## Student Fee Task Force holds meeting

The UM-Student Fee Task Force delivered a presentation in an open forum discussion Thursday, February 8, in an attempt to inform students of the suggestions currently being made to the Board of Curators.

Brady Deaton, Chief of Staff of the Chancellor's Office at the University of Missouri at Columbia, as well as a Committee Staff member of the Task Force, handled most of the discussion held in University Center-East.

Student Council President Keith Blackford initiated the forum with introductions of Deaton and the panel.

The presentation began with a look at the executive summary of the report which included the principle recommendations of the Task Force. They consist of the following.

1. Adjust undergraduate fees annually at the rate of the Higher Education

Price Index, unless special needs arise.  
2. Adjust Master's program fees and resident Ph.D. program fees upward over the next three to five years to the Public American Association of Universities median.

3. Lower non-resident Ph.D. fees to the resident Ph.D. level.

4. Allow campuses flexibility in setting professional school fees.

5. Reevaluate fees for the MBA program.

6. Enable graduate programs to levy special fees on a discipline by discipline basis to offset unique costs associated with specialized programs of graduate education.

On the first point, students wondered of what "special needs" consisted and who would be making the final decision on increases due. Deaton explained that special needs might include less funding than expected by government or alumni programs and went on to say that "special needs" could be suggested by anyone from campus leaders to the legislature, and that the Board of Curators would have the final word on all increases.

Deaton explained on the second point that all universities judge themselves according to a peer group of similar universities. The University of Missouri is one of the roughly 30 public universities in the American Association of Universities. This group consists of over 100 of the most prestigious research facilities in the country. Currently, the University charges less than the median cost of many of the AAU universities; however, it attempts to maintain the same level of excellence that these other establishments hold.

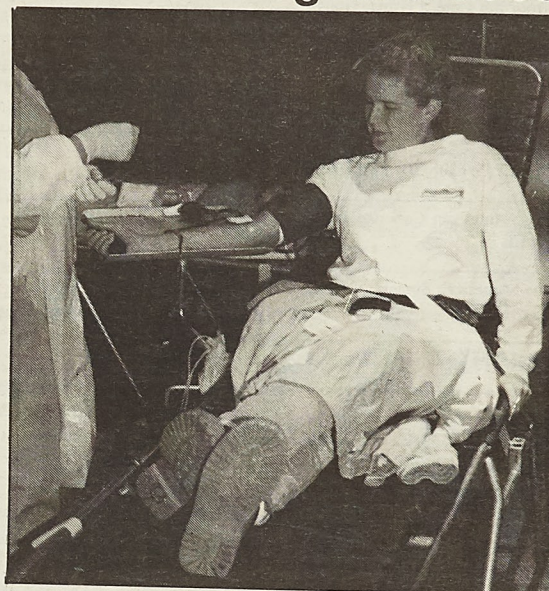
Deaton suggested that the fourth point was primarily promotional. Generally, Ph.D. students pay very little in the way of out of state fees anyhow, as the university waives them as part of their work on campus and to encourage the students to select Missouri.

Deaton only touched on points four and five, as UMR has no professional schools nor an MBA program.

Deaton commented on the last point that such a policy would allow for across the board consistency in the

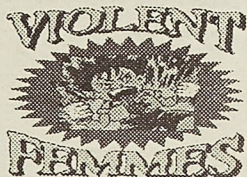
## St. Pat's concert announced

## Dr. Debbye Turner coming to UMR

Former Miss America, Dr. Debbye Turner will be the keynote speaker for the African American Cultural Recognition Committee's Keynote Address on February 17. She will also speak that evening at the Association for Black Students annual banquet.

Turner will speak on personal excellence, unrelenting determination, goal-setting, and the importance of education. She uses her own life as an example of overcoming the odds. It took her seven years and eleven tries in two states to finally become Miss America in 1990.

Turner, who completed her doctor of veterinary medicine degree at the University of Missouri-Columbia, co-

hosts the television show "Show Me St. Louis" on Channel 5 in St. Louis. She also hosts the PBS series "The Gentle Doctor" about pets and veterinary medicine. The remainder of her time is spent on public speaking and public services.

Turner's visit is being sponsored by the Association for Black Students in conjunction with UMR African American Cultural Recognition Committee for this year's African American Cultural Heritage Month, "African American Women: Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow."

The keynote address will be given at 6:00 p.m. at Leach Theatre, Castleman Hall. It is free and open to the public, but tickets are required. A banquet will be held at 7:30 p.m. in Centennial Hall in University Center East. Tickets for the banquet are \$15.

## St. Pat's in April?

St. Pat's in April? I am a little irritated. I think that the central administration of the University of Missouri is trying to force something on UMR that has few potential benefits, and could screw up one of our oldest traditions. And to make matters worse, some of the people who are supposed to be representing the interests of UMR are standing aside and allowing it to happen.

For some time now, there has been a movement at the University of Missouri system level to create an academic calendar that would be common to all four campuses of the University of Missouri. The main reason for this movement is to create a structure that would allow for easier cooperation between the campuses, making video classes taught from one campus and taken by students at other campuses easier to coordinate, for example.

Does it sound like a good idea so far? Well, as usual, there are a few things that must be given up to get this good, and the sticker is that I believe we give up more than we gain. The Columbia campus has traditionally

held their spring break the second week of March. The Rolla campus has traditionally held its St. Patrick's Day celebration the second week of March. Who is going to move? Even though St. Patrick's Day is going to be March 17 no matter how we change the academic calendar, and spring break can be any time, the Columbia faculty has stubbornly demanded that spring break remain where it has always been for them: the second week of March. Two things are clear: a campus-wide celebration like St. Pat's should be held when the majority of students will be on campus—not over spring break; and if St. Pat's were the week after spring break, there would be three days of class that would be held in between spring break and St. Pat's, which is probably not a good idea.

In anticipation of this problem, Student Council passed a resolution unanimously, co-signed by twelve people, asking that the spring break be separated from the St. Pat's celebration by at least one week. Academic Council passed a similar resolution, and both resolutions were sent to the

president of the university, George Russell, and to some of the members of the Inter-Faculty Council (IFC). The IFC is composed of faculty representatives from each campus and had been charged with working out the differences in the calendars of the four campuses.

On Thursday, February 1, the IFC met in Columbia, with Dr. Delbert Day of Ceramic Engineering, Dr. Randy Moss of Electrical Engineering, and Dr. Greg Gelles of Economics representing UMR. At this meeting, IFC voted on a plan for a common calendar. The original plan included a common spring break during the second week of March. Dr. Gelles managed to amend this motion to require a common spring break beginning "some day in March". This amendment passed, and IFC passed the resolution requiring a common spring break beginning "some day in March". The resolution was still dangerous for UMR because it did not specify a time for spring break, and there was and is still powerful pressure

The parking issue has been brought to the attention of the Chancellor, who has incorporated it into his Strategic Action Plan. The Student Services Committee of StuCo is currently working to extend evening and finals week library hours.

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## Council approves common calendar

The University System moved one step closer to a common calendar on February 1, when the Inter Faculty Council voted to recommend a common calendar plan. This plan will be considered at the next Board of Curators meeting on February 22 and 23, and could take effect as soon as 1997.

The approved plan specifies that all four schools in the University of Missouri System will begin fall semester on the Monday of the fourth full week of August, spring semester on the Monday of the second full week of January, Thanksgiving break will begin the Wednesday prior to thanksgiving, and Spring Break will begin on a

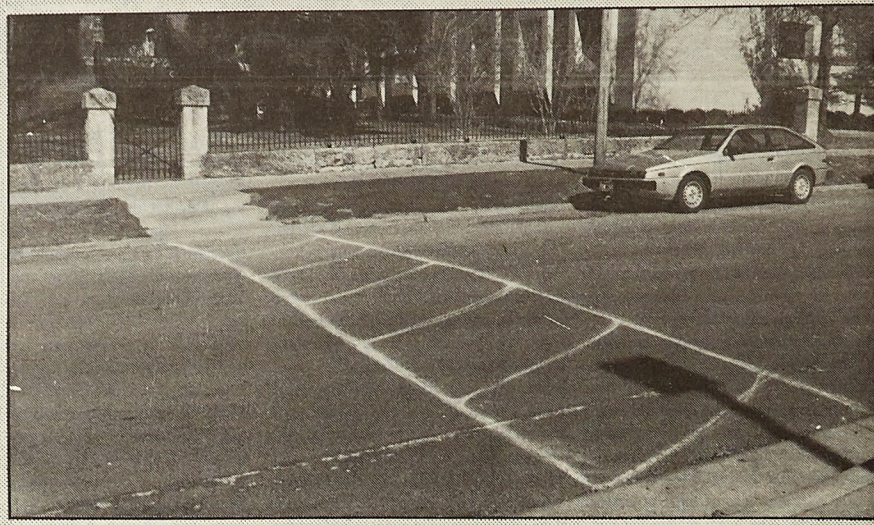
Monday in March. Each campus will be required to have 74-76 academic days, and individual schools may decide when their semesters will end.

Advocates of the common calendar proposal say it removes an obstacle to cooperation between schools in the UM System. Some Rolla students feel that scheduling Spring Break in March will place it too close to the St. Pat's celebration. Many students are concerned that Spring Break will be scheduled immediately following the St. Pat's Celebration, which will encourage students to begin Spring Break early and cut down on participation in Spring Break festivities. If Spring Break is held the week prior to St. Pat's, it will interfere with the Snake Invasion.

Dr. Dilbert Day, one of the UMR representatives on the Inter Faculty

## Dr. Kurt Kosbar receives Fulbright Scholarship

Last week, Dr. Kurt Kosbar, associate professor of electrical engineering, received a Fulbright Scholarship to lecture at the Technical University in Gdansk, Poland. While in Poland, Kosbar will lecture on topics such as spread spectrum communication systems, computer-aided design of communications systems and digital signal processing.

The J. William Fulbright Scholarship is a grant that allows faculty, professionals, teachers, and students from different nations to share knowledge and "increase mutual understand-

ing between the people of the United States and the people of other countries." The program also allows for American and foreign universities to foster institutional relationships. Kosbar's development and worldwide distribution of educational software led to a relationship with the Technical University in Gdansk to consider an international exchange of professors.

Dr. Kosbar received his bachelor's degree in computer engineering and electrical engineering in 1982 from Oakland University in Michigan. He then received his master's and doctorate's degrees from the University of Southern California in 1984 and 1988, respectively. For seven years during his education, Kosbar worked as a staff engineer at Hughes Aircraft Company in El Segundo, California. He is presently Assistant Department

Chair for Undergraduate Studies in the Electrical Engineering department. He has written and published many journals and papers throughout his career.

Kosbar's software package, "P. C. Convolution," is a special purpose package that helps students visualize the convolution operation. It has been distributed to 600 professors in 47 states and 20 countries. He estimates that over 20,000 students per year use the software.

Kosbar is one of approximately 2,000 U.S. scholars who will travel abroad during the current year under the Fulbright program. Since its initiation in 1946, over 31,000 American scholars have participated in this program. Many participants have gone on to win Nobel prizes and become presidents of prestigious universities throughout the country.

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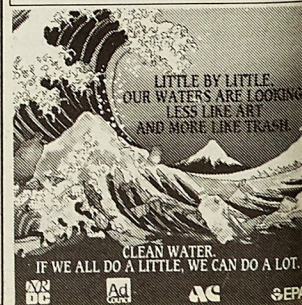

Between Midnight And Day  
Alligator Records

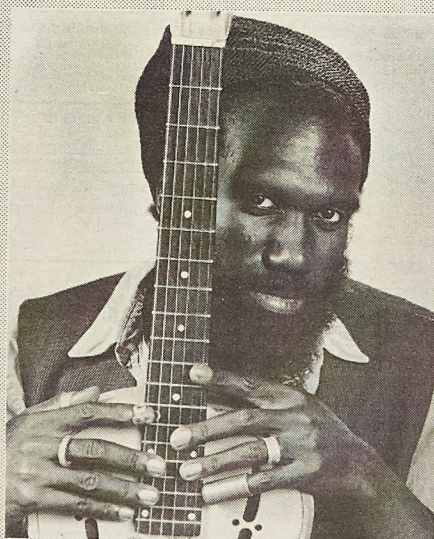

Most popular contemporary blues artists seem to fall into the same category: they are mainly heavy on the electric guitar with a full band

behind them. They are pushing the rock/blues borderline with many of their songs. Corey Harris breaks through this with the Between Midnight And Day release. Corey plays the traditional delta blues the way Son House or Robert Johnson did it, alone and acoustic. As a big fan of Robert Johnson, my only complaint is the terrible quality of his few recordings. Between Midnight And Day is the first all-acoustic blues recording that I can say is absolutely flawless in recording quality. This lets Corey Harris's talents shine even more. He is a mere 26-years old, almost as infant as far as blues musicians are concerned. To listen to him, you would think he must have

suffered a lifetime to play the blues with the emotion that he does.

My personal favorite on the cd would have to be the Robert Johnson classic, "Keep Your Lamp Trimm'd And Burning." I don't know what you would trim on a lamp, but Corey does a great job with this song. "I'm A Rattlesnakin' Daddy" is a real upbeat

number to which Harris adds a kazoo to make it more fun. The title track is good, "Between Midnight And Day." I think I have been there too many times. With sixteen tracks, I am sure you can find one that you like.

I have to be honest: the first time that I listened to this cd I was not thrilled. After a few rotations through my cd changer, it really started to grow on me. It is now one of my favorite new cds. It is probably not a cd for everyone, it is probably not a cd for all blues fans, but if you like acoustic delta blues you will love Corey Harris.

The industrial metal scene has collaged a large variety of bands, but one that is sure to stick out would be these guys. Skrew has mixed the heavy guitars from Ministry with vocals similar to that of Nine Inch Nails. The intensity that they put out is sure to get some limb of one's body mov-

ing. The title Shadow of Doubt couldn't be any more truthful. When these guys went in the studio, there couldn't have been a shadow of doubt that this album wouldn't be one of their best. The intro to this album blazes away with the song "She Said." The lyrics left me understanding that this person is pretty fed up with life and couldn't give a rat's butt about it. The overall tone from this song reinforces this anger with quick guitar rhythms and fast drum beats. The variety of songs titled "Head," "Swallow," "Sam I Am," and "Generator" all relate those selfish questions "What about me?" and "What if I?" The meaning and interpretation I picked up from these lyrics left me with an individual's poor outlook on life and desperation to finally end it by giving up; not "giving up" as in suicide but as to be so sick of what life is offering that whatever happens, happens. This album may sound a bit drab and morbid, but contraire! The way these guys present themselves and the songs are anything but that. A song isn't just in the lyrics or in the rhythms, but how one expresses himself. I believe that

## A Tale of Two Kings

From the master word craft himself comes two films which examine the brutality of the human condition. Both films were originally conceived in the form of plays by William Shakespeare. The first film, **Richard III**, tells the story of a power-mad brother's rise to the throne. Although the words were written by Shakespeare, the time period in which performed occurs in the 1930's.

Within this era of fascism, **Richard III** was brilliantly crafted into a powerful work, able to show the timelessness of Shakespeare. The film stars Ian McKellen as Richard the Boar, third brother in line to the throne of England. Maimed and scorned from birth by the Queen Mother, Richard becomes a devious and power-hungry military leader.

Established within the first scene, the audience is exposed to Richard's strength as he invades the enemies stronghold. The camera slowly tracks through the bunker as you hear in the background war updates and the progression of the Boar's army. As the leader sits down to supper, a rumble begins to supersede all other noise, which finally erupts into a tank crashing through

the bunker. The normal sounds of music and ticker reports are suddenly replaced by the heavy breathing of gas masks. As men from the York family attack the command bunker, the audience is shown the true nature of Richard. Cloaked in black and wearing a mask (very Darth Vader-esque), Richard executes the enemy, as a smile comes across his face.

The story continues with Richard's climb to power as he deviously removes both of his brothers from power. The audience is given a tour of

Richard's mind through several cross-overs Richard makes from the story into the audience. Much like the stage play, Richard turns from the action and looks directly into the camera to reveal his innermost thoughts. From this perspective, the audience is able to see Richard's decline into madness as absolute power begins to corrupt absolutely.

The film also stars Annette Bening as Queen Elizabeth, and Robert Downey Jr. as her brother. Both characters become swallowed within Richard's evil, and only through the young Elizabeth (the daughter), can hope be restored. Directed by Richard Loncraine and co-written for the screen by Ian McKellen, **Richard III** delivers the dark tragedy of Shakespeare's play through a cinemagraphic work of art.

The second film this week is available on video cassette. Another transition from stage to screen, **Henry V** is a remarkable re-telling of the age old history. Starring, directed, and written for the screen by Kenneth Branagh (**Frankenstein**, **Much Ado About Nothing**), who portrays the young king who

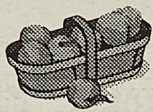

But what held up his smile the

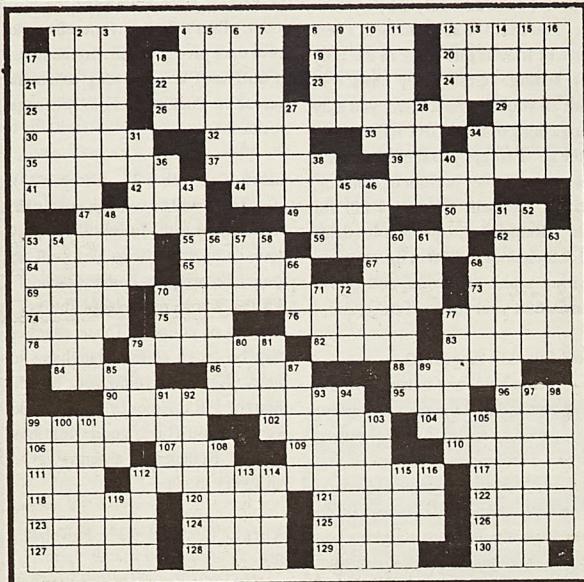
very most were his long term visits on the telephone. The telephone, the telephone, with the cord gone and the speaker on. He would conference away until dawn, but then...

## Students Help the Community

Circle K International is a service organization which does a great deal in the way of helping out their community. For instance, last November, Circle K members from UMR, along with CKI members from other universities and colleges around the state, gutted a house to provide home ownership for a family. The project was sponsored by HOPE 3, a local home ownership program that helps those who are willing to help themselves purchase their very own home.

HOPE 3 is coordinated by the Meramec Regional Planning Commission (MRPC). With HOPE 3, MRPC purchases federally repossessed properties, renovates them and sells them to income-eligible, first-time buyers. MRPC works closely with a large pool of enthusiastic volunteers to renovate these properties to "like new" condition. "Volunteers from all walks of life are the backbone of the HOPE 3 renovation effort," said Barbara Durnin, project manager.

CKI members participated in the first phase of the renovation process, de-construction, which required little experience and skill. The students took a day off from studying to tear down walls, pull up carpet, and knock down a shed. "It was fun to do some hands-on things that we knew would

really help," said Shiloh Kirkland.

CKI members and volunteers were not the only people helping to renovate the house. Those buying a home through HOPE 3 must invest their own time, called "sweat equity," in the renovation effort. In addition, they must be able to finance the house and be able to make the payments on their own. HOPE 3 helps the family find affordable financing, provides the closing costs, and assists with the down payment.

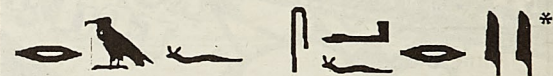
Next Tuesday, Feb. 20, at 6:30 pm, Student Council will be voting

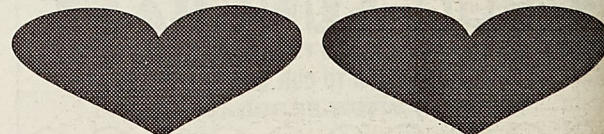

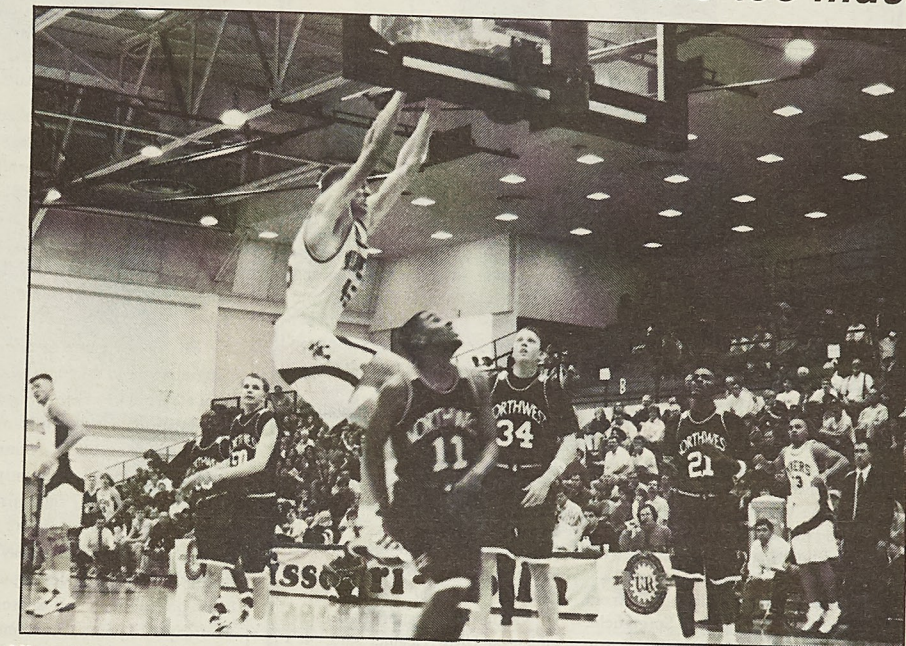

UMR was able to take a lead with just over twelve minutes left, but Missouri Western slowly rebuilt their

## Lady Miner basketball rocks on with two more W's

The Lady Miners rebounded from their loss to Missouri Southern to post two straight victories this past week on the road against Missouri Western 91-80 and at home against Northwest Missouri State 80-66. The two victories moved the Lady Miners' record to 18-5 overall and 9-3 in the MIAA, where they are tied with Washburn for third in the conference, and have clinched a berth for the Lady Miners in the MIAA conference tournament.

A few milestones were reached in the game against Northwest Missouri State. Senior Christie Williams reached two. She reached 1000 point mark for her career when she hit her first shot which was a three pointer early in the first half. She was not alone in reaching this milestone (Miner Tim Holloway also scored his 1000th career point later in the afternoon). She also set the record for career games played when she started the game for the Lady Miners. Junior Heather Hartman reached the 500 rebound mark and also moved into

sixth place on the career rebounding list. Junior Tobi Rees also moved into fourth place in career blocked shots.

The Lady Miners started slowly against Missouri Western. Missouri Western scored the first points of the game and went on a 23-8 run over the first eight minutes of the first half. Faced with a 15 point deficit, the Lady Miners began chipping away at Missouri Western's lead over the rest of the half. They went on a 13-2 run over the next three minutes to cut the lead to four but Missouri Western ran the lead back up to ten in a minute and a half. Once again the Lady Miners answered and fought their way back into the game over the final seven and a half minutes of the first half outscoring Missouri Western 25-13 to end the first half up by two 48-46.

Both teams were red-hot from the field in the first half. The Lady Miners shot 19-28, 67.9% from the field and 2-2 from three point land in the first half. Missouri Western shot 18-33, 54.5% from the field and 6-11 from three point land in the first half. The Lady Miners were able to counter Missouri Western's great three point shooting with great free throw shooting. The

The Lady Miners are continuing their stellar season, only one game out of first place in the MIAA and ranked 4th in the NCAA South Central Region (the top 6 will see NCAA Regional tournament action). One of the Lady Miners' stars this season is 6'-2" junior center, Heather Hartman.

Hartman came to UMR from Lutheran High School in Springfield, Illinois. She came into this season having earned Honorable Mention All-MIAA honors, having been named to the MIAA All-Academic Team, as well as having set a school record with 69 blocked shots in the 1994-95 season.

This season, Hartman has started every game and averages about 13

points and 8 rebounds a game, as well as leading the Lady Miners and the MIAA with 59% shooting from the field. She broke the UMR career blocked shots record last month in the Lady Miners victory over Washburn on January 24.

Heather is very pleased with the Lady Miners this season. "This is the best season we've had since I've been here. I love it. It is a thrill to be on the team." She has high hopes for the Lady Miners saying, "I'd like to see us win the conference and get into the national tournament. We have the potential."

On the complications of being an athlete at UMR Heather said, "It's tough. It's a lot of hard work to balance studying and practice. It's especially hard when we go on road trips, but..." she stressed, "it's very worth it, and it's very possible."

## NCAA, Big Eight fans watch Kansas fall

At the beginning of the season, Big Eight basketball fans were looking forward to the showdown at the Hearn Center between Missouri Tigers (15-8) and the Kansas Jayhawks (19-2).

As the season progressed, the Tigers proved to be an average team in an average conference, while the 'Hawks have flirted with the #1 ranking every week. Saturday's game lived up to the preseason hype, and in spectacular fashion, the Tigers outlasted the Jayhawks by the score of 77-73.

The inside game of KU never materialized, and the guard tandem of Jacque Vaughn and Jerod Hasse was shut down repeatedly. Mizzou won the game with excellent shooting and hitting free throws consistently.

Conversely, KU shot miserably from the field and the charity stripe. For MU fans, the star of the day had to be Simeon Haley. Haley's game has been questionable all season, but Saturday's 13 points, 7 rebounds, and 4 blocked shots shows that he can provide the kind of playmaking that Missouri will need to make a run at a tournament berth. Haley made the gamewinning play with 12 seconds remaining as he stole a pass from

Hasse, and with 2 seconds remaining hit two free throws.

Syracuse (18-6) knocked off a powerhouse Georgetown (19-5) team by 21 points, a reversal of fortunes after a loss three weeks ago to Georgetown. An aggressive Orangemen defense held Hoya hotshot Allen Iverson to 14 points, and the Hoya team to 23-53 shooting for the field. The Hoyas couldn't get it done at the line either, with 17 of 37 shooting. The Hoyas, 9-4 in Big East play, have a one game lead over the Orangemen, 8-5.

My favorite troublemaking team, the Villanova Wildcats (20-3), are still winning. Jason Lawson scored 22 points, 18 in the second half, as the 'Cats defeated Rutgers (6-14) by the score of 76-64. Rutgers was within four points with under four minutes to play, but Lawson took advantage of Rutgers foul trouble to score 10 points in three minutes. My unknown favorite, Zeffy Penn, scored points for the 'Cats and hit a key 3-pointer.

Georgia Tech (15-10) used the outside shot of Drew Barry to down the North Carolina Tar Heels (16-7) in OT in Durham, NC. Barry sank 9 of Tech's 16 3-pointers, and he also had a key assist to Stephon Marbury with one minute remaining in OT to put the Yellow Jackets ahead 85-80. Barry led all scorers with 30 points. Marbury had 15 points, and extended his streak of scoring at least ten

points to 25 games. Marbury is the only player in the Atlantic Coast Conference to score in double figures in every game this season.

The Bonehead Play of the Week Award goes to KU guard Jerod Hasse for an ill-timed pass. With the game winding down, and KU down, Hasse attempted to pass the ball inside to Scot Pollard, but instead passed to MU's Simeon Haley. Haley wrapped up the ball, was fouled, and eventually hit two free throws to seal the MU victory.

Hasse was quoted as saying: "Poor play, poor decision. I just misread it." Well, Mr. Hasse, you are a starting guard for the #3 team in the country. Your job is to make the play, especially in the waning seconds of a game you are losing. I'd say you failed with flair. I just hope that when KU is in the Final Four you don't "just misread it."

## OUT OF BOUNDS The agony of defeat

The thrill of victory, the agony of defeat. Both were felt on Saturday as the Lady Miners strengthened their position for a possible conference championship, and the Miners lost the game that all but sealed the championship for the Northwest Bearcats.

There was a lot of hype going into the afternoon contest between the Miners and the #8, MIAA leading Bearcats of Northwest Missouri State. UMR was coming off of a five game winning streak after a relatively easy victory Wednesday at Missouri Western. The fact that it was a day game no doubt turned many would be attendees away, but there was still a sizeable crowd on hand.

It was a hard fought, exciting game all of the way, and the Miners had difficulty in executing and made a few critical mistakes. It was a hard game to lose, since victory would have put the Miners in posi-

tion for their first MIAA championship in twenty years. I feel that despite what many saw as questionable officiating towards the end of the game, credit needs to go where credit is due. Northwest has a great basketball team. They played well at every position, and were the first team that really addressed UMR's multi-faceted offensive scheme with a match-up zone.

It's not over yet. Northwest may have the conference crown locked up, but the Miners can still earn an opportunity at redemption. Solid play in the rest of the season could earn UMR a second or third place finish in the MIAA. That would give UMR at least the first and maybe the second round of the MIAA tournament at home. (It would also most likely keep UMR in the top six of the NCAA Division II South Central Region, giving the Miners NCAA Div. II tournament play.) That could very well set up an MIAA tournament game between UMR and Northwest in Maryville. It won't be easy,

and the odds would be against the Miners, but given the right set of circumstances I feel that UMR could beat that team.

In some ways I like the fact that this team is now having to scramble its way back to the top. The Miners this season seem to be a team that does well when their backs are against the wall. The Miners also have just as strong a record on the road as they do at home in conference (however they have played a tougher home schedule). This Miner team has proven that they can win basketball games on the road.

Although a game out of the lead in the MIAA, the Lady Miners are still in the hunt for an MIAA championship/co-championship (or whatever they call it win three or four teams tie for the lead). That's right, the way things are going in the conference now, it is very possible that UMR could tie with Central, Pitt State, and Washburn for the MIAA crown. UMR and Washburn are both a game behind Central and Pitt

State. The final day of play, February 24, has Pitt State coming to Rolla and Central making a trip to Topeka to face Washburn.

I do feel that these teams will be hosting the first round of the MIAA tournament, and presently they comprise the third through sixth spots in the NCAA Division II South Central Region. What order will they be in come the end of the month? Don't ask me.

To summarize, it's a mess out there, but the good news is that both UMR teams are in that mess, and you never know what might happen. Just keep your eye on the Missouri Miner for future developments, and if your interested in more up-to-date standings and statistics, I recommend you checking out the UMR Sports Information home page on the world wide web (<http://www.umn.edu/~jkean>). The page is run by UMR Sports Information Director (and new daddy), John Kean, who is responsible for giving the Miner access

to all of the stuff we need to cover UMR sports.

There was a little incident at the game on Saturday allegedly involving UMR students who were escorted from the game. I do not have any solid facts, and the Athletic office has deferred comment to the University Police. The University Police are presently not commenting, only because the sergeant on duty was not available when I called. I will hopefully have a more detailed report next week.

I can only recommend that we as fans try to conduct ourselves in a sportsmanlike manner. Gale Bullman is presently one of the, if not the, loudest gym in the MIAA. We provide our team with a great deal of support, and taunting the other team could have a negative effect. It could fire them up as team against a hostile crowd. They are

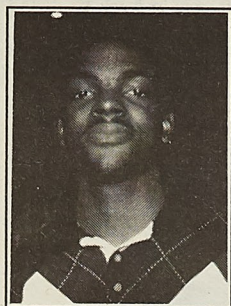

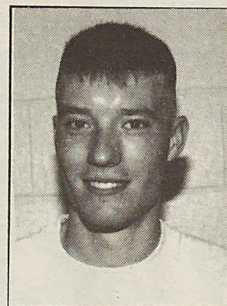

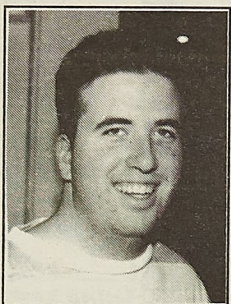

to place spring break on the second week of March. The rumors that I hear right now are to place spring break the first week of March, which would require moving the St. Pat's celebration back to the week after St. Patrick's Day, as opposed to the week before St. Patrick's Day, as it is now. But what if the forces for placing spring break right on top of St. Patrick's Day win? Then UMR would have to move St. Pat's to the weekend two weeks after St. Patrick's Day. It wouldn't really be a St. Pat's celebration then. It would be like celebrating Christmas on January 7.

I believe that if the faculty representatives from UMR had been united to preserve our St. Pat's tradition, we would at least be assured that spring break not fall right on top of St. Pat's. However, only Dr. Gelles voted against this resolution. Dr. Moss abstained, and Dr. Day voted in favor of it! I believe Dr. Day was representing his own interests, rather than doing his responsibility of representing the interests of this campus. It is true that not all faculty or students, for that matter, are gung-ho for St. Pat's. However, the combined interests of the alumni, fac-

ulty, students, and Rolla community require any representative for the Rolla campus to defend the St. Pat's tradition. Dr. Day did not fulfill this responsibility, and to a lesser degree, neither did Dr. Moss.

My opinion right now is to wait and see what comes of the rumor that spring break will fall on the first week of March. If this is the case, I think it will probably be OK for UMR. It would mean that St. Pat's would fall the week after St. Patrick's Day, rather than the week before, and would not be significantly further from the actual St. Patrick's Day than the current celebration is. However, if it looks like spring break will fall on St. Pat's, students will have to be ready to speak out. Watch the Miner for updates, and I will do my best to make sure that we have a St. Pat's celebration in the future, not because it is perfect now, but because we should have the right to improve it ourselves, and not have it taken from us by Columbia for no good reason.

while Missouri Western was only slightly better at 42.9%.

In the second half, the teams came out and traded early baskets. McClain then hit three threes in under two minutes. The Miners then went on a 14-2 run, including six by McClain, four by Jeff Kokal. Missouri Western was down by eleven before they were able to respond. The Miners were able to control the game from this point forward, allowing the Griffins to pull within five only once, with just over five minutes left.

The Miners were led by Tim Holloway, with 15 points and two assists, Michael McClain, who also scored 15, and dished out five, Scott Rush, who had twelve points, Jamie Brueggeman, who contributed eleven points and eleven boards and last but not least Jeff Kokal, who had some key baskets and ended up with 10 points. The Miners shot fairly well in the game, shooting 44.8% from the field, including twelve of 28 from three-point range. Their defense was able to limit Missouri Western to only 37% from the field in the second half, which spelled the difference in the game.

After this win, the Miners were in second place, with league leading Northwest Missouri State coming to play in Rolla on Saturday. Northwest was 16-4 overall, 9-2 in league play, and ranked eighth in the NCAA Divi-

sion II poll. The Miners were a game behind at 17-4, 8-3 in the MIAA.

The game started out with the Miners having problems shooting the basketball. The Miners went scoreless in a four minute stretch from 15:12 to 11:14 of the first half. Given this shooting, the Bearcats were able to build a nine point lead at the halfway point. Northwest was playing very good defense, as their guards swarmed ours, playing very tight man defense, not allowing open shots.

Due to this, the Miner guards were unable to score for a thirteen minute stretch of the first half. UMR's big men stepped up and kept the Miners in the game, with Brueggeman getting six straight points, Jeff Kokal getting four in a row, and Ryan Matthews contributing two in this stretch. Freshman Cam Lindsey finally broke the guards out of the slump with two free throws, followed by a three point bucket, followed by two more free throws, all without an answer from Northwest, cutting their twelve point to five. In fact, Northwest was unable to score in the last three minutes of the first half. The Miners had stepped up the defense. Tim Holloway hit a three to pull within two, and Cam Lindsey tied it with two more free throws.

Lindsey scored nine points in the last 2:35 of the first half to almost single-handedly tie the Bearcats. He

also led the team in rebounds for the first half. Jamie Brueggeman was able to get ten points in the first half. The Miners shot 47.6%, while the Bearcats shot 33% from the field. Northwest outrebounded UMR by a 22-18 margin.

The Miners started out the second half cold, allowing the Bearcats to score the first eight points of the half. UMR was unable to score in the first five minutes of the half. The Miners were not out of the game yet. UMR went on a 17-5 run to go up by four. Northwest fought back and the teams exchanged the lead three times in a two minute stretch. The Miners took a timeout after a Northwest three, and the Bearcats came out and went up by six. UMR did not quit, and was able to pull within three with just over a minute left. The Miners were forced to foul Northwest, and the Bearcats sealed the game with six straight free throws, while the Miners were unable to hit the necessary three points. The final score was Northwest 72-UMR 63.

The Miners were led by Tim Holloway, who had twelve points. With these points, Holloway becomes just the 18th player in UMR history to score 1000 points in his career (Lady Miner Christie Williams reached the mark in the first game of the twinbill). Terry Smith had 15 points, Jeff Kokal

had twelve, and Jamie Brueggeman had ten. Brueggeman also had four rebounds, to move him into the eight place in career rebounds. Michael McClain had eleven assists.

Northwest Missouri State won the game on the boards, with 36 total rebounds, including 14 offensive rebounds. UMR mustered only 25 rebounds, four on the offensive glass. Also, the Miners had five more turnovers. Due to these disparities, the Bearcats got 13 more field goal attempts. They were able to convert enough of these to win, especially as they shot .556 in the second half.

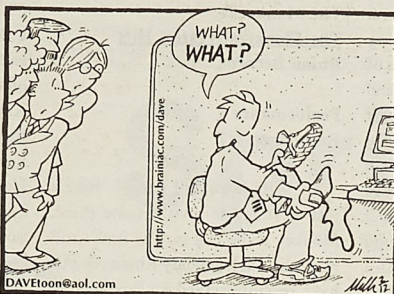
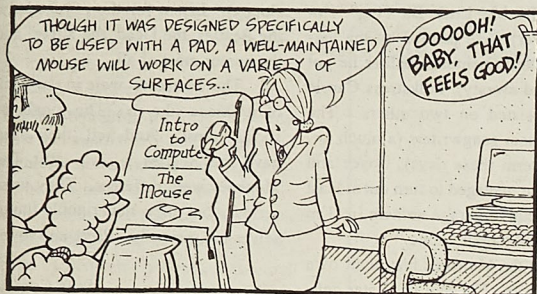
With this victory, Northwest improved to 10-2 in the MIAA, while UMR fell to 8-4. There are four games left in conference play before the league tournament. Assistant coach Todd Franklin said, "We'll have to play them at their place, but we'll be alright." Furthermore, he went on to say that UMR most likely needs three or four more wins to get into the NCAA tournament. In this quest, the Miners have to travel to St. Louis to take on UMSL Wednesday. UMSL defeated UMR in Rolla by one point on January 10. It will be a tough game, but one the Miners are capable of winning. On Saturday, UMR travels to Southwest Baptist, a team that is fighting for berth in the MIAA post-season tournament.

### The Monkees The Monkees Greatest Hits Rhino Records

Life been dull lately? Here's just the thing to give it some shine. Monkey shine that is. The rock'n'roll revivalists at legendary Rhino records have recently served up this animal-

sized helping of rock nostalgia guaranteed to elicit a grunt, if nothing else. First, some background is in order. Were the Monkees a real band? Yes and no. In the sense that the group's chicken and egg beginning, which hatched both the band and their precursing NBC hit T.V. show, grew from four unknown individuals auditioning for television roles, well, no. But, beneath the harried exterior, the band materialized to somewhat more. Consider that two of these songs, ("Little Bit Me, Little Bit You," "I'm a Believer) were penned by the legendary Neil Diamond (before he got older and sweaty). Folkstress Carole King assisted on two others. The band's main songwriters (a much unknown term these days), Boyce and Hart, even managed to turn out at least one definitive garage anthem in "I'm not Your Steppin' Stone."

Did the Monkees play their own instruments. Yes and no. Later defi-

nately band members are listed as instrumentalists on the credits (but who knows how often they were even plugged in at first). As well, there is a host of timely mega talent throughout: Leon Russell, Glen Campbell, Roger McGuinn (the Byrds), Danny Kortchmar (a studio guitarist who's played on probably every commercial you've ever heard, etc.)

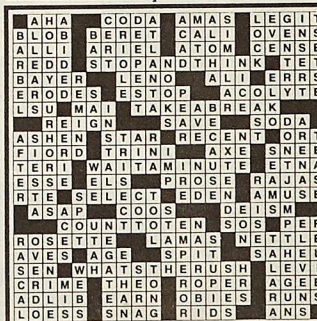

tuition of graduate students for all four campuses; however, each campus would have the ability to charge additional fees to particular programs that may require more investment on the part of the university.

Several students voiced concerns as to whether these additional fees would be fed directly back into their program or if they might be used for other university purposes.

Deaton answered this by commenting that provisions could be made to ensure the majority of the money generated by additional fees would return to the department.

Forum participants also examined a table discussing college affordability over the past twenty-three years. The figures showed that median family income has increased just over 26 percent and the net cost of school as a percent of income has decreased just over 11 percent. However, if the first line of the chart was deleted, meaning the analysis would start in 1975 as opposed to 1963, the figures would change drastically. Median family income has increased just over 20 dollars per year in just over 20 years, and the net cost of school as a percent of income has only decreased by about four and a half percent.

Students suggested that possibly the figures need to be studied more in terms of recent trends and that the amount of taxes paid by each family that go toward education be taken into account when determining what a family pays for a college education.

Following that, participants discussed a tuition cap and a revolving tuition, two areas not covered in the report. Both programs serve to encourage students financially to graduate in the traditional four years, as opposed to five or more that has become the standard of late.

The tuition cap would level rates at 15 hours, in hopes that students would then take 16 or more in order to receive some free. The revolving tuition hopes to encourage the same by allowing students to pay the same rates for four years, after which time the rates will increase to the new levels.

The Task Force encourages students to offer suggestions and voice concerns. Any member of the Task Force will hear ideas and suggestions and copies of all of the paperwork are available in the StuCo office.

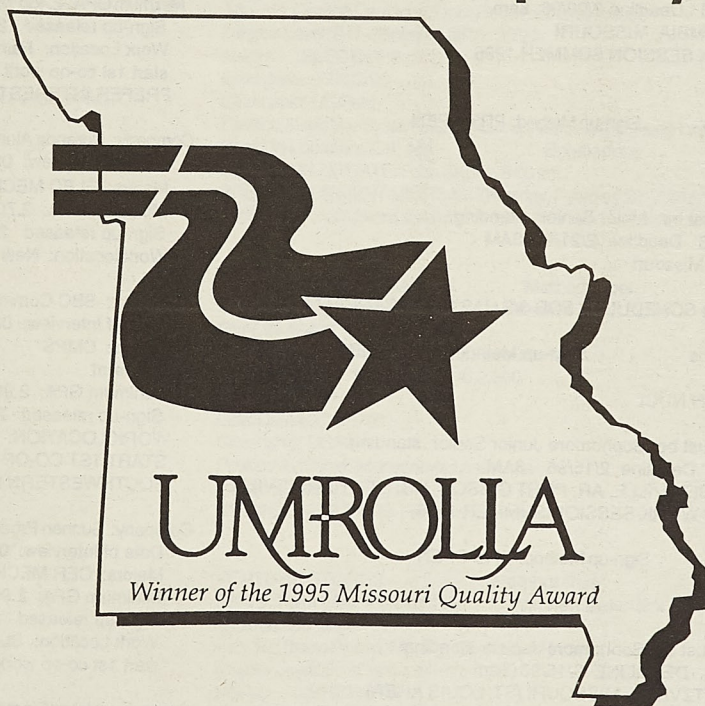
My whole intention today is to

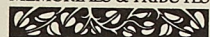

Lady Miners went to the charity stripe 13 times and hit on 8 of them. Becky Reichard and Heather Hartman lead the Lady Miners in scoring in the first half with 14 and 13 points respectively.

The second half was a different story. Neither team was able to take control of the game. The Lady Miners opened the half with a 6-2 to lead by four but Missouri Western came back and regained the lead and extend it to as many as seven points. After leading at the 17:49 mark, the Lady Miners would not see the lead again until the 7:00 mark. Once the Lady Miners erased most Missouri Western's lead, the two teams traded baskets for the next five minutes. The Lady Miners swapped the lead nine times with Missouri Western before the Lady Miners took control of the lead with about four minutes to play in the game.

The Lady Miner defense stepped up over the last five minutes and allowed Missouri Western to score just two points while the Lady Miners took advantage of Missouri Western's fouling and made 6-6 free throws down the

stretch to pull away en-route to an eleven point victory.

Both teams cooled off in the second half. Even though the Lady Miners cooled off, they still shot 17-34 from the field for 50% while Missouri Western dropped off to 15-33 shooting from the field for 45.5% and 4-11 from three point land. The Lady Miners really cashed in at the free throw line in the second half. They went to the charity stripe eight times and hit all eight of them.

The Lady Miners were lead by Becky Reichard with 21 points and Heather Hartman also with 21 points and 11 rebounds. Tobi Rees scored 14 points and pulled down 6 rebounds and Christie Williams scored 13 points and also had 7 assists and 0 turnovers. Also scoring were Jamie Martens with 6 points, Jen Arnason and Beth Ragsdale each with 4 points apiece.

Last Saturday afternoon, the Lady Miners dominated Northwest Missouri State in a fourteen point victory 80-66. Both teams started the first half playing rather sloppily, but the Lady Miners

were able to find the basket and held a ten point advantage with fourteen minutes to play in the half. The two teams would trade baskets over the next five minutes until the Lady Miners extended their lead to 15 with seven minutes to play in the half. Northwest Missouri State would never overcome the Lady Miners double digit lead over the final seven minutes of the half. The closest Northwest could get would be eleven when they scored the last four points of the half. The Lady Miners went into the locker room with an eleven point advantage 37-26.

The Lady Miners had a strong first half shooting 17-38 for 44.7% from the field and 3-9 for 33.3% from three point land. Northwest Missouri was only able to hit on 10-29 for 34.5% from the field and only 1-6 from behind the arc. Northwest's only advantage over the Lady Miners in the first half was that they were able to visit the free throw line 9 times but were only able to connect on 5 of them while the Lady Miners were unable to get to the free throw line during the first half. Becky

Reichard led the Lady Miners with 10 points in the first half and Andrea Bermudez contributed 5 assists.

The Lady Miners opened the second half with a 9-2 run over the first five and a half minutes of the half to lead by 18 with 14:32 to play in the game. The two teams once again traded baskets for next five minutes. Over that stretch the Lady Miners were up by as many as 20 points. Northwest Missouri was able to cut the Lady Miner lead to eleven with seven minutes to play in the half but would never be able to get any closer. The Lady Miners kept the double digit lead the rest of the way and went on to be victorious 80-66. The Lady Miners continued their dominance into the second half.

Their shooting improved in the second half. They shot 15-28 from the field for 53.6% and also were 2-3 from three point land. Northwest outshot the Lady Miners 41-28 but were only able to connect on 16 shots to shoot 39% from the field.

This half the Lady Miners were able to make in to the free throw line

where they attempted 13 shots and hit 11 of them.

Leading the Lady Miners was Becky Reichard who scored 19 points. Following Becky was Tobi Rees who scored 17 points and also pulled down 10 rebounds and added 3 blocked shots. Heather Hartman and Christie Williams each added 10 a piece. Hartman recorded 8 rebounds and also 3 blocked shots. Williams add 5 assists and 3 steals. Andrea Bermudez added 6 points and 8 assists. Amber Fischer recorded 8 points and 4 rebounds in 12 minutes relieving Hartman and Rees.

This week the Lady Miners will put their MIAA title hopes on the line as they will be traveling to St. Louis to face the Riverwomen of UMSL and then will travel again to Bolivar Missouri where the Lady Miners will be facing Southwest Baptist. Also congratulations to Becky Reichard for being named the "MIAA Player of the Week" for the week of January 28 to February 3 where she averaged 22 points per game and was 7-12 from three point land.

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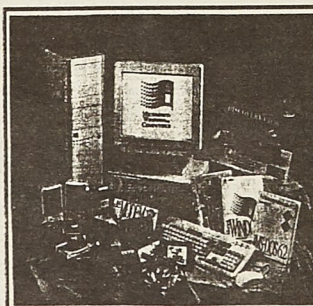
