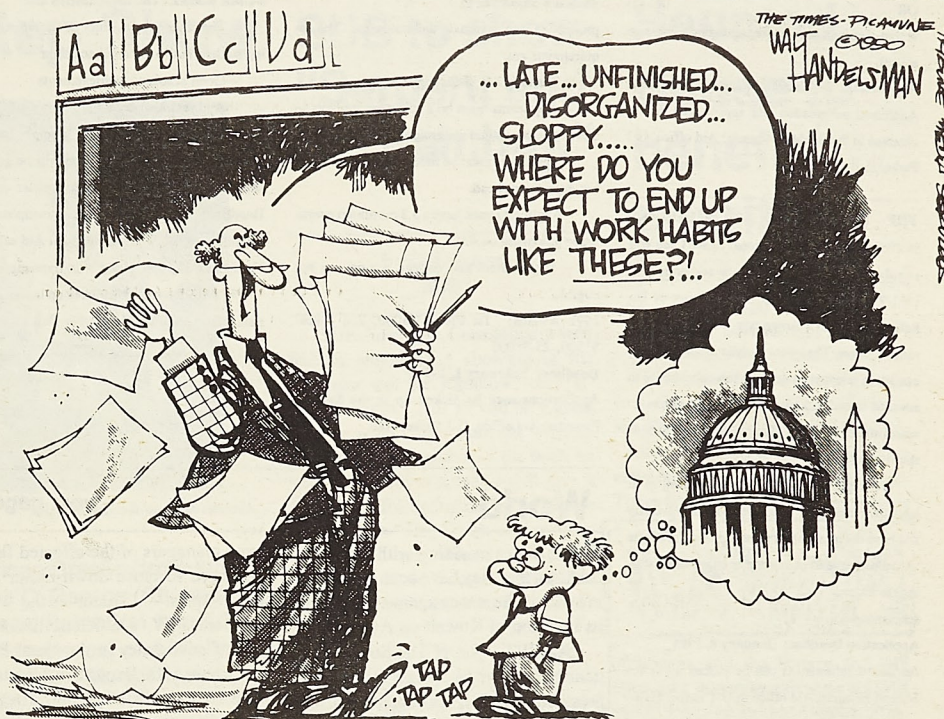

United States of siding with the Arab coalition that they have been cooperating with in the stance against Iraq since its invasion of Kuwait on August 2.

SOVIET UNION-The Soviet Parliament approved a plan set forward by president Mikhail Gorbachev to remake the Soviet Economy. The plan involves the selling of state property, legalization of entrepreneurial activities, and lifting of many government price controls and handing over many economic decisions to the governments of the country's 15 republics. The central government would retain control of transportation, communication, defense industries, energy, credit and monetary policy, customs, and regulation of prices on some raw materials and essential consumer goods such as bread and medicine. The plan was a departure from the 500 day plan proposed by a team of economists lead by Stanislav Shatalin in that Gorbachev's included no timetable. The Soviet leader said that the compromise was necessary to gain the favor of the disparate perspectives within the government bureaucracy. Boris Yeltsin, the President of the Russian republic denounced that Gorbachev's plan as a tactical retreat that would allow the central government bureaucracy to retain its monopoly on power indefinitely. The Russian republic has already approved the Shatalin 500-day plan, and the three Baltic states also favor it. Yeltsin, intent on implementing this plan, has reportedly stated his willingness to lead the Russian republic's development of its own army and unit of currency.

SOUTH AFRICA-In a reversal of long standing policy, the South African government implemented a law passed in June banning racial segregation in all publicly owned places such as parks, swimming pools, libraries, and toilets. The new integration does not apply to private establishments. This enactment leaves three pillars of apartheid intact: residential segregation, land ownership, and classification of every South African by race.


Some managers of the affected facilities chose to close down rather than serve blacks. Later in the week, president F.W. De Klerk lifted the state of emergency in the Natal Province where 5000 lives have been taken since 1986 in tribal fighting. The state of emergency was regarded as an obstacle in the progress toward equality because the African National Congress, led by Nelson Mandela, accused the police deployed to the Natal province, of siding with an antagonist group, the conservative Inkatha movement. The government has viewed an end of this rivalry, which pits blacks against blacks, as necessary before they can move on to the greater issue of fully eradicating apartheid.

LEBANON-A new Beirut may be arising in the aftermath of the eight hour operation ordered by Lebanese president Elias Hrawi last week that removed his primary opponent, Michel Aoun, from the presidential estate. With the opposing forces now neutralized, Hrawi is able to begin the implementation of a series of reforms that he hopes will allow peace to return to the country that has been ridden with civil war for 15 years. Hrawi has already ordered the dismantling of the Green Line, a mined and guarded man-made mound of earth transversing Beirut from North to South separating Christian and Moslem sectors. In the planning is a new form of government that will provide for equal representation between Christians and Moslems. The military operation that removed General Michel Aoun involved Syrian and Lebanese forces and left 350 dead and 1200 wounded. Aoun, the general of the Christian sector of the Lebanese army, declared himself president 11 months ago and took hold of the presidential estate. During the operation, Aoun fled to the French embassy where he has received asylum. Lebanon and France have been quarreling over the issue as Lebanon wants to hold Aoun for trial. Aoun has been flown to Paris with a French escort.

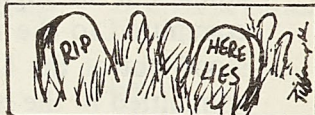

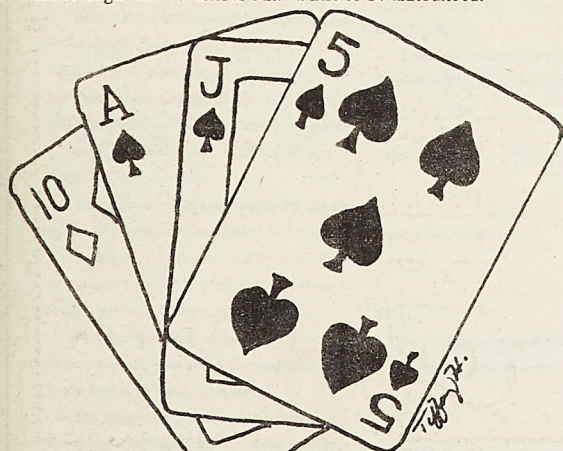

An Open Letter to the Students & Faculty of the University of Missouri-Rolla

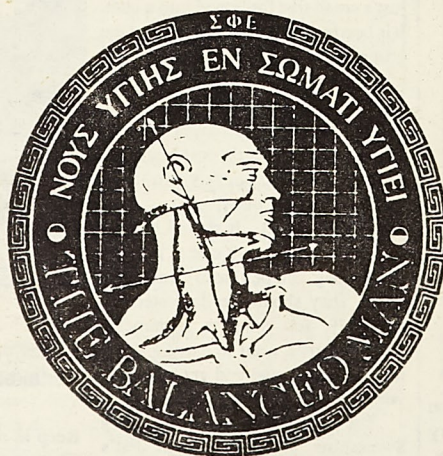

The purpose of this section is to inform the student body about major topics discussed at regular Student Council meetings held bimonthly at UMR.

The fourth regular Student Council meeting of the semester was held on October 16, 1990.

Reports of various committees included the possibility of Dr. Martin Luther King's Birthday becoming an official university holiday pending the Board of Curators approval, the Parent's Day registration table, and the next blood drive which is scheduled for November 14 and 15.

A motion was made for the passage of Resolution #9091R1 which will require the University to publish the summer schedule of classes by the second Friday in March of the winter

semester. This will allow students adequate time to decide between summer employment, co-op, or summer school. The schedule had not been available until mid-April in past years. The motion passed without any problems.

Bill #9091M2 dealing with the reorganization of office space in the University Center-West was also passed. Most notably rooms 213-214 will be designated as the Greek Life office and will accommodate the Interfraternity Council, Panhellenic, and Mark Patrofka, the Greek Advisor.

The last motion was made for KMNRR which needed \$20 from the equipment fund for a public address system upgrade. The request was necessary and the motion passed easily.

Finally, referendums on student activity fee increases benefiting several organizations were given to representative to distribute to their constitu-

ents. The purpose of the referendums is to give the student body a chance to voice their opinions on the spending of student activity fee money. These referendums are to be returned to your Student Council Representative or to the Student Council Office by October 23. Anyone not receiving a referendum should contact their representative or come by the Student Council office. The open forum for the appropriation of these fees will be on November 13th at Centennial Hall and will be open to the public.

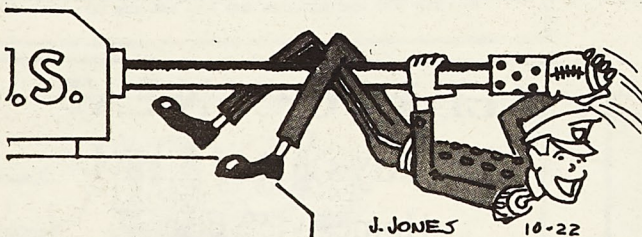
The annual Army-Air Force flag football game is scheduled to be held on Thursday, October 25th at 4:30 at the intramural fields. Here is what the combatants have to say.

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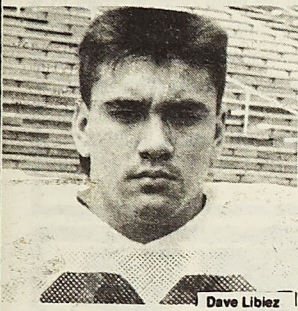

Cross Country competes in the conference meet

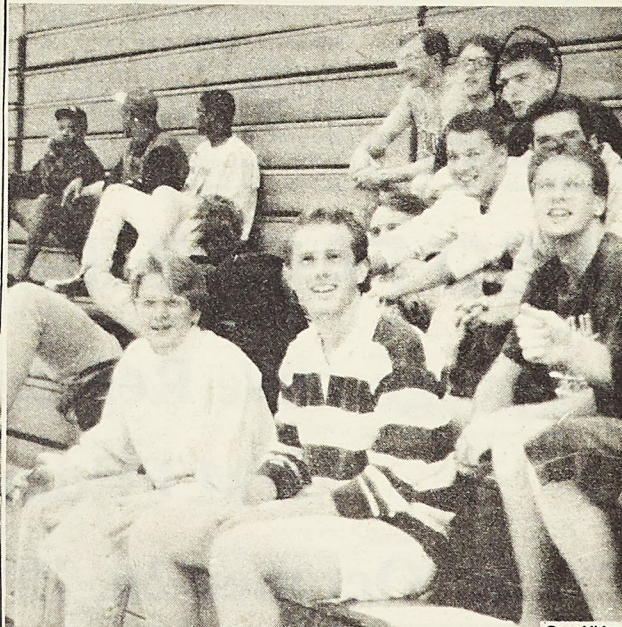

Next the aquajocks squared off against Texas A & M. The Aggies jumped out to a quick 4-0 lead before a rebound goal by Stus as time expired in the first quarter, thus giving the Miners the spark they needed. UMR overwhelmed a relaxed A & M team and took control of the game with an 8-1 barrage in the second period. The Aggies never recovered, as Rolla converted on its last five man advantage situations to preserve the 13-8 comeback victory. Rich Berger finished with four goals for the Miners, and additional offensive support was provided in the form of two goals apiece by Streb, Stus, Kuta, and freshman Paul Baudendistel. Fellow rookie Greg Houille finished the scoring by cranking in a penalty shot with one second left in the game.

Enid Water Polo Club then faltered under the pressure of UMR's relentless counterattack, fast-break style of play. Rolla exploded from the start and rolled up a 7-1 lead before the end of the first quarter. The Miners also took advantage of some sloppy defense in scoring on all four man-

advantage situations. Led by Stus' seven scores, the final score of 21-6 indicated UMR's sheer dominance of the entire game. Streb supplemented the offense with five goals of his own, including several powerful hole shots. Baudendistel frustrated the opposing goalie by lobbing in two of his four tallies. Junior Doug Cordier powered in two more points, while Berger, Houille, and Brian Klein scored single goals.

In their final contest, Rolla's defense again folded in the fourth quarter against host UALR. After hanging tough for three quarters and trailing



only 8-6, the Miners lost their composure and permitted Arkansas to run up the score to 16-7. Streb and Cordier each knocked in two goals, while Klein, Berger, and Kuta contributed single tallies in UMR's third loss this year.

For the tournament, the third-seeded Miners outscored their opponents 45-43 in raising their victory total to eight. Despite the questionable refereeing and poor lighting, Rolla plans to return next year with hopes of finishing even higher. The Water Polo Club played in the University of Indiana's tournament this past weekend, but results were unavailable for press time.

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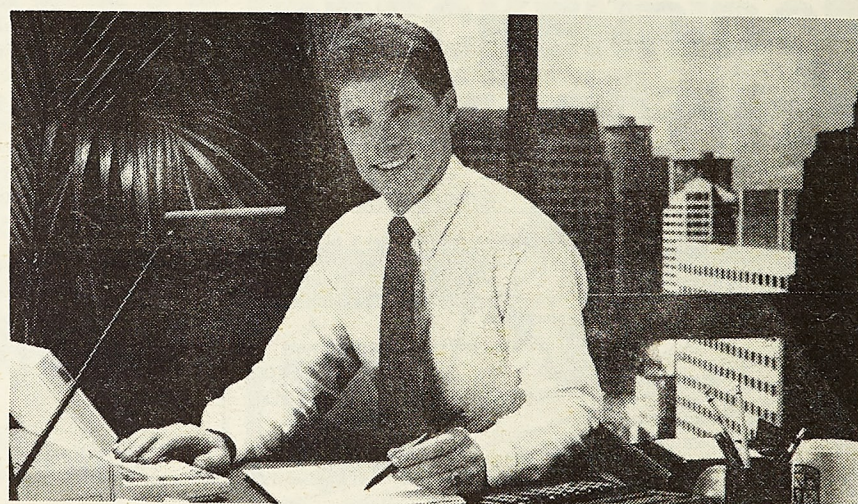

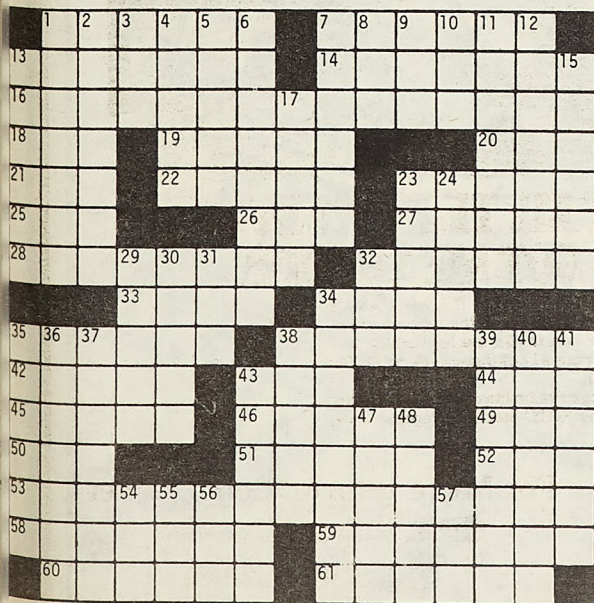

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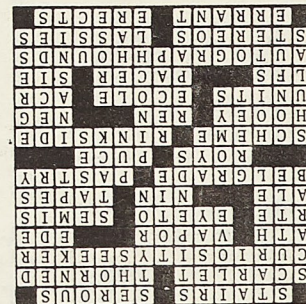
