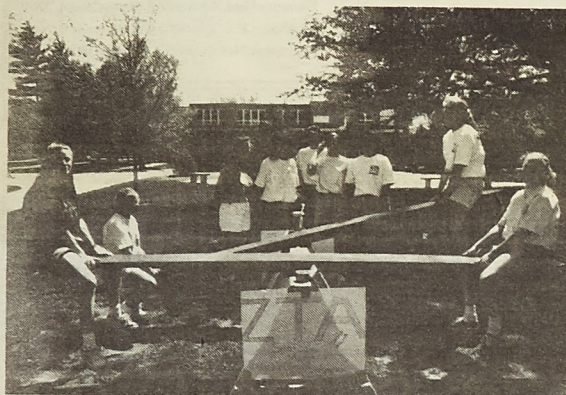

Zeta Tau Alpha raises money for breast cancer research

Why were Zeta Tau Alpha members seen see-sawing in the middle of campus last week? It was part of a nation-wide campaign for April's "Don't Be a Fool" Breast Cancer Campaign sponsored by the National Zeta Tau Alpha Foundation.

In 1980, Nancy Brinker watched her 36 year old sister, a beautiful wife and mother of two, lose her battle with breast cancer. Susan Komen's deathbed request was that her sister "do something" to help other women facing this painful disease as not forgotten.

Eleven years after her death, the foundation established in her memory celebrated its tenth anniversary. Founded by Nancy Brinker,

the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation has become the country's preeminent educator for early breast cancer detection and one of the largest sources of private funding for breast cancer research in the United States. The foundation's mission is to achieve higher recovery rates for breast cancer victims by advancing education, treatment, and research.

The local Zeta chapter at UMR did their part by sponsoring a see-saw marathon on April 18 and 19 and their annual "Pie in the Face" fund-raiser in early March. The Zetas on campus collected pledges in exchange for half-hour slots of see-sawing and accepted donations both afternoons on campus. They also distributed shower cards with self-examination information to women at local stores and doctors' offices. Zeta Tau Alpha raised over \$1500 all of which will be donated to the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation.

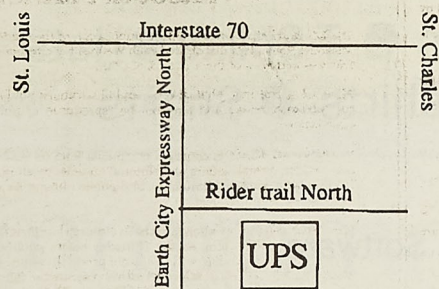

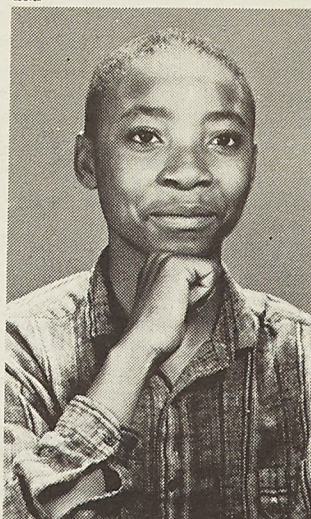

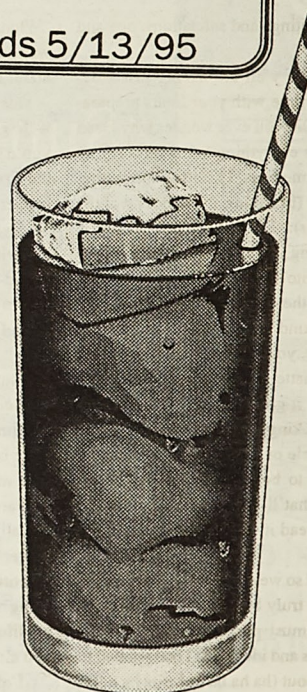

Steps to making your own homepage

1. Create a public_html directory in your home directory.
+ To accomplish this type: `mkdir public_html`

2. You now need to set Account Permissions.

Type `fs setacl . system:anuser l` to set privileges to your home directory.

This command will give any user on saucer or rocket list access to your home directory. This basically means that they can change directory into your home directory, but they cannot do anything without read permissions.

Then `fs setacl public_html system:anuser rl` to set privileges to your public_html directory.

This command will give any user on saucer or rocket list and read access to your public_html directory. This is necessary for your homepage to be displayed. Be aware, though, that read and list permissions give anyone the right to access any files in that direc-

tory. They cannot delete or write anything but they can view your files, so don't put any files that you don't want others reading in public_html.

3. Next you need to make your homepage.

Change into public_html via: `cd public_html`

Edit your homepage via: `pico index.html`

4. And, lastly, to access your homepage you need to do one of the following:

`lynx http://www.umn.edu/~(your userid) OR enter the URL http://www.umn.edu/~(your userid) into Mosaic`

Those are the easy steps to making a homepage. You can also accomplish all of this in one fell swoop by typing `~stuco/makehome`. This will do all of the above steps and then allow you to personalize a generic homepage. To

1995 Season Comes To A Close For UMR Baseball Squad

The UMR baseball team completed its season last week on a low note as the Miners fell twice to Missouri Baptist College. The Miners' overall record for the 1995 campaign was 14-28, including a 3-16 conference record and a 3-3 record in the Gulf Coast Classic down in Panama City, Florida.

Junior left fielder Nathan Wade earned honors for his efforts at the plate as he led the Miners in batting, hits, and doubles. Wade hit .333 with 46 hits and twelve doubles.

Senior center fielder Chad Fuesting, among the MIAA leaders in stolen bases, swiped 21 bags this year while also leading the team with 150 at-bats and four doubles.

Right fielder Dan McGinnis, a junior, led the team in RBI by driving in 33 of his UMR teammates, and freshman outfielder/DH Matt Bryant led the team in homeruns with five and in slugging percentage with a .500 average. Freshman shortstop Vince Como

led the Miners with a .462 on base percentage.

On the mound, senior right hander Allen Jones paced the Miners in almost every category, leading the team in innings pitched with 63 2/3, wins with five, complete games with five, ERA with a 4.38 average, and strikeouts with 50. Freshman Matt Bryant led the team with two saves.

In the field, sophomore catcher Mike Williams had the highest fielding percentage at .978. Freshman second baseman James Van Iten and Nathan Wade also had fielding percentages above .970.

As a team, the Miners hit for a .273 average, scored 241 runs, had a team ERA of 5.97 and a fielding percentage of .931. Comparatively, UMR opponents managed a .293 batting average while scoring 279 runs, posting a 4.90 ERA, and earning a .948 fielding average. Next year the Miners will return more than ten players.

The team of Troy Pinkerton (Sikeston, Mo.) and Aaron Mehrer (Greenwood, Mo.) finished with a 144, while Matt Henry (Topeka, Kan.) and Bill Keuss (Glen Carbon, Ill.) posted a score of 147.

Pinkerton shot a 27-hole score of 117 to place in a tie for 10th place after the first day of the MIAA Championships Monday in Osage Beach, Mo., while Panka checked in with a 120. The Miners, who were in last place after the first day of

The 1995 softball season will end prematurely for the University of Missouri-Rolla Lady Miners, as a 1-5 weekend in Shawnee, Kan., prevented them from qualifying for the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association Tournament.

As a result, UMR's final games are scheduled for Wednesday at Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville. This game was not on the original schedule, but the teams scheduled the twinbill last week after McKendree College (whom UMR was supposed to host Wednesday) had to back out of games with both schools due to a glut of make-up games in its conference.

With this being the final outing of the season for UMR, several players hope to finish some work on the record books.

Shortstop Melanie Rohrer (Boulder, Colo.) will be looking to extend her records for runs scored (44) and hits (54), while she attempts to break the record for stolen bases. Rohrer currently has 23, which matches the mark she tied as a freshman.

Left fielder Kristan Kiverland (Park, Kan.) already holds the single-season mark for runs batted in with 36 and also set a single-game mark for hits in a game with five in March. She still has an outside chance at the career RBI mark, as she needs six to tie Teresa Dickenson's record of 88. Over the weekend, King became only the second Lady Miner in history to amass at least 150 career hits.

Center fielder Nicki Wray

(O'Fallon, Ill.) will attempt to extend her record for doubles, which currently stands at 18. Wray, who was ranked 12th in the nation last week in that department, is also among the team leaders in several offensive categories.

Second baseman Brandy Broeckling (Florissant, Mo./Hazelwood Central) is attempting to finish the 1995 season without an error at her position. Broeckling has handled all 128 chances this season without an error and if she gets through Wednesday's twinbill without one, she will establish a new MIAA record for fielding percentage based on number of chances.

If the Lady Miners can at least split Wednesday's doubleheader, they will also assure themselves of their third straight winning season and fifth straight season of at least playing .500 ball.

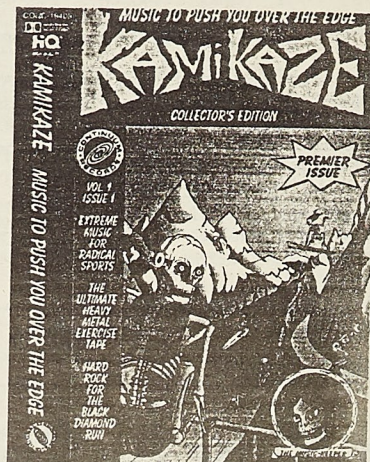

Kevin McMahon is PRICK. What Mr. Reznor saw in Kevin is obvious in his music. He signed him to his per-

duced and engineered the 1st, 3rd, 4th, and 5th tracks. Trent says "Everything that PRICK writes sounds...wrong." The other six tracks were produced by Wayne Livesey (The The, Midnight

Oil, Jesus Jones). Wayne said "PRICK has an unrealistic and romantic idea of what their music means: very strange." The album was mixed at the Church and the Rak by Alan Moulder (Smashing Pumpkins, NIN).

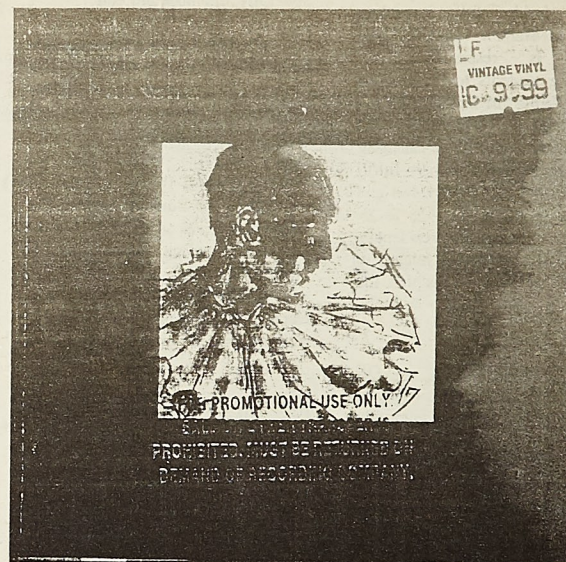

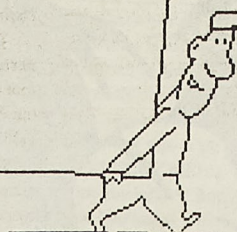
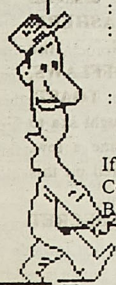

FLOWERHEAD
The People's Fuzz
Zoo Entertainment

Hailing from Austin, Texas, **FLOWERHEAD** is making heads turn with their second album. *The*

People's Fuzz. **FLOWERHEAD** is Eric Faust (lead vocals, bass), Buz Zoller (guitar and vocals), Eric Schmitz (guitar and vocals), and Kyle Thomas (drums and vocals).

This cd opens very powerful and penetrating with *Words To You* and *No Meaning*, respectively. As far as I can tell, *Words To You* is actually a song about alcoholism. "Open to sugges-

tion, let your questions fade away," signs Eric Faust. This song maintains an abstracted melody and lyrics, throughout. The chorus' hard drive is just enough to bring you just back before you slip too far away - very tasteful.

No Meaning is the first song that I heard from this band, and, incidentally, the reason that I decided to do a review. The melody is very catchy (no, don't say pop, 'cause you'll be WRONG) and has a way of rooting in your subconscious, so hours later you'll be humming this tune saying "God, that is so familiar!" Except for a quick glimpse of the single "Plowed" on MTV's Alternative Nation, I hadn't heard much about Sponge, a new band out of Detroit.

Leave it to Kennedy, though, to steer me toward the path of all that is cool. The song rocked, and their debut CD *rotting pinata* is out and selling for about 10 bucks in most places. With a price tag barely into double digits, I figured I couldn't go wrong, so I grabbed the disc and marched proudly to the Wal-Mart counter.

As it turned out, I was immediately impressed with and drawn into the music of Sponge. Their sound is a bit of a contrast of the sugary pop hooks of other songs. The overall mood is dark and plodding, with most of the record reminding me of a mellow version of early Soundgarden. No one instrument dominates on the record; nothing is overdone. The music is subtle and the

band seems to lay off and let the sounds bleed together into quality songs. The words of Sponge's vocalist, Vinnie, are delivered in the same low-key style. The man is a talented singer, able to use his excellent voice to complement the band, not drown them out. The band as a whole realizes that music can be emotional and dramatic without screaming vocals or blistering guitar riffs. Even though a couple of the songs, "Plowed" and "Rotting Pinata", may keep you mosh fans happy, Sponge really offers ten thoughtful, creative songs to listen to rather than anything danceable.

Faced with writing another music
review for the *Miner*, I had these two
choices: review the new Dokken tape,
or pick something of my own. Since I
am here to give you the most value for
all the effort you go through to pick up
your free copy of the *Miner*, I decided
to review both. If you remember the old
Dokken, you know the new Dokken.
(PS to the Dokken virgins: they suck.)
Anyway, I chose to evaluate Mad Sea-
son, a side project of Layne Staley of
Alice in Chains and Mike McCready
from Pearl Jam. I am usually skeptical
about independent projects, because
one man tends to steal the show and
ruin the record, but I am a huge fan of
Layne Staley and was curious to hear

the sound.

The basic result of this Seattle
union is cool, but predictable. Layne,
who usually sings the songs written be
Chains' guitarist Jerry Cantrell, wrote
all the songs for Mad Season, and his
distinctive voice has never sounded
better. Most of the songs are very laid
back, and he sings them with strength
and passion. I can't remember the title
of the first song, but it is one of the best
on the record. "River of Deciet," the
single released for radio airplay, is
another tune that displays the cd's per-
fect blending of the styles of Pearl Jam
and Alice in Chains. McCready, the
Jammers' lead gutair player, takes a
break from the sloppy, garage-band
mood that has dominated his last two
records and ends up with some smooth,
polished, flowing riffs for Above. This
is his finest playing since Ten.

The only argument I have against
the performance aspect of Mad Season
is its unoriginality. Every song on the
record has already been done, basi-
cally, by either Pearl Jam or Alice in
Chains. It marks Staley's first try at
writing an entire record, and it is obvi-
ous that he was more or less in charge
of the Mad Season project, so I think
that the style of the record is a product
of his taste in music. I'm not sure what
he could have done that would surpass
all the different ground covered by
Alice in Chains, but I think that the
idea of McCready and Staley collabora-
ting gave me hopes that were much
too high. In reality, the record is one of

the best I've heard, but unless you are
a big fan of the singer, you won't find
Above any different from Jar of Flies or
an older release, Sap.

Nobel prize winner in physics to speak at UMR

Dr. Russell Hulse, winner of the 1993 Nobel Prize in physics, will give a lecture titled "The Discovery of the Binary Pulsar" at 4 p.m. Thursday, May 4, in Room 104 of the Physics Building at the University of Missouri-Rolla. The event is free and open to the public.

Hulse, a research physicist at the Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory, will give the same lecture at UMR that he gave at the Nobel Prize

ceremony in Stockholm.

While in Rolla, Hulse also will meet with UMR students and is scheduled to visit a science class at Rolla High School.

A relatively young Nobel laureate (Dr. Hulse is only in his mid 40's), he did his Nobel Prize-winning research while a graduate student at the University of Massachusetts. During that time he discovered the first binary pulsar, which physicists use to study the effects predicted by Albert Einstein's theories of relativity.

Hulse's visit is sponsored jointly by UMR's physics department and UMR's Visiting Distinguished Lecturer program.
