## St Louis Symphony Orchestra plays at UMR

On Tuesday, September 19, 1995, the town of Rolla, Missouri was graced by the presence of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra performing at Castleman Hall. The program began just after 8:00 pm and lasted for two solid hours.

Before everyone was even seated, there was a mild uproar as the management searched the town of Rolla for a substitute tuba. Lacking door keys to obtain equipment from band storage at the university, the orchestra was forced to turn to the high school to provide the needed instrument.

As starting time approached, Leach Theater filled to a standing room only crowd. The attire ranged from full



suits to shabby T-shirt, but nothing drew from the world class performance conferred by the Symphony Orchestra.

Leading the ensemble, Leonard Slatkin displayed his masterful ability

to lead the symphony in imaginative, spirited works. After 15 seasons as music director, Slatkin will step down at the end of the 1995-96 season and takes the title of Conductor Laureate.

The scheduled program included the "Overture to *Candide*" by Leonard Bernstein, "Symphony No. 8 in B minor" by Franz Schubert, and "Symphony No. 2 in E minor" by Sergei

Rachmaninoff. Following these works, the audience was treated to a delightful encore.

Absorbing just portions of this display, one receives a tremendous dose of culture. Other events throughout the year may not match the notoriety possessed by the St. Louis Symphony, but they will elicit much of the same type of response.

### Metallurgical Professor Honored

The metals lab, located in room 244 McNutt Hall, was renamed the Robert V. Wolf Foundry and Metals Joining Laboratory last week in honor of Robert V. Wolf, retired professor emeritus of metallurgical engineering at UMR.

Wolf graduated with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering in 1951, and just a year later, received a master's degree also in mechanical engineering--both from UMR. Wolf went on to become a professor in the metallurgical department and stayed there until last year. Wolf retired from UMR in 1994 after serving at the school for forty years. Wolf has also served as President of the MSM-UMR Alumni Association in the past.

The laboratory was dedicated in a ceremony that was held on Wednesday, September 20, in McNutt Hall. Presiding at the dedication ceremony was Chancellor John Park. During the ceremony, Chancellor Park described Professor Wolf's many contributions to the campus. Robert Reesman, first vice president of the Foundry Educational Foundation (F.E.F) and president of Wells Manufacturing in Skokie, Ill., also participated in the ceremony. Also present were several representatives from the St. Louis Chapter of the American Foundrymen's Society and thirteen UMR students who are receiving scholarships from F.E.F. As part of the dedication ceremony, a bronze plaque was unveiled in Professor Wolf's honor.

After Wolf's retirement last year, an endowment fund at UMR was also started under his name. The Robert V.

### UM Board of Curators debate renovation projects

A meeting was held this past Friday, September 22 at the University of Missouri-Columbia campus regard-

ing building projects around the Rolla campus. The University of Missouri Board of Curators was presented with requests for more state funds to renovate and add to several buildings on campus.

An addition to the Butler-Carlton Civil Engineering Building is among the request list to the curators. This building was already on queue for a

41,200 square foot addition. But the university revised that plan to include another 41,400 square feet for office, classroom, and equipment space to the already existing 48,800 square foot building. This plan has a total cost of \$20,789,029. The university is requesting \$16,631,000 from the Uni-

FASTWEB is a freecuser-friendly service in which a student completes an online personal profile pertaining to his biographical information, including parent/student activities, background, and college/major information.

Upon completion of this profile, FASTWEB begins its search, and within minutes the student is presented with a detailed online list of outside grants, scholarships, fellowships, internships, and loans he is eligible to apply for. Approximately 1200 new awards are added to the FASTWEB database each day. FASTWEB automatically updates each student's profile based on these new awards. FASTWEB also provides a general information section describ-

## Foreign Language: A Real World Must

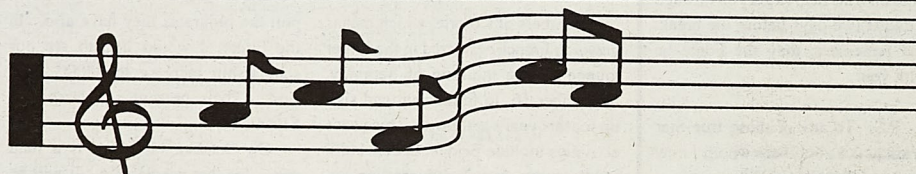

Charlie and his Sextet have put together a pleasant collection of music. They have an unpolished sound that I really like. The recording sounds like a really good live set, not ten over-produced "perfect" sounding songs recorded after countless efforts. The lyrics are sung with emotion. I can't really describe it, but I like the way the songs feel.

I never gave the band much thought until I heard an interview on a St. Louis radio station. I did not realize that Charlie Sexton was the lead singer, guitar, ... for one of my favorite bands, Arc Angels, they sounded like The Fabulous Thunderbirds, The Black Crows, and Stevie Ray Vaughn

rolled together. The only problem is they disbanded after their first self-titled cd. If you see it, I highly recommend it. But back to Charlie and the Sextet... he brings a little of this sound with the new band. To describe the new sound, I would say it is a combination of the Arc Angels, John Mellencamp, and Tom Cochrane. I know this is hard to visualize; you will just have to listen for yourself.

I think that Charlie has six people in his band because he wanted a sextet, not because he needed six musicians. Three of his sextet are background vocalists. 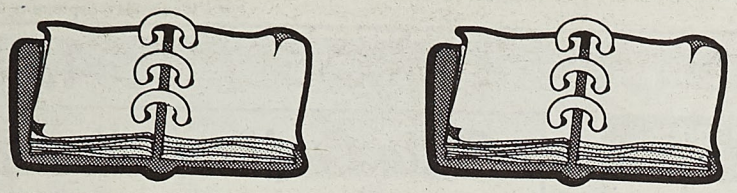
problem with money is that, once we get a little, we want more. The more we have, the more we want. Satisfaction remains a carrot on a stick, never fully attained.

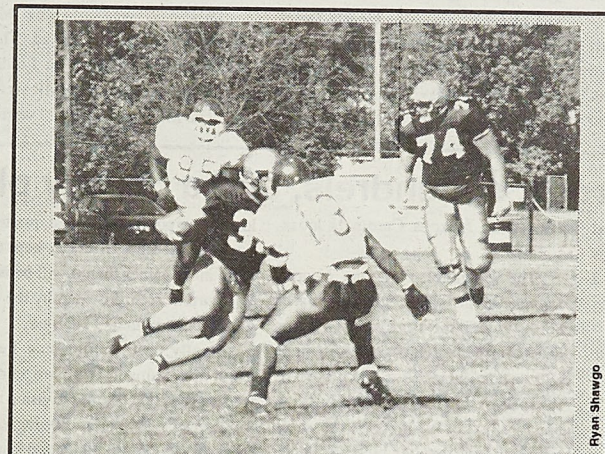
### UMR comes out fighting at home but could not stop Northwest

The football Miners lost another game this past Saturday, to the Bearcats of Northwest Missouri State, by a final score of 48-14. This occurred in the Miner's home opener and Hall of Fame Day on a beautiful fall afternoon which 1800 took advantage of to watch the game. The Miners fall to 0-3 (0-2 in MIAA), while Northwest climbs to 2-2 (2-0 in MIAA).

The Miner offense performed much better on Saturday than they had in their previous two games. They were able to gain 298 total offensive yards, in a balanced attack, with 141 yards rushing and 157 yards passing. They were able to score their first touchdown of the year, on a 10 yard Jason Politte pass to wideout Steve Smith after a 12 play, 61 yard drive. This tied the score for the Miners at 8:52 of the 2nd quarter. The Miners also scored with 5:35 left in the third quarter, with tailback Steve Hodson scoring from one yard out to cap a 78 yard drive. This drive also featured a 66 yard run by Hodson to bring the ball to the three yard line of the Bearcats. Hodson had another very good day, gaining 145 yards in 20 attempts for an average gain of 7.25 yards. Quarterback Jason Politte had a rough day, throwing for 100 yards on 22 attempts, missing wide open receivers

on occasion, and throwing two interceptions. Punter David McCormack had a busy day, punting 6 times with a 42 yard average. Also, McCormack, as a option quarterback, was able to rush for one 4th down conversion and pass for another.

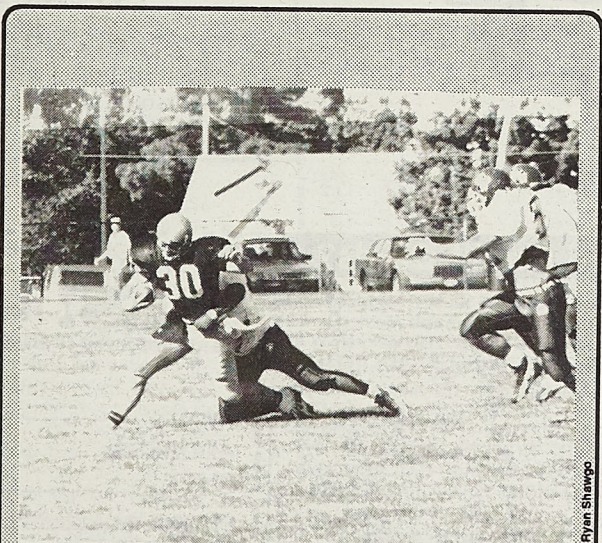
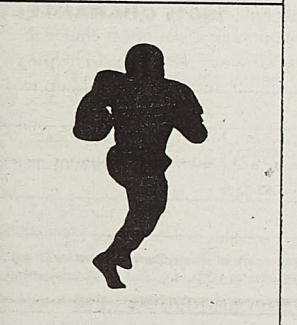
All in all, the Miners were unable to get yardage at crucial times in the game, having drives stall on their own 45, 44, and 42, one on Northwest's 34. The Miners had possession of the ball for 31:59, compared to Northwest's 28:01, but they were unable to make their time count. Also, they had five fumbles, recovering four of these, but

even a recovered fumble is a lost down. Still, the Miner offense has improved, gaining more yards in this game alone than in the previous two games combined. The Miners are hoping that they will continue to improve.

On defense, the Miners had a rough day, as the Bearcats were able to gain 434 total yards. Bearcat quarterback Greg Teale had a very big day, setting a new Northwest record by throwing five touchdown passes, the second week in a row that the Miners have had records set against them. Northwest was able to score very quickly with scoring drives of 3:56, 2:21, 0:38, 1:51,

0:31, 1:15, and 2:25. In short the Bearcats were able to get big plays when they were needed.

Perhaps the play that best symbolized the defensive struggles of the game was an extra point attempt by Northwest. On their second touchdown they attempted to kick an extra point. The snap was bad, and so the holder, Greg Teale, chased the ball down and was able to throw the ball to a wide open Damien Roberts for two points instead of one. Another example of how this game went was on punt coverage, with four tacklers bearing down on him, the Bearcat kick returner was somehow able to elude all of them and return the ball for 20-yards. It was plays like this, when the Miner defense seemed to be effective, stopping the Bearcats, only to have a second effort succeed, that was typical of this game. The Bearcats seem to be very lucky, but perhaps that luck was made by a harder effort. The Miners did have some defensive standouts, however. Linebacker Brian Gilmore stood out with another great effort, having 8 unassisted tackles and a total of 14. Free safety Richard Crowe also put a good effort, with 10 tackles. Overall, the Miner defense needs to tighten up a bit, as it seems that the offense has started to produce better. Next week the Miners face Missouri Southern in an away game. UMR fans are hoping that the Miners will be able to gain their first win of the season next week.

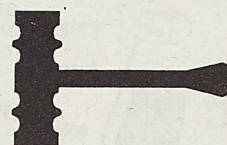

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## Miner soccer men claim three more victories

The UMR men's soccer team had an easy victory against the Lincoln University Blue Tigers, last Wednesday. In a clear superiority, the Miners scored 6 goals, one in the first half and 5 in the second. The Miners that scored were: Greg Schulte, Brian Koscielski and Gevan McCoy, who

pulled a hat trick. The Miners dominated both halves of the game. The Miner home team defense was calm and secure and played offside traps with the Blue Tigers offense, even sometimes by midfield. In the first half, the Miners pressured Lincoln, but the Blue Tigers managed to pull out some attacks in the first half that put the Miner's goal, defended by Kevin Levy, in danger. In the second half the Miners put more pressure on Lincoln, leading to 5 goals.

This past weekend the Miners played two games on the road. The first one, against Bellarmine at Louisville, Kentucky, ended with a UMR victory of 3-2. The Miners who scored were Scott

Sewell (27:47), Gevan McCoy (51:51) and Greg Shultz (79:27). On Sunday, the Miners played against Kentucky Wesleyan, winning by four goals to nothing, all goals scored in the first half. Miners who score were Scott Sewell (12:27, 40:55) and Gevan McCoy (31:55, 43:12). The Miners are now 6-1-1 on the season and Gevan McCoy has scored his 10th goal of the season. The next game will be against Southwest Missouri State, in Springfield.

## Lady Miner soccer: ups and downs

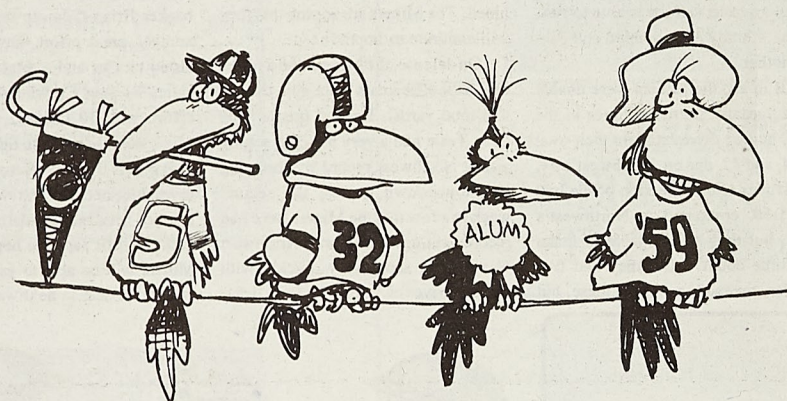

**TENNIS COURT LIGHTING/RESURFACING-** Campus Improvements is investigating the cost and possible timetable involved in upgrading the lighting system and replacing the surface of the UMR tennis courts. For more information, contact Mike Vincent (vincent@umr.edu).

**STUDENT HEALTH SERVICES-** Campus Improvements is also investigating possible improvements to student health services currently offered. A Student Health Services Advisory Committee has also formed. For more information on how to get involved in this new advisory committee, contact Brian Harris (brharris@umr.edu).

**FACULTY/STAFF ONLY TIME AT THE MULTI-PURPOSE BUILDING-** An objection was made to an apparent "faculty/staff only" night at the multi-purpose facility. The athletic

office was contacted for more information. On Friday nights from 6:30 to 10:45 p.m., faculty and staff are allowed to bring their families, but students are still allowed to use the facilities. For more information, contact Mike Vincent (vincent@umr.edu).

**TELEPHONE REGISTRATION COMPLAINTS-** The question was raised as to why the telephone registration system isn't available 24 hours a day/7 days a week. The phone registration system is utilized for accounting/numerically intensive processes when the system off-line to public use, and the only way to have 24 hour telephone registration service would be to purchase a new dedicated system. Students wanting information about their schedule can always use the web services available from UMR's home page. For more information, contact Karl Schmitt (kschmitt@umr.edu).

**CAMPUS DAY CARE-** University Relations is looking into the cost, demand, and feasibility of providing a day care facility for the UMR campus. The university has committed to re-examining data obtained in recent campus day care studies and obtaining data which takes into account student usage of such a facility. **WEATHER STATION BY STONEHENGE-** A complaint was voiced that the weather station recently moved by Stonehenge detracts from the appearance of our campus. Physical Facilities was contacted, and they reported that the weather station was relocated due to the upcoming expansion of the Electrical Engineering Building. In order to move the weather station to another location, UMR had to consult with the National Weather Service.

A study was conducted that had to take into account heat reflection, wind patterns, and various other natural phenomena. The conclusion of the study was that the most suitable and feasible location on campus for the weather station was by Stonehenge. For more information, contact Mike Vincent (vincent@umr.edu).

**IMPROVEMENTS TO THE TRACK-** The question was raised as to what progress has been made towards resurfacing the track. For more information on how this issue is progressing, contact Mike Vincent (vincent@umr.edu).

**PHOTOCOPIES IN THE LIBRARY-** A complaint was voiced about the cost of copies in the library. Copies are currently \$.10/each, or \$.075/each with

**RAYL CAFETERIA-** A student complained that the overall quality of the food served at the Rayl has decreased since last year. For more information on how this issue is progressing, contact Rich Lee (rlee@umr.edu).

**BIKING LANES ON CAMPUS-** The suggestion was made to investigate providing biking lanes on campus. This issue was investigated by the Campus Improvements Committee last year, at which time Physical Facilities told us it was not feasible, but the issue is being reinvestigated. For more information, contact Mike Vincent (vincent@umr.edu).

**CD-TO-CD COPIES IN THE LIBRARY-** A student complained they were not allowed to make a backup copy of a piece of copyrighted software they had purchased on CD-ROM. As there are potential legal ramifications of allowing the copy of licensed software, the library is not allowing any copyrighted software to be copied. They are investigating the legal issues and how to protect the University with the legal department. Based on their findings the Library will reconsider the current policy. For more information, contact Andy LeCren (alec@umr.edu).

**CIVIL ENGINEERING COPY MACHINE-** A request was made for Student Council to investigate obtaining a copy machine for the students in the Civil Engineering Building. Currently, students are charged \$.25 a copy to use the machine in the building. A request has been filed with the External Funding Committee of Student Council asking for the funds to purchase a copy machine for the students. For more information, contact Phil Gong (gong@umr.edu) or Gary Ross (gaross@umr.edu).

**WE NEED MORE CAMPUS DIALUPS-** Once again, usage of the dialup lines has increased. Computing Affairs has asked Computing Services to install more modems by the end of the semester. For more information, contact Andy LeCren (alec@umr.edu).

Other issues that StuCo is looking into this year include:

- (a) providing more money for the work study program
- (b) making advisors optional
- (c) allowing student organizations to do more fund raising on campus
- (d) increasing the number of night classes offered
- (e) making the new grade replace the old one after retaking a course
- (f) allowing outside catering bids, and
- (g) revising the current system of registration with regards to dropping students over the summer if payment isn't received by June 31.

### Not enough restrooms?

**Problem:** There is a lack of women's restrooms in buildings on campus, especially in the Civil Engineering Building.

**Action taken:** A walk-through of the CE building was done, which confirmed the complaints that there was only one women's restroom in the building, located on the first floor near the junction of the main hallway and the hallway leading to the lecture hall (114).

Mr. Marvin Patton of Physical Facilities was contacted. He said that Chancellor Park had requested a review of this problem last year. This review was completed in January 1995. Mr. Patton reported to Council in February, saying that funds were extremely

limited and only the most urgent of problems could be addressed. The possibility of using funds to implement federal ADA standards was also explored, but is not possible.

ADA funds will not be used because the CE building already meets minimum requirements for accessibility, and the University purposely tries to remain at the minimum level, citing the reason that any ADA conversion will reduce the existing number of fixtures in each restroom. The problem will be resolved as funds become available. For example, the expansion/renovation of the EE building will solve problems there, and the University will be designing the expansion and renovation of CE, which will also alleviate the problems in that building.

So until that renovation, it is highly unlikely that funds will become available for this project. For more information, contact Chris Doyle (cadoylc@umr.edu).

iversity of Missouri capital appropriations for the 1996-1997 fiscal year and plans to raise the rest through private funds.

One renovation that the university requested was the interior refit of the Rolla Building, the oldest building on campus. The main concern about this project was to bring the building into compliance with provisions of the American Disabilities Act.

The ventilation system in Schrenk Hall was of some concern as

well. Schrenk Hall, which houses the chemistry, chemical engineering and life sciences departments, contains HVAC systems that do not properly ventilate the labs.

The last major renovation project that the Board of Curators was presented with was the upgrading of laboratories and mechanical systems in the Physics Building. This project would be funded by a grant, building funds, and repair funds from the university.

fourth studio offering from Lennon clone/hippie lovegod Lenny Kravitz portends to be smokin and, indeed, the first cut "Rock and Roll is Dead" starts things off with a bang, the psycho axe riff being quite reminiscent of the stylings Kravitz pursued on **Are You Gonna Go My Way**. Likewise, "Circus" offers up a visionary chorus (welcome to the real world). In fact, for the first ten minutes or so, one actually might feel secure, wrapped in the psychedelic womb of Lenny's one-man band.

But wait a minute, something's rotten here and it ain't the lox. Perhaps it's the fact that no matter how talented a musician may be, if they work alone, their stylistic options are limited by the finiteness of human potential. Then again, if the artwork contained in the jacket is any reflection of Mr. Kravitz's mental state, one may wonder which side of his artistic bread (and I'm not sure I want to know) is buttered. What worked for Robert Mapplethorpe died with him, but in all fairness most men just don't look good with feathers and a tail.

Whatever the reason, this album lacks the direction and intensity of his previous releases. Many of these songs

are in the tried and true tradition of Kravitz's earlier work, and though technically sound, they lack the inspiration and shine of earlier hits such as the anthemic "Let Love Rule" or the r & b gem "It Ain't Over Till It's Over." "God is Love" finds Lenny beating the dead horse of musician as prophet; "Thin Ice" sounds like a weak remake of 1986's "Freedom Train."

Not that Kravitz doesn't attempt some new ground here, but just because he's rediscovered REO Speedwagon (**Magdalene**) doesn't mean it's healthy. Perhaps the highlight of this record are the drums on the nearly ridiculous r & b ballad "Don't Put A Bullet In Your Head" (are they live or is it Casio...). In fact, **Circus** may be most strikingly contrasted to the cotton candy at said event: sweet, fluffy, and wholly devoid of substance.

After a four year studio hiatus and

the acquisition of former Jane's Addiction string slinger, Dave Navarro, the Chili Peppers are back with a **MONSTER**. The addition of Navarro to the fold has the exponential effect of fleshing out the Peppers' powerful but often redundant Phreaky cheated by the junkie gyrations of Porno for Pyros. In essence, it might be said that they have killed two birds with one stoner.

The opening track, "Warped," is a Hendrix-laced guitar slaughterhouse. The sing-song dance number "Acroplane" is an assured buttocks shaker, while the neuro-ansthem "Deep Kick" has the mark of early D. Bowie crawlin' all over it. Also, look for the power ballad "Tearjerker" to be assaulting your ears soon via MTV, etc. You will be hearing it if you haven't already. In addition, the semi-southern fried ballad "My Friends" stretches the Peppers' range to yet another genre. From the nightmarish garage/thrash/funk of Coffee Shop to the slinky introspective soul searcher Walkabout. One Hot Minute sizzles.

But it's not just the songs (all are winners) that make this disc such a gem: it's the sounds. The flange-tinged vaudeville guitar on "Walkabout" sounds fifty feet thick, as does the

symphonic ending of "Tearjerker." And Navarro's talk box stroking on "Falling in to Grace" is something that genre progenitors Nazareth only dare dream about in 73. All in all, this is one of the tastiest batch of tunes cooked up since NIN served us **Pretty Hate Machine**. If ya' can't find something to chew on here, check your tastebuds....



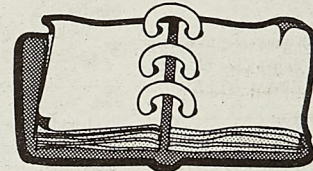
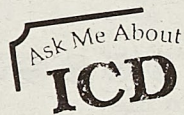

survey taken last week in one of the foreign language classes, advanced level students were asked the question of why one should take a foreign language. In this case, it was Russian, and one of the students had a perfect example, for our purposes especially.
