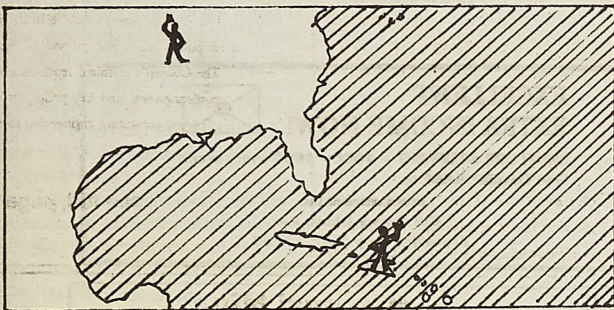

"A Run To Remember"

Rolla, Mo. — Even before the Vietnamese government's recent disclosures about U.S. servicemen listed as prisoners of war or missing in action, Air Force ROTC cadets at the University of Missouri - Rolla and other Missouri and Illinois campuses were planning a project to raise awareness of POW and MIA issues.

Cadets from the UMR Air Force ROTC's Arnold Air Society, along with Arnold Air Society squadrons from other Missouri and Illinois campuses, are coordinating an awareness

run titled "Freedom Run 1992: A Run, To Remember."

The run begins at 9 a.m. Friday, Nov. 6, with cadets starting from Kansas City, Mo., and St. Louis running toward the center of the state. At each starting line, two cadets carrying MIA-POW flags will begin the run, in which flags will be carried 270 miles across Missouri. A closing ceremony will be held at the Veterans Memorial behind the state capital in Jefferson City once both flags arrive at about noon Sunday, Nov. 8.

Each flag will be carried in one- to two-mile increments by Air Force ROTC cadets from UMR, University of Missouri-Columbia and St. Louis University's Park College in Cahokia, Ill.



UM-Rolla receives award for excellence

Rolla, Mo. — The University of Missouri - Rolla and two UMR faculty members have been cited by National Technological University for excellence in instruction.

NTU, based in Fort Collins, Colo., is a consortium of universities that

offers college credit courses by satellite.

UMR was one of the three institutions to receive the highest ranking possible from NTU during the 1991-92 academic year. A total of 35 institutions were ranked by NTU during the year.

In addition, two UMR faculty members — Madison M. Daily, associate professor of engineering man-

agement, and James Highfill, lecturer of engineering management — were among the 11 faculty members to receive NTU's outstanding instructor award. The award is based on student evaluations of 233 NTU instructors from the participating colleges and universities.

It was the third outstanding instructor award for Highfill.

SME awards grants to UM-Rolla

Rolla, Mo. — The University of Missouri - Rolla mechanical engineering department has received \$155,995 in computer-aided design software from the Society of Manufacturing Engineers.

The grant, from SME's Manufacturing Engineering Education Foundation, includes one Autodesk Au-

toCAD software gift, valued at \$3,995, and 15 seats of the Software Associates PowerCAM CAD/CAM software, valued at \$10,000 each.

In addition, the SME foundation provided UMR with \$2,000 to train two faculty members to use the software.

The SME foundation awards grants each year to spur new developments in manufacturing technology and productivity and to promote manufacturing engineering as an educational discipline.

ROLLA, Mo. — The University of Missouri-Rolla physics department is sponsoring a visitors night beginning at 7 p.m. Friday, Nov. 6, at the UMR observatory.

The event is free and open to the public.

The observatory is adjacent to UMR's Stonehenge replica High way 63 North, north of V.H. McNutt hall and west of St. Patrick's Lane.

According to John L. Schmitt, associate professor of physics at UMR and adviser to the Astronomy club, visitors may view the moon and Saturn, weather permitting, through the observatory's 16-inch telescope.

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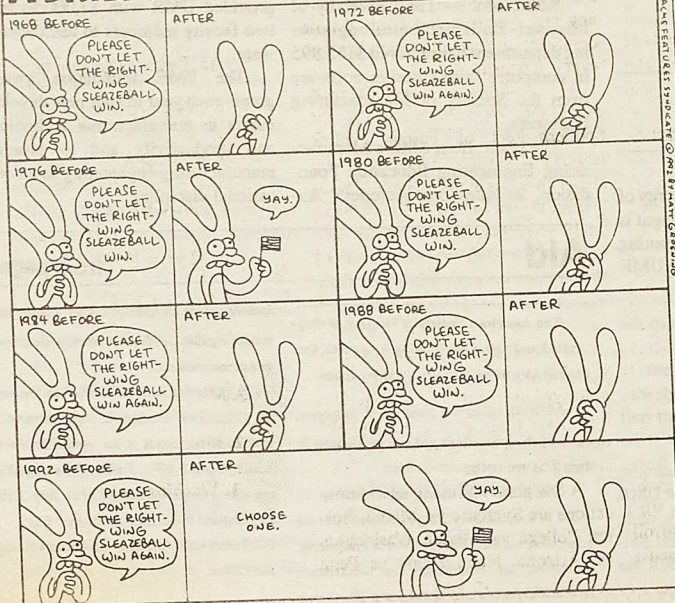

Conservative's corner

Since this is election week, it seemed like a good time to return to the themes of voting rights and voting participation. Judging from the responses published in the *Miner*, a lot of people seem to have somewhat missed the point of my last article on these topics.

My purpose in that article was twofold: first, to question our common assumption that broader voting rights means better government. Second, to suggest that perhaps low voter turnout is not a bad thing and urging higher turnout may actually be counterproductive.

It's worth remembering that most of this nation's greatest presidents — Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Jackson, Lincoln — were elected under far more restrictive voting qualifications than today. Consider that the last third of the 19th century, when eighty to ninety percent of registered voters went to the polls, produced a string of presidential nonentities. Who can name the achievements of presidents Garfield, Arthur, Benjamin Harrison, or Cleveland? Broadbased voting lowered the tone of the campaigns and the quality of the candidates to the lowest common denominator — not unlike what is happening today.

In this century, the expansion of the voting privilege does not seem to have produced an improvement in our government or its leaders. On the contrary, the United States is probably governed worse now than at almost any time in its history. Is this only coincidence? I wonder. Perhaps it is time to consider again making the vote a privilege, rather than a right; then it might be taken more seriously and responsibly.

I should make it clear here that I am no elitist. Basing voting on property ownership would still encompass most of the U.S. population (thank you, capitalism). But it would exclude those who, under the present system, have an incentive to vote irresponsibly. With a more restricted voting franchise politicians might be able to look at welfare and entitlement programs on the basis of whether they work, rather than how many votes they buy. The same argument could be applied to (say) college loans or farm subsidies.

What all this suggests is that low voter turnout may not be the terrible evil many people seem to think it is. If people don't care enough about their country to go to the (minimal) trouble of voting, why are we encouraging them? Their choices are unlikely to be responsible; in fact they are very likely to vote for the first name on the list. (Why do you think the local party-in-power always lists its own candidates first?)

There are some people who argue that since this is a democracy everyone should vote regardless, in the name of "popular sovereignty." This is the rationale behind Australia's fine for not voting. I would suggest that his view puts the cart before the horse, elevating the mere process of voting above the goal of good government. That kind of blind allegiance is a recipe for disaster.

Election day is over

Your advantage has never been greater. As a reader of this column on November fourth, you should know by now who has been elected President of the United States of America. In the unlikely event that one candidate did not receive 270 electoral votes, the House of Representatives will soon be called back into session - and I'll get one more week to criticize the candidates. Even with this great rift of time and knowledge between us - the author stuck in a kind of Stephen Hawking "election - before time", and the reader traveling in "election - after time", there still is one election year topic that is not rendered irrelevant by the passing of Election Day. Up to the time you cast your vote, and now a day or more afterward, you must have considered the big question "What exactly can the (new) President do to address my major concerns?"

According to the candidates' policy papers, debate statements, and other increasingly vapid rhetoric, the President can do it all. A Ginsu knife commercial is more modest than the "can do" posturing of this year's candidates! Is there any truth to the promises of a resurgent economy? Can the new President initiate appropriations (money) bills to fix Rolla's crackling telephone lines? Can he (neuter pronoun for you gender watchers) write and enact legislation to stimulate the economy? Can he give jobs to the hundreds of thousands of newly unemployed?

Conjure up another ten or so similar "Can he ...?" questions. Then answer all of them correctly with "no". The President can't initiate legislation, he can't declare war, and he can't magically fix the economy. So why are we electing a President? A desirable, truly effective President is a leader, who energizes the nation with a proactive and effective domestic and foreign policy agenda. He is empowered to appoint qualified individuals to critical Cabinet, State Department, and Federal Judiciary positions. If you conscientiously absorbed all of the political media coverage of the past year and applied this information towards your voting decision, you may have felt distinctly nauseous, perplexed, and even helpless. Even if your candidate did not win, congratulate yourself for fulfilling your responsibility to the representative democracy that is supposed to be yours.

It is refreshing to read an editorial in this paper which is not the horrid, misinformed, factually misleading, political soap-box rhetoric, I have come to expect of this "journalistic" endeavour. I am referring to Lee Hill's, October 28th editorial entitled, "Some critical thinking from the liberal's corner".

Due to this "new" level of thought demonstrated by a *Miner* staff writer, I felt compelled to reply and use my "newly discovered" critical thinking skills. Lee states, "The Bush '88 campaign has forever changed the feelings that *you* (emphasis mine) associate with the word "liberal", and with the acronym "ACLU". How presumptuous! This is exactly the sort of thing which the editorial berates so effectively. Let it suffice, that these terms underwent no significant change in meaning, either during nor after the 1988 campaign, for me.
