## Police stop jaywalkers



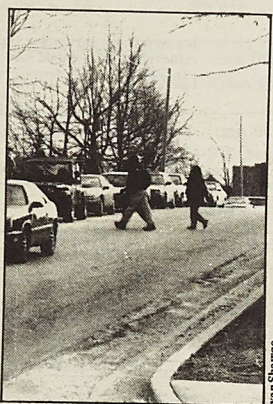

Doesn't it sometimes seem like it's too much trouble to cross at the crosswalk? You don't see any cars coming and, well, what's it going to hurt? It could hurt your bank accounts.

For the past 30 days the Rolla City Police have been monitoring the streets, observing both drivers and pedestrians. This action was taken in response to letters from students to the University Police. The letters complained of drivers refusing to stop for students.

The University Police notified the city of the problem. The city agreed to monitor the drivers, but in order to be fair, they also had to monitor the students. "It's a double-edged sword," says UMR police chief Bill Bleckmann, referring to the crackdown on jaywalking.

As of yet, only warnings have been given in order to spread the word. "We

want students to be aware," says UMR officer Mike Barnes. Before long though, the police, both city and campus, will start giving out jaywalking tickets to students not using the crosswalks. The amount of the fine has not yet been determined.

## UMR Film Series gets new home and new name

After twenty years in Miles Auditorium the UMR Film Series is moving to Leach Theater. Accompanying the move is a name change to the UMR Film Festival. Dr. James Bogan, professor of art and director of the series since its inception in 1975, believes that the new venue will provide better sound, image and a more comfortable environment for audiences.

According to Bogan, plans for the move began about a year ago when Vice Chancellor Ogrosky wanted to upgrade the series. Originally, there were plans to install a 16 mm film projection system into Leach, but that proved too expensive given its limited usefulness. The University began looking into a video projection system, which could be used to show such things as videotape, laser disks, or multimedia presentations.

"I never met a video projector I liked, so I was skeptical," Bogan said. With the help of Leach Theater Manager Jeff Markley, the University decided on the Hughes/JVC Image Light Amplifier Projector. With its installation complete by January 12 this year, UMR became the first school in Missouri to install such a system.

Pleasantly surprised with the image quality, Bogan said, "I had to look three times to tell that it wasn't film." According to Bogan, the film projectors in Miles are only two to three years old, but the technology is essentially the same as what Edison invented in the 1800s.

In addition to excellent image quality, the sound for the new system will be improved from relatively low quality optical tracks associated with film, to digital sources. Bogan believes that the new sound source combined with the acoustics in Leach Theater, will provide a vast improvement compared to Miles Auditorium.

Bogan also feels that the move will allow the series to broaden its scope, including presentations that aren't

available on film, and more frequent live aspects. Some of the special events this semester include:

- On February 20, Jennifer Hereth of the Chicago Art Institute will present a slide-lecture on Brazilian art. This presentation will accompany Dr. Bogan's documentary *The Hammock Variations*, about the Amazon basin.

- On March 19, screenwriter Alan Greenberg will speak. Greenberg has directed several films and worked with film makers such as Martin Scorsese and Bernardo Bertolucci.

- On April 16, Buster Keaton's silent film classic *The General* will be accompanied by live piano music performed by Jo Ann Walter.

Events are scheduled for every Tuesday at 7:00p.m. There will be 100 free tickets for students (two per ID) that may be picked up at the UCW ticket window. These tickets are available beginning the Wednesday before each performance.

Tickets at the door are \$3 for non-students or \$2 for students. Season passes are available for \$20. For more information call (573) 341-4185.

## Teaching requirements to change

Did you ever have a teacher you could not understand? No matter how hard you tried, could you not reach a communication plateau with your lab instructor. Relief could be in sight, thanks to the State of Missouri.

This session in the House of Representatives, a bill was filed that would require all instructors to be proficient in English. The proposed legislation will force the Coordinating Board of Higher Education to require college campuses to establish an English proficiency program. The goal of this program is to ensure instructors' ability to communicate in English. All professors (old and new) and graduate assistants must be able to pass a verbal

and oral exam to demonstrate proficiency.

The bill was referred to the Higher Education committee and placed on the calendar. Last week, students representing the University of Missouri testified in favor of the proposed legislation. The Higher Education committee has scheduled an executive session for Wednesday, February 7 at 3:00 P.M. in the capital. An executive session is a committee meeting in which bills are passed to be returned to the House. Other bills to be considered in the executive session on Wednesday will include the proposed engineering laboratory fees bill and a faculty/student curator bill.

The engineering laboratory bill, if passed, shall be used to provide matching funds to the University of Missouri system. The state could provide both the MU and UMR

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## Who's the next U.S. President?

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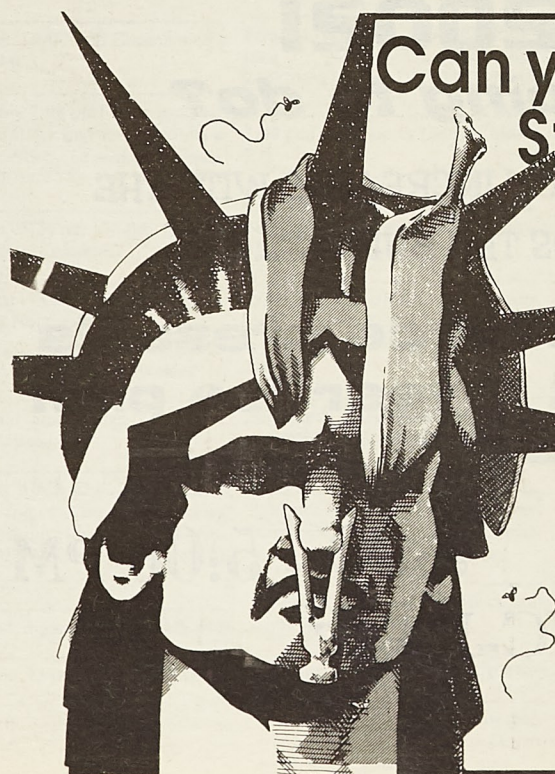

## Time is Running Out!

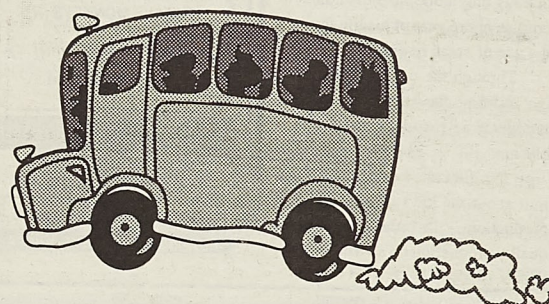

## Why Go Fishing? Better Yet, Why Go Fly Fishing?

In reading hunting and fishing publications, one thing sticks out in my mind. Warm-water fishermen and cold-water fishermen are at opposite ends of the spectrum when it comes to attitudes towards their quarry. I prefer to fish for the cold-water species, so therefore, I am a little biased towards one end of the spectrum. Cold-water species have traditionally been pursued on fly-fishing tackle. By cold-water species, I refer to the salmon, char, trout, and whitefish families of fish. These include the Chinook Salmon, the Coho Salmon, the Dolly Varden, the Arctic Char, Rainbow, Cutthroat, and Brown Trout, and Arctic Grayling. That's not a complete list by any stretch of the imagination. It gives you, the reader, a glimpse of the cold water species.

Around here, the two main cold water species are the Rainbow Trout and the Brown Trout. Yep, that's what I do with my spare time when I'm not building models, tying flies, or dreaming about starting a tackle business. Some will say that I have an obsession with fly-fishing, akin to an old woman sitting around, knitting her time away. To any of the

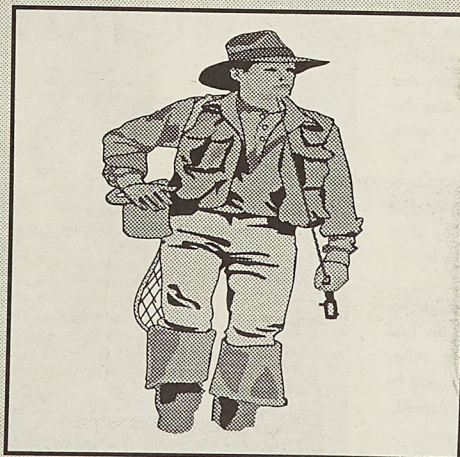
wiser ladies reading this, do not take that as an insult from me. It's the young folk's way, you know. Put a label on things, the way modern popular culture has to, in order to justify itself.

When I fish for these cold water species, I fly-fish. Not because I don't have a spinning rod. Not because of the controlled, methodic rhythm and timing that is so crucial to the right cast. Not because it is a more refined way of fishing. Not because it's different. Fly-fishing is an art form.

Even though I have over 160 credit hours distributed between three different engineering departments, I am an artist at heart. Fly fishing is my "escape" from the reality of our technical classes. You see, fly-fishing encompasses many components of my engineering education at Rolla, as well as my outside interests.

Fluid dynamics can be used when you have to read the water. The stream flows over numerous rocks, boulders,

and different obstacles. Standing waves are seen on the stream's surface profile. (Hydraulic jump, anyone?) Turbulent flow is seen behind the same rocks, boulders, and obstacles. Laminar flow is seen in the wide, open, flat pools that form between



dramatic changes in the stream's gradient. Last, but not least, the stream's flow is slowest at or near the stream's bed.

Thermodynamics is noticed, more than seen. As my legs and feet

get colder, I realize that my body's heat is slowly being donated to the river.

Chemistry, Chemistry, Chemistry. Trout waters must be within a certain range of pH in order for fish to live in them. Trout waters must be

within a certain range of pH in order for the bugs that trout call food to thrive. Along those same lines, many species of insects die when water contains pollutants. Pure, cold, crystal clear water: that's what the trout thrives in.

The dissolved minerals in the water determine the pH. The geology of the stream bed determines the dissolved minerals that are present in the stream. The geology of the stream bed determines the shape and structure of the stream itself. It could be a superimposed stream, an antecedent stream, etc. (Ask Dr. Rockaway if you are interested. He teaches Geomorphology, and I left my file at home!) There would be no cold-water streams around here if it weren't for the natu-

ral piping system present in the different limestones and sandstones that make up the Missouri Ozarks. Why no cold-water streams because of subterranean pipes? Well, there would be no springs to feed these streams sufficiently.

I touched on insects earlier. I'm no entomologist, but being able to adequately identify insects streamside is a necessity. Knowing the difference between a mayfly, caddisfly, stonefly, and a plain old house fly can come in handy, especially when the hatch is on and the fish are rising for an easy meal.

Of course I don't use real insects. I make close approximations of the real thing out of feathers, fur, tinsel, and thread. I'm not the best fly tyer in the area by any means, but I'm well practiced. I get better every batch. My fishing partner will tell you otherwise, but that's because he wants free flies! Fly-tying is a small component of the art of which I spoke.

## Coming Soon: Doom the Movie

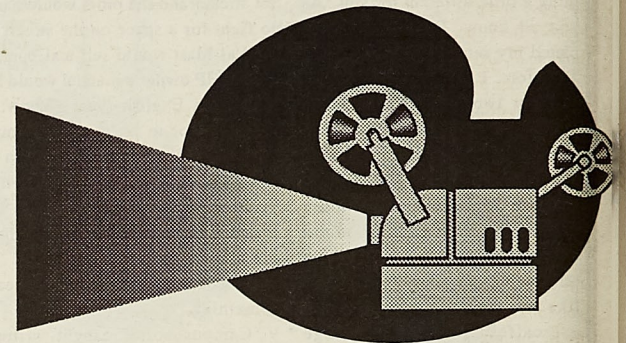

Did you know that the MSM-UMR Alumni Association has more than \$10,000 that can be provided annually as emergency loans to assist students? The student must provide a letter from their faculty advisor confirming that both the student is enrolled and has a financial need. Up to \$1,000 can be

loaned to the student on an emergency basis.

The loan comes with an agreement signed by the student that he will pay back the loan in a specified period of time, and if the student is unable to fully repay the loan in that period, a small interest fee is applied to the remaining amount. After an additional time period, a larger interest rate is applied to the amount until the loan is repaid in full.

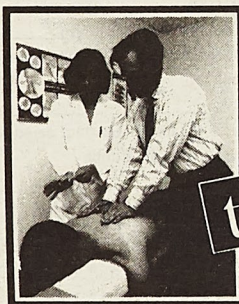
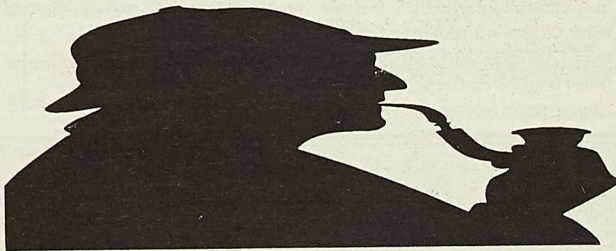

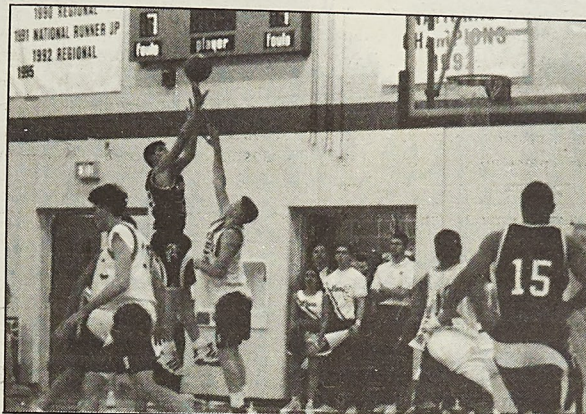

The Miners won two important MIAA games this past week, and moved into a tie for second place in the conference, one game out of first. UMR faces #1 Northwest this weekend, and has a chance to pull into a tie for first.

On last Wednesday, the Miners took on the league leading Emporia State Hornets at home. The Miners came out and took an early lead. The Miners never trailed in this game, jumping to a quick 7-0 lead. The Miners were intense on defense throughout the entire game, not allowing easy baskets. Despite this, the Hornets just hung around, staying within striking distance throughout the entire first half, pulling within one at 4:08 left in the first half, only to have the Miners go on a 10-3 run to end the half 42-34.

The first half featured the Miners shooting the ball well, hitting half of their shots. Terry Smith had 11 to lead the Miners. Their defense held Empo-

ria to .400 from the field, including 1-10 from behind the three point line.

The second half started off with Emporia making a run at UMR's lead, cutting the margin to 1 with 14 minutes to play. The Miners went with a smaller lineup and grabbed a lead, due to Marc Tompkins fouls and Jeff Kokal's uncertain ankle (he had to

have it taped). UMR's outside shooters turned it up and were able to gain a 6 point lead. Jamie Brueggeman picked up his fourth personal, so Jeff Kokal returned to the game.

The Miners then increased the lead to 16 with 3:11 showing on the clock, on sharp outside shooting and team rebounding. From this point on, the

Miners were able to keep a double digit lead on the Hornets and ended up with a score of UMR 73-ESU 63.

For the game, the Miners held the Hornets to a .344 field goal percentage, indicative of their intense defense. They shot .481 from the field. They were led by Tim Holloway's 19 points, on 5 of 9 from three point range, while Michael McClain chipped in 13 points. Jeff Kokal led the team in rebounds with 6, while he scored 8 points. Terry Smith ended up with 11 points.

On Saturday, UMR traveled to Joplin to take on Missouri Southern where they had not won in 15 years. Furthermore, Southern had won the last five meetings. This game started with Southern jumping to a 9 point lead in the first five minutes, but the Miners answered by scoring 9 points in 1:40, which featured McClain scoring 2 and dishing out two assists. From this point, the first half went back and forth, with both teams grabbing a lead, only to lose it. In fact, the first half had 6 ties in all, but ended up with Southern up by four at the half. Both teams shot very well, and played solid defense. Southern out rebounded UMR by 3, which

## #25 Lady Miners lose to Southern, still a game out of first

Last week the Lady Miners were home against the Hornets of Emporia State on Thursday, and then traveled to Joplin, Missouri, to take on the Lady Lions of Missouri Southern State on Saturday. The Lady Miners came back from a one point first half deficit to close the Emporia game with a solid eleven point victory, 73-62, and force a four way tie for first place in the conference. However, the trip to Joplin found the Lady Miners returning with a devastating five point loss to Missouri Southern.

The Lady Miners started Thursday's game playing very sloppily. The Hornets were able to score easily as the Lady Miner's interior defense was not cutting off the lane allowing some easy layups for the Hornets, but the Lady Miners were able to find holes in the Hornets defense and stay within two to four points in back of the Hornets for the first eleven minutes of the half. At the 8:44 mark, the Hornets hit a three pointer to kickoff a 9-0 run over the next two and a half minutes to put the Lady Miners down by thirteen. The Lady Miners closed to within four points of

thirty-six seconds to go to pull within one to end the half with a score of 35-36.

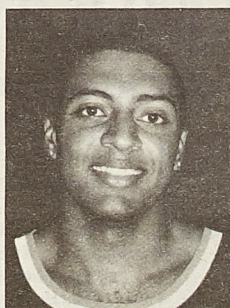
Both teams were pretty even during the first half. The two teams shot relatively equally with the Lady Min-

A little less than a year ago, Miner fans heard a story which was hard to believe. One of the Pacific Ten's top point guards, Washington's Michael McClain, had decided to transfer and play his final year at UMR. Now the story has proven to be a reality as McClain, a Springfield native, has helped lead the Miners to what is currently their best season in school history.

McClain has already broke the UMR single game and single season assist records, and is fast approaching on the top ten career assist list (in only one season). Very few people would argue that he is the best point guard in the MIAA.

McClain has had a long and traveled basketball career. He played at Glendale High School in Springfield (with Miner Terry Smith), and after graduating played a year at Iowa Western Community College. From their McClain moved up to the Division I ranks by transferring to Washington. In Seattle, McClain was redshirted his first season, and then went start most of the games he played in over the next two seasons. In 1994, he was named to the All-Pac 10 Defensive team and in 1995 he was among the assist leaders in the nation.

Despite a somewhat succesful season thus far, Washington was not going to be in real contention for a major championship, and with all of his local ties, McClain opted to return to Missouri and finish his career in Rolla. McClain says that the main

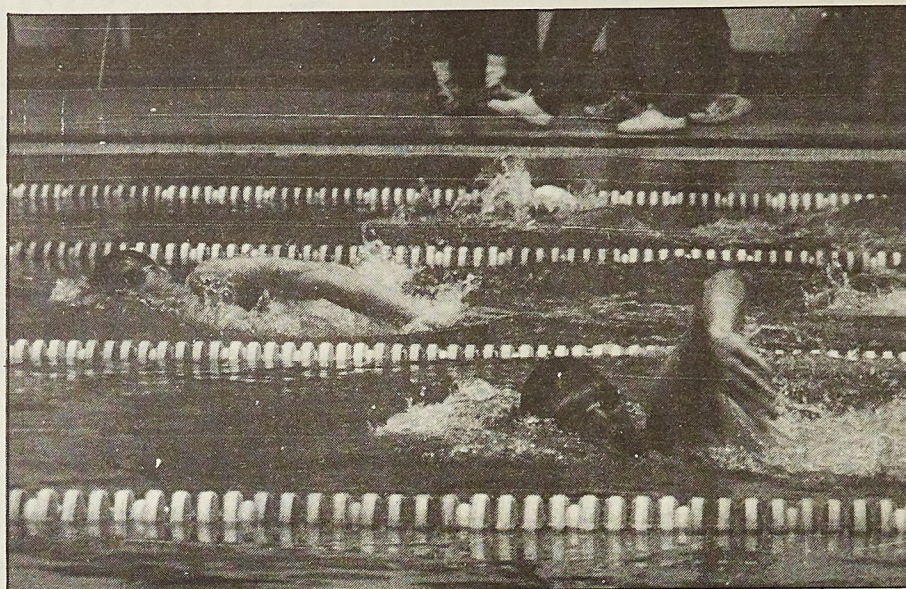
tively shut down, scoring only 15 points with 3 rebounds. Rodman managed a total of 23 boards around Magic, and even scored in the double digits.

spelled the difference in the half. Jeff Kokal led the Miners with 10 points in the first half.

The Miners started the second half on a tear, scoring the first 9 points, and went on a 12-2 run. Terry Smith had 10 points before five minutes had expired from the clock. The Miners were able to keep a lead the rest of the game, which featured the Miners firing in 61 percent of their shots, 55.6 percent from three point land. UMR was in control of the game from this point forward and won easily 91-81.

The Miners played a solid game, not allowing easy shots on defense. Southern packed it in on defense, clogging the lane, but this allowed the Miner's outside shooters to have open shots, which they knocked down. Terry Smith had 22 second half points and ended with a career high 28 points. He shot 6 of 10 from behind the three point

line to move into 7th in three pointers in the school's history. Jamie Brueggeman had 16 points, which puts into 13th overall on the career scoring list. Brueggeman also had 7 rebounds to lead the Miners. Jeff Kokal had 20 points to tie his career best, and contributed 5 rebounds. Tim Holloway had 4 assists, to catapult him onto fifth on the career assist list. Also, Holloway is 1 point away from 20th on the career scoring list after scoring 9 in this game.

This Miner team is off to the best start ever at 16-4, surpassing the 15-5 mark set by the 1975-76 team which won UMR its only MIAA conference championship. UMR has moved into a tie with Emporia State for second place, one game behind Northwest Missouri State. The Miners have a clear shot to win the conference outright, especially as they play Northwest one more time this season. The Miners have all five

starters, as well Jeff Kokal, averaging in double figures for points and have had numerous personal achievements as well. UMR has played very well in recent games, playing much more consistent throughout the entire game. The Miner's defense is what wins games for them, and it has had its stretches in each game where the other team is simply unable to score.

UMR plays two very important games this week. They travel to take on Missouri Western, a streaky team that has won 4 of their last 5. Then the Miners play host to the league leader Northwest Missouri State. This game will be on Saturday at app. 3:30pm, so come out and pack Gale Bulman to really give the Miners a lift, hopefully into first place in the conference. This game, like all home games, is free of charge to students, so take in a good basketball game for free.

first half hitting 4-7 from the field and 2-3 from behind the three point line en-route to 10 first half points.

The Lady Miners came out in the second half playing much better than the first half. The two teams traded baskets for the first two and a half minutes; then the Lady Miners held the lead and went on to extend it to as many as seven points. The Lady Miner defense stepped up and never let the Hornets get back in the game. The Lady Miners' defense was really effective in the last two and a half minutes of the game by not allowing the Hornets to score while the Hornets fouled to try to save time in the game. The Lady Miners capitalized at the free throw line and scored the last six points of the game to win by 11, 73-62.

The Lady Miners shooting improved greatly in the second half. They shot 13-27 for 48.1% compared to only 11-38 for 28.9%, 1-9 from three point land, for the Hornets. The Lady Miners also held a seven point advantage at the free throw line. Becky Reichard's strong play continued into the second half of the game as well as she led the Lady Miners with 21 points, 4 assists, and 2 steals. Also contributing in the victory were Christie Williams with 13 points and 4 assists, Tobi Rees with

12 points, 11 rebounds, and 3 blocks, Heather Hartman with 11 points, 7 rebounds, and 3 blocks, and Ondrea Bermudez with 8 points and 5 rebounds.

The victory gave the Lady Miners a share of first place in the MIAA and their best nineteen game start in school history. The Lady Miners went in to Missouri Southern with a share of the MIAA lead but left with a five point loss.

In the first half the Lady Miners' defense gave the Lady Lions good shooting opportunities while offensively they were unable to really get anything going. The Lady Lions took the lead early and never looked back extending the lead to as many as 12 points. Becky Reichard once again hit a three pointer at the end of the first half but this time they were down by 9, 33-24. Poor shot selection and hurried shots led to very poor shooting for the Lady Miners in the first half. The Lady Lions were outshot by the Lady Miners but the Lady Miners were only able to connect on 10 of their 30 shots for 33.3% while the Lady Lions shot 14-27 for 51.9%.

In the second half the Lady Miners again were unable to cut into overcome the Lady Lion lead. They would close to within four points over the first ten minutes of the second half, but the Lady

Lions stretched the lead once again.

The Lady Miners would one again close in on the Lady Lions and got as close as three points with 1:55 to go in the game. The Lady Lions stole the ball twice and scored both times and then scored again to go up by 9 with eleven seconds left in the game. Two free throws and a last second shot from Christie Williams closed the lead to 5 as the Lady Miners lost 69-64.

This week the Lady Miners will continue their road trip with a contest against Missouri Western then return to Gale Bullman on Saturday for an afternoon matchup against Northwest Missouri State. Tip-off is scheduled for 1:30 at the Gale Bullman Multipurpose Building. The Lady Miners still have a shot at the MIAA crown so everyone come out and support UMR!

component of satisfaction surrounding the cast is, yes, doing it. To many macho guys, the cast is too delicate. For some, the timing and feel necessary to execute the cast is too frustrating. I've even heard fly casting called too much work. Boring. I can't believe it, but boring has been used, as well. Each cast is as different as the stars in the sky, so those people must be easily bored. The cast can be frustrating, but with a little practice and a good instructor, it can be easily mastered. Casts can be delicate when needed in close, but a delicate cast is not going to reach the cruiser 65 feet away. So any notions you have about fly-fishing being wimpy or "fau-fau" are pretty

much stereotypes, and quite untrue. Fly casting is truly a modern art form.

A history and tradition surrounds this sport like no other. Hmm, an idea for future articles. I'll leave this subject on that note.

If you're interested in reading more about the sport, the UMR library reference section contains a book titled "A.J. McClane's New Standard Fishing Encyclopedia." Some of the information is dated, but the sections on casting, lines, leaders, and tackle selection is still valid and free of marketing influences. campuses 1.2 million dollars a year, for the next ten years. Through the use of this bill, campuses will be able to providing students with high quality laboratory equipment which will benefit the students in the job market. The previous funding bill (which expires in 1997) has provided several expensive pieces of equipment for the chemical engineering and electrical engineering departments.

The student/faculty curator bill proposes to allow a representative from the faculty of the University of Missouri onto the Board of Curators. A faculty member on the Board of Curators will be able to provide concerns and opinions from the university system. Currently there is only a student representative allowed on the Board of Curators, Gayatri Bhatt from the University of Missouri-Rolla.

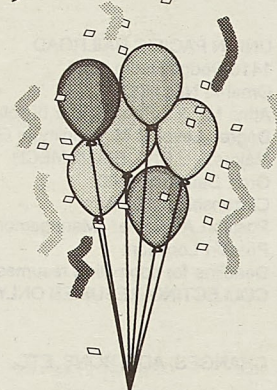
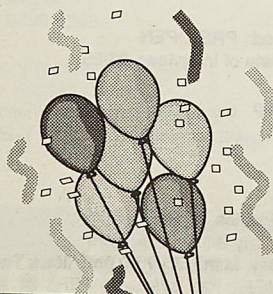
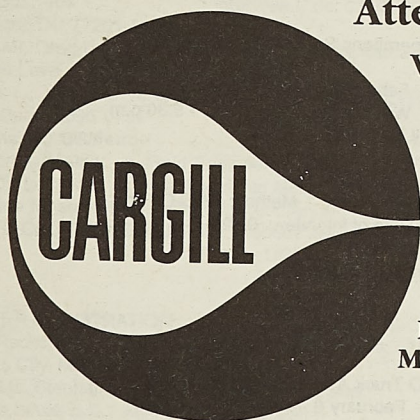
