Dr. Lee W. Saperstein named new dean of UMR School of Mines and Metallurgy

ROLLA, Mo. — Dr. Lee W. Saperstein, chairman and professor of mining engineering at the University of Kentucky, has been named dean of the University of Missouri-Rolla School of Mines and Metallurgy, UMR Chancellor John T. Park announced on March 26.

Saperstein, who also is the director of graduate studies for mining engineering at the University of Kentucky, will begin his duties at UMR around July 1.

"Lee Saperstein is an experienced and accomplished academic leader whose background, administrative skills and proven effectiveness make him a superb choice for dean," Park said. "I am extremely pleased that

UMR will have a person of his stature leading the school of Mines and Metallurgy."

Saperstein fills a position held by former Dean Don L. Warner, who retired from the post last year. Warner has been dean of the school since 1981.

Saperstein was selected from 37 candidates received through a national search, said Dr. Dale Elifrits, who chaired the search committee. Elifrits is the associate director of UMR's Freshman Engineering Program and a professor of geological engineering.

"Dr. Saperstein's academic experience will no doubt help the School of Mines and Metallurgy, and the campus as a whole, move forward in its pursuit of excellence in education and research," Elifrits said.

Saperstein joined the University of Kentucky in 1987, after 20 years on the faculty of Pennsylvania State University.

At Kentucky, Saperstein has served as associate director of the

Center for Applied Energy Research, where he managed the clean-coal program, which had a \$600,000 annual budget. He also is the executive director of the Mining Engineering Foundation.

While at Penn State, he chaired the faculty senate and assisted with the development of the university's strategic plan. As chairman of the Engineering Accreditation Commission, he supervised the evaluation of 96 institutions with 369 programs.

Saperstein has conducted extensive research in mining production and the environmental and safety aspects of mining.

After graduating in 1964 with high honors from the Montana School of Mines, which named him a distinguished alumnus in 1990, Saperstein, a Rhodes scholar, earned a doctorate in engineering science from Oxford University in 1967.

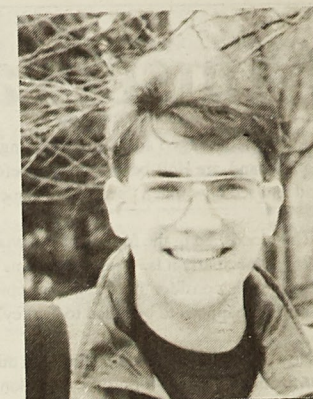

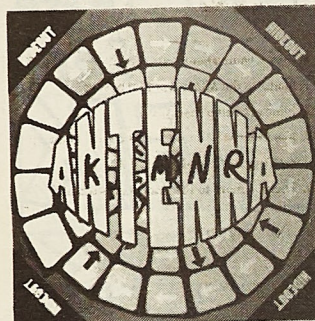

Pixies die by Black Stinging Antenna

When I heard the Blake Babies broke up, I was upset, I had just heard about the band, fell in love with their music, and then, POW! they were gone. However, it turned out for the good. Juliana Hatfield and John Strohm just needed to go separate ways. Their individual song writing was getting too good to keep in one band. Juliana went solo, and John formed Antenna with ex-Baby Freda Love. The result was two great bands for the price of one.



Antenna's latest, *Hideout* shows that the Blake Babies weren't just Juliana Hatfield's band. John Strohm has created an album which has a great

flow and very solid songs. (Freda Love is not on the album, but reportedly stills tours with the band.) From the psychedelic "Shine" to the grunge-U2 sound of "Grey St.", *Hideout* keeps me excited about Antenna the whole time. The album is filled with fuzzy guitars and catchy choruses. Antenna could just be a straight forward band, but Strohm adds little sound effects, original song writing, and even a toy piano to start "Easy Listening". To give you Blake Babies/Antenna virgins a hint, of current albums, *Hideout* sounds closest to the Lemonheads mixed with Soul Asylum only with a bit more depth.

Blake Babies fans will love this album. The slow side ("Dreamy") and the fast ("Fade") are still there. John Strohm has just gotten better since leaving the Blake Babies, and he has kept the sound pretty much in the same vein. (Unlike Juliana Hatfield who seems ben on being the female Dinosaur Jr.) I love *Hideout* by Antenna.

Album Review *Sting*

Ten Summoner's Tales

Ten Summoner's Tales finds Sting better off than his last album. The sound is more in line with *Dream of the Blue Turtles* and... nothing like the sun. Most of the songs on the album are simple and don't try to find a new style or incorporate too many outside styles. The one failure is "Love is stronger than justice (The Munificent Seven)". In it, Sting tries a country beat and jamboree style, and it just doesn't work.



The featured instrument on *Ten Summoner's Tales* is definitely the chromatic harmonica. In "Something the Boy Said", it's used like a saxophone, and "Seven Days" has a dueling harmonica rhythm section. The sound is really great. Sting also makes use of a lot of strings on this album. The big jazz names of his past work are absent from this album, but I don't miss them at all. The textures and depth of his music is still there as well

as the free flowing lines of jazz influenced phrases. Maybe he had it all along, or maybe he has learned. Either way, Sting has established a sound all of his own.

"If I ever Lose My Faith in You" is the first big single and is a typical Sting song. It flows like a single should, but as usual with Sting, the best songs on the album are the ones which seem to miss the airwaves. "It's Probably He" is a lovely song co-written by Sting with Eric Clapton and Michael Kamen. Sting adds a lot of imagery into the song through the music and the way he sings. It makes me glad Clapton didn't do the song.

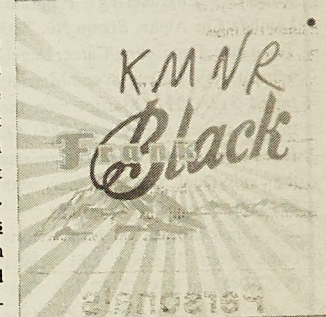
"Fields of Gold", "Seven Days", and "Shape of my Heart" are all mellow slow songs done with Sting's typical understated beauty and drama. "She's Too Good for Me" has the energy of "We'll be together" with a little mellow bridge thrown in the middle. "Epilogue (Nothing 'Bout Me)" is a fun, shouted chorus jam where Sting sets it straight about people who think they know who he is.

Overall Sting's *Ten Summoner's Tales* is a fun album. The songs which don't come off "just right" still sound like Sting is having a blast. The production puts Sting's voice to the front in the slower songs, and the mix of the whole album is great. Although I still think his first two solo albums are his best, *Ten Summoner's Tales* shows Sting at the top of his form.

Skinny Puppy - Too Dark Park 1990

Great. Disturbing, but great. This is probably my favorite album by one of my favorite bands. Skinny Puppy takes industrial over the edge, especially with this album. Some people call it torture-tech, and I can appreciate this, as this album is tortured, but great nevertheless. The lyrics are written in a sort of graphic, hard-core poetic fashion. The words are difficult to follow without the music, but the driving rhythms transform them into almost a chant.

I saw Skinny Puppy with Godflesh in St. Louis over the summer, and without a doubt it was the best show I've ever seen. It was a drama at its finest, weirdest hour. "Ogre" (lead singer Nivek Ogre) came out on stage as a sort of monster with organs hanging off him, some

trailing larger than life syringes. While not for everyone, Skinny Puppy's stage performance was certainly something to witness.

Too Dark Park begins with "Convulsion," a fitting title for what is probably the weirdest track on the album. It is bizarre to say the least, and it ends with a sample, "He feels very, extremely, terrible uncomfortable" (my sentiments exactly). The next track, "Tormentor," is one of the best on the album, and is considerably mellowed out from the first song. There is a 12" mix out (with a remix to "Nature's Revenge" on the flip side) which is even better than the album version. The next song, "Spasmodic," is about junkies living in an inner city tenement, with Ogre screaming "Kicking the habit," - pretty weird.

The next song is ok, but track 5, "Nature's Revenge," really stands out. It is something of an analogy between a violent storm and the dark corners of the human mind. Backed up by a pounding bassline, this song packs a

punch that's hard to beat. A sample drives the point the point home:

"Scared? Of who we are"

"I'm not scared..."

"Ummm... Where are you?"

"Grave Wisdom" is the next really good song with its mesmerizing rhythm. In the middle of the song a sample announces "We are in very serious trouble." The song that made fall in love with *Too Dark Park*, though, is "Morpheus Laughing." It's a song about the end of the world, either through nuclear devastation, or the destruction of the ozone layer (it's left open to interpretation, as are many of the other songs on the album). It's one of the hardest keyboard melodies I've ever heard.

If you have the inclination, or perhaps the stomach, to tolerate what Skinny Puppy has to offer, you may very well enjoy this album a great deal. On the other hand, if you don't like weird music, don't EVEN let your friends or neighbors buy this, because they WILL turn it up.

Miners take 2 of 3 from Lincoln

On March 27 the UMR baseball team got back into the swing of things with a doubleheader against Lincoln. The team had not played a game in 15 days because of the bad weather that has been here this spring.

The first game of the doubleheader proved to be a good one for the Miners. UMR pitcher Steve Zoll had a little trouble getting on track in the first inning with a walk and a hit batsmen, but Zoll settled down and escaped the inning with no runs. The Miners showed some offense of their own in the top of the first when leadoff man Tim Pruett singled and advanced to third on a single by Chad Fuesting. Pruett scored on a sacrifice fly by clean-up hitter Chris Leaton, making the score 1-0 UMR.

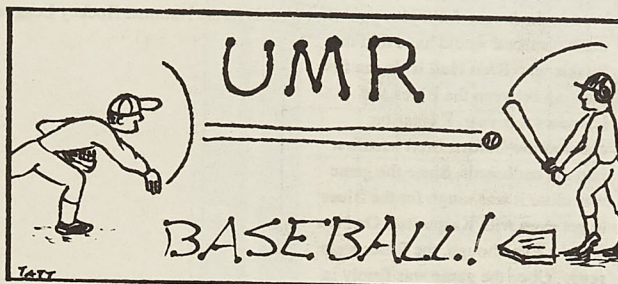
No more scoring was done until the 3rd inning when UMR added to their lead. The runs started with a triple by Fuesting with one out. Leaton then walked giving the Miners runners at first and third. Then Schultz, the Lincoln pitcher, balked scoring Fuesting and advancing Leaton to second. Next up for UMR was Tom

Hasenstab who singled scoring Leaton and giving the Miners a 3-0 lead.

The Miners picked up runs in the 6th, 7th, and 8th innings and ended up winning the game by a score of 7-0. UMR's Steve Zoll went the distance and got the shut-out and his first victory of the season. Zoll showed good control throughout the game with only 2 walks and 6 strikeouts for the game. Lincoln managed 7 hits but no runs for the game. The hitting stars for UMR were Pruett, 3 for 4; 1 RBI and Leaton, 2 for 3; 2 RBI.

The second game of the day was harder for the Miners than the first. Both teams had trouble getting the offense started in the early going. UMR got on the scoreboard first in the 4th thanks to a mistake by the Lincoln centerfielder. After a free pass to Chad Fuesting, Miner Chris Leaton singled and an error by the centerfielder allowed Fuesting to score. The one run was all the Miners could get in the inning.

Lincoln then answered back with 2 runs in their half of the 5th with a pair of singles followed by a double by Quinn, the number 3 hitter in the lineup. UMR was again helped by some sloppy play by Lincoln. With 1 out



Nathan Wade walked and advanced to second on a sacrifice. Then Wade moved to third on a wild pitch and scored on a passed ball making the score 2-2 after 5 innings.

In the 6th Lincoln again took the offensive. They scored 2 runs on 3 hits to take a 4-2 lead. UMR got one back in the 7th with a walk to Wade followed by a wild pitch and then a single by Jeremy White to score Wade. Lincoln put the game out of reach with 3 runs in the 8th and 2 more in the 9th inning. UMR got 2 of the runs back, but ended up falling short and losing 9-5. Jeff Mitchell got the loss for the Miners. The loss puts his record at 0-2 for the year. The main force behind the Miners offense was Gary Hubbard who was 2 for 3 with 2 RBI.

they got their only run of the game on a solo home run by their catcher, Bagby. The Miners got 2 more insurance runs in the 6th with a pair of singles, a walk, and a balk.

Jolly named to All-America team

Bill Jolly has won a number of awards while playing basketball at the University of Missouri-Rolla, but Tuesday he received the biggest award of all. The senior guard from St. Louis' Lutheran North High School was chosen to the 1993 Division II All-America third team by members of the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

Jolly, the all-time leading scorer at UMR with 1,920 points, was a first-team selection to the South Central all-district team and the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association all-conference team. He is the third player in school history to be named to the NABC All-America team, the others being Curtis Gibson in 1985 and Duane Huddleston in 1988.

"This is a tremendous honor for Bill Jolly," said UMR head coach Dale Martin. "It speaks highly

for what he has accomplished on the basketball at UMR. His competitive style made him a better player and his desire to win is unmatched.

"This also speaks volumes for the respect our program has earned over the last few years," he added. We have played a very challenging schedule that has included my Division I and top Division II teams. This enabled Bill to get good exposure in many regions of the country and I feel it has enabled him to get the recognition he deserved."

Jolly led the MIAA in scoring his season with an average of 22.4 points per game and finished his career in fifth place on the MIAA's all-time scoring list. Jolly also finished his final season with the Miners by setting Ten school records, two of which were also conference records.

Jolly was a first-team all-district pick after the 1991-92 season when he finished second in the MIAA in scoring. He was named to the All-MIAA first team after his junior year and to the second team as a sophomore, as well as to the

league's all-freshman team in 1989-90. Jolly was the only player from an MIAA team chosen to the All-America team and was one of two from the South Central region on the team. The other was Central Oklahoma's Alex Wright, who was named as the Division II "Player of the Year."

During the 1992-93 season, Jolly was named the MIAA's "Player of the Week" three times and earned NCAA Division II "Offensive Player of the Week" honors from *Basketball Gazette* for the week of Feb. 22-28. He was a pre-season All-America selection by *Division II Bulletin* and *Street and Smith's*.

"I really hope that Billy's success here at UMR as a student (he is majoring in chemical engineering) and an athlete has laid the groundwork for other student-athletes to follow," Martin said. "We have a top quality program and Bill has had a lot to do with it."

The Miners finished the 1992-93 season with a 16-11 record and tied for fourth in the MIAA with a 10-6 record.
