## Suicide claims another UMR student

With last semester's suicide of Damon Griffey still lingering in their recent collective memory, UMR students must now cope with the loss of another classmate.

UMR junior Brandon Bowser was found dead in his Altman dorm room last Friday. Bowser apparently died by his own hand from strangulation.

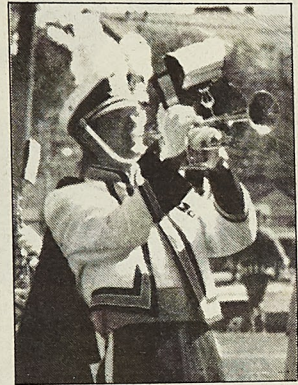
"Mr. Bowser had apparently strangled himself," Director of Residential Life James Murphy said. "There were no other related outward signs that were evident when the body was found."

Bowser's body was discovered when his roommate returned from spring break. The roommate called the University Police who responded to the scene. Coroner Larry Swinford pronounced Bowser dead at approximately 8 p.m. Friday.

University Police Chief Bill Bleckman confirmed that Bowser had hanged himself. He also said that

Bowser had left a note that indicated the reasons he had for taking his own life. Bleckman declined comment on the details of the note's contents.

Bleckman made it clear that, "There are no indications that it was

anything other than a suicide."

Many UMR students may remember the suicide of Damon Griffey last December, making this year "unusual" according to Bleckman. "I've been here

for 24 years, and up to now there has been fewer than one student suicide per year," Bleckman said.

Bleckman also noted that this was the only on campus suicide that he could remember in those 24 years.

Bowser was a 22 year old mechanical engineering student from Farmersville, Ohio. Funeral arrangements will be held in Ohio.

According to Murphy, counseling services have been made available to Bowser's roommate as well as any other Altman residents. Other living accommodations have also been made for Bowser's roommate.

At least half a dozen other people are affected by each suicide, say medical health experts. In particular, when a student takes his or her own life, the entire campus is at risk of having another suicide.

As for the possibility of creating new suicide prevention measures, Murphy said, "Residents' welfare has been and will continue to be a priority in this department's programs and services. We do not have any immediate plans to do anything more in this regard beyond activities that would already be offered to residents."

## Donation to fund renovation

Former University of Missouri Curator Fred S. Kummer and his wife, June Kummer, have pledged \$1.25 million to help fund the proposed renovation and new addition to the University of Missouri-Rolla's Butler-Carlton Civil Engineering Building.

Fred Kummer earned a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from UMR in 1955. Kummer issued the pledge of \$250,000 per year over the next five years as a challenge to other civil engineering graduates.

UMR plans to use the money for an 82,600 square-foot addition and renovation to the existing 48,800 square-foot civil engineering building. The addition will house equipment and additional office, classroom, and laboratory space, including laboratories for structures and environmental research. The total

project cost will be \$20,789,028, and the campus plans to raise \$4,158,000 of the cost from private funds and other sources.

"Gifts of this magnitude only come from people who care very much for the University of Missouri-Rolla," said Chancellor John T. Park.

"This most generous gift from Fred and June Kummer will not only enhance the civil engineering department," Park continued, "but will also help give our students the education that they deserve as leaders in engineering as we meet the challenges of the 21st century."

Kummer is chairman, president, and treasurer of HBE (Hospital Building and Equipment Corporation), formerly Kummer Construction Company of St. Louis. He was a member of the UM Board of Curators from 1987 to 1993. June Kummer, who received a degree in architecture from Washington University in St. Louis, advises HBE Corp. in the area of landscape de-

## ChemE government advocacy committee presents seminar

In today's political climate of government budget cuts and constraints, it becomes increasingly difficult to find agencies and programs that provide the much needed technical information to legislators.

This is why independently sponsored programs, like Catalyst, are important.

Catalyst is a grassroots government advocacy program formed by the Government Relations arm of the national chapter of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers (AICChE). The program was designed to provide an avenue for professionals in chemical engineering to impact national legislation concerning their field. This is done mainly by correspondence be-

tween Catalyst members and national representatives.

Over the weekend of April 4, Dustin Olson, Eric Pape, Scott Moll, and Justin Sutherland, four UMR Catalyst members, presented a seminar to their fellow AICChE members at a regional conference in Fayetteville, Arkansas. The topic of the seminar was the new direction that their student chapter has taken with the Catalyst program.

In January of this year, AICChE at UMR became the first student chapter in the nation to start a committee built around the Catalyst concept.

Dustin Olson, a Catalyst member and seminar presenter, believes that, "having a committee, rather than having individualized Catalyst members as the national

program is designed, is important because it allows a place where individual efforts and points of view can be shared to effectively benefit everyone."

The committee, spearheaded by

AICChE Government Relations offices in Washington, D.C.

The national connections and exposure don't end there, though. In the coming weeks, UMR's Catalyst Com-

mittee will be featured in the AICChExtra and Chapter One national newsletters. With the enthusiasm received at the regional conference, there are plans to take the Catalyst Committee Seminar to the AICChE National Convention in Los Angeles next semester.

Notes Justin Sutherland, Research Chair of the committee, "I don't think any of us had a clue when we started out in the Catalyst Committee that we would get this kind of attention. It definitely gives us something to be proud of, not only as chemical engineers, but as representatives of UMR."

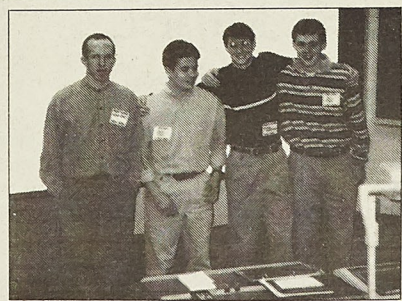

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## UMR research featured on Discovery

Research on pieces of steel from the *Titanic* shipwreck that is being conducted at the University of Missouri-Rolla will be featured on a documentary to air Sunday, April 20, on The Discovery Channel.

The research of Dr. Phil Leighly, professor emeritus of metallurgical engineering at UMR, and other UMR researchers involved in the

project will be featured in "Titanic: Anatomy of a Disaster," a two-hour documentary on the *Titanic* that originally aired last Sunday on the

Discovery Channel. For those who missed the program, it will be rerun on Sunday, April 20.

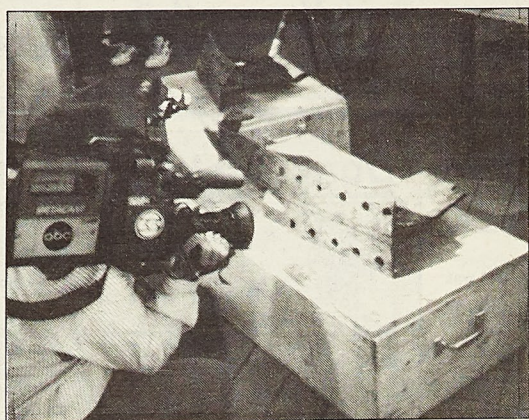
The luxury ocean liner *Titanic* sank in the early morning hours of April 15, 1912. More than 1,500 of the liner's 2,227 passengers died after the *Titanic* struck an iceberg in the Atlantic Ocean,

and began the most comprehensive study ever of the ocean liner's metal.

In December, a camera crew from The Discovery Channel began filming the work of Leighly; Dr. Chris Ramsay, an associate professor of metallurgical engineering; Scott Miller, a teaching associate in metallurgical engineering; and Katie Felkins, an undergraduate student in metallurgical engineering at UMR.

Leighly is one of eight researchers on the Marine Forensic Panel, which is preparing a report — titled "How and Why Did the *Titanic* Really Sink?" — for the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers.

Leighly also delivered a lecture on Monday in commemoration of the 85th anniversary of the legendary disaster.

## Mechanical Engineering students participate in contest

The Mechanical Engineering 161 Design Competition will be held on April 21 at 6:30 p.m. in room 104 of the Mechanical Engineering Building.

This semester's project is to design a remote controlled vehicle with a size limit of one cubic foot. The machines, designed by the students, are required to pick up a racquetball located in a slot at the foot of a hill; transport the ball

uphill and drop it into one of the holes located on the hill. The hill has a changing slope with one hole at the end of each slope. Higher point values are assigned to the holes at the end of steeper slopes. There is a belt hanging above the center of each side of the track, running from the bottom to the top of the hill.

Each design group has been issued a budget of \$200. Students pick up the necessary material from the class warehouse and their accounts are charged accordingly.

There will be three games during the contest. In each game the vehicle

will have two minutes to compete. The winning vehicle is the one which accumulates the maximum number of points in all three games.

There will be 20 vehicles competing. Among these vehicles, several run on the belt but most of them are ground vehicles. Most of the students have carefully followed the design process learned in class and have worked very hard to generate what they feel will be a winning design.

Everyone is welcome to attend the competition and root on the participants. The event is scheduled to last until about 8:30 or 9:00 p.m.

## Mucking teams victorious again

## ROCKO'S REVIEWS: THE SAINT

From its roots as a 1960's television series, *The Saint* has been remade into a 1990's blockbuster movie in similar fashion as *The Fugitive* and *Mission: Impossible*.

Based on a series of novels by Leslie Charteris, the television series ran for seven years, beginning in 1962, and starred Roger Moore, of James Bond fame, as the Saint.

In the recently released film version, Val Kilmer stars as the morally centered thief with a knack for disguises and seducing women, while all the time never being anything less than a gentleman.

The updated Saint is nothing short of a cyber-surfing, techno-gadget wielding super thief who enjoys all of the conveniences of modern life.

**The Take:**

Simon Templar (Val Kilmer)-The Saint-is hired by a Russian mafia boss (Rade Serbedzija) to steal the scientific secrets of "cold fusion" from Dr. Emma Russell (Elisabeth Shue). The mafia boss wants to use Dr. Russell's discovery for cheap, unlimited energy to heighten his bid as a candidate for the Russian presidency.

But the Saint is smitten by the beauty and romanticisms of Dr. Russell and is forced to choose between her love and completing the job he was hired to do.

**Rocko's Two Cents:**

James Bond meets *Mission: Impossible* is probably the best way to describe *The Saint*.

The story is anything but believable. That's okay, though. The movie's entertainment factor comes in with the high tech gadgets, spy-like antics and action surrounding the title character. If you can get into the movie, the action scenes tend to be good vehicles for getting a bit of an adrenaline boost.

The only noticeable drawback to *The Saint* was some of the drolling music on the soundtrack. It's not that it was bad music. Rather, in some scenes, it seemed to be out of place.

Otherwise, *The Saint* is fast paced, entertaining and well worth the student price for a ticket.

The long awaited CD release of *The More Things Change* has been somewhat more of a when thing then more of the I can't wait thing. Many fans of Machine Head have been dying for this release; its being postponed for three months has driven fans crazy.

*Burn My Eyes* was an unparalleled album in the eyes of many hard core music lovers, and most couldn't even dream of what was to be on this album. The album was released late March and hopes of passing the popularity of the last album could only be a dream.

The songs on *The More Things Change* are not quite as heavy in my opinion as well as many of the respondents on the internet. The vocals are not quite as raspy and have a stronger singing influence to them.

As everyone knows though, these guys are not your normal La-Ti-Da choir. Robb Flynn's voice can only do so much, and stressing it to be a Babyface melody maker isn't going to happen.

So go get yourself a copy, turn down the lights, turn up the volume and let Morphine take you under.

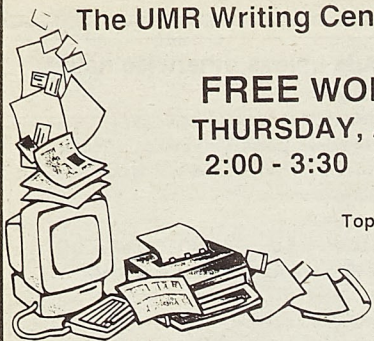

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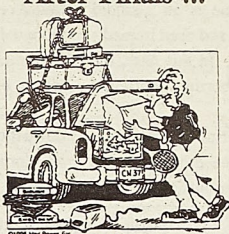

# Circle K International hosts National Marrow Donor Program drive

Circle K International is sponsoring its Third Annual Bone Marrow Drive April 22 from noon to 5 p.m. on the second floor of UC-East. Minorities are free, and Circle K intends to sponsor 100 Caucasians on a first come, first serve basis. Only blood is given at the drive, but one day you may have the chance to save somebody's life by giving bone marrow.

The National Marrow Donor Program (NMDP) was created in 1987 to provide bone marrow transplants from volunteer, unrelated donors to patients with leukemia, aplastic anemia, lymphomas and other life-threatening diseases.

The unique characteristics of an individual's marrow are genetically inherited, the same way that hair and eye color are inherited. Therefore, an exact genetic match is necessary for the best chance of a successful bone marrow transplant. Although a patient's best chance for finding that match is within his or her family, only 25-30% of all people will ever match a family member. 70-75% of all patients will

have to turn to the general public for help. That fact is the reasoning behind the creation of the NMDP.

Currently, more than two million volunteers have joined the National Registry -- agreeing to donate a little of their marrow if ever they are matched with a patient in need of a transplant to live.

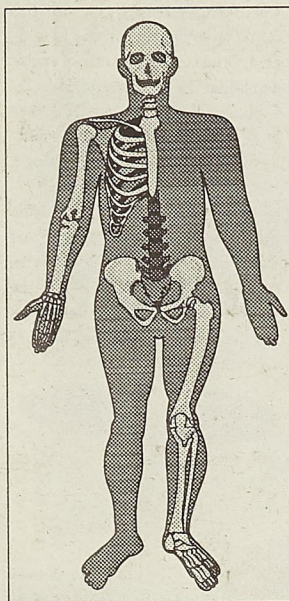
Because of the genetic match required, patients searching for an unrelated donor will most likely need a donor of the same race or ethnic group. Caucasians have been very involved with the bone marrow program since its inception, making up 83% of the Registry. As a result, the NMDP is able to find an initial match for the 70% of the Caucasian patients searching the Registry.

African-Americans, however, comprise only 6.4% of the Registry, which has allowed only 105 black patients, across the entire United States, to be transplanted since 1987. An African-American has only a 30% chance of finding a lifesaving match.

There is a similar shortage of donors from other racial and ethnic minorities such as Asian, Pacific Islander, American Indian and Hispanic. Caucasians who cannot find a first level match can be as difficult to match as minority patients.

It's easy to register with the NMDP through its local St. Louis donor center, Heart of American Bone Marrow Donor Registry. All it takes is two tablespoons of blood taken from a vein in the

arm. Donors must be willing to help any patient in the program. Potential donors must also be in good general health, between the ages of 18 and 59, within weight guidelines and at low risk for HIV and other infectious dis-



eases. An initial health screening is done, but a complete infectious disease workup is not done until the potential donor reaches the third and final level of blood testing.

Each volunteer's tissue typing is entered into the national computer bank, where doctors around the world are constantly checking for a genetic

match with their dying patients. If a match is found between the time you join and your 60th birthday, additional blood test will be required to assure a perfect match.

If you are chosen as the donor, a complete physical is done, and you are admitted to an accredited marrow collection center in your area (in St. Louis, Barnes or St. Louis University Hospital). While you are under anesthesia, less than 5% of your liquid marrow is drawn with a special needle and syringe from the back of the large hip bones. The procedure is painless because of the anesthesia.

Afterwards, the donor is likely to experience temporary muscles soreness lasting up to several days, but this is relieved with Tylenol or another analgesic. There is usually a one night stay in the hospital, with all expenses paid by the recipient of the marrow. Most donors are discharged on a Friday or Saturday and return to work the following Monday.

The marrow is hand carried to the transplant center, where the patient is hospitalized and waiting for the transplant. The marrow is infused into the patient, similar to the administration of a blood transfusion.

For 7-10 days before the transplant, the marrow recipient receives massive doses of chemotherapy and radiation to destroy all of his or her diseased bone marrow and to make room for the new marrow to grow. This new marrow will, hopefully, engraft

and begin producing healthy blood, and a healthy immune system, for the patient.

It takes about 30 days to know if the transplant has "taken." If the transplant is successful, the marrow recipient will take on the blood type of the donor, because the new marrow will manufacture the donor's blood in the recipient's body.

The NMDP and Heart of American place a high priority on making lifesaving transplants available to all patients. The local St. Louis lab fee for initial human leukocyte testing is a tax-deductible \$45 per person. When registering at a prearranged "bone marrow drive," federal matching funds can often be obtained to reduce the cost to \$22.50.

If additional funds can be raised before the drive, testing may be free at that event only. In order to improve the odds for minority patients, a federal grant provides free genetic tissue typing for all minorities interesting in joining the Registry.

Regardless of the situation, lack of money should never keep any motivated individual from joining the marrow program. A waiting list for free testing is available at Heart of America for those who cannot donate the \$45 to cover their lab fee.

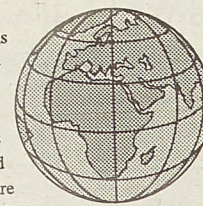

Tinker is home to the 552nd Air Control Wing, Navy STRATCOM Wing I and the Tinker Air Logistics Center. The base visit culminated with a tour of the B-1B bomber and the E-3B Sentry Air Warning and Control Systems (AWACS) aircraft.

## Allen Moore visits Film Fest



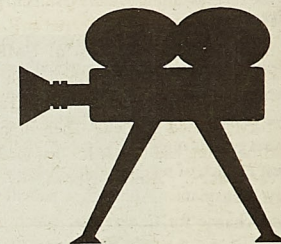

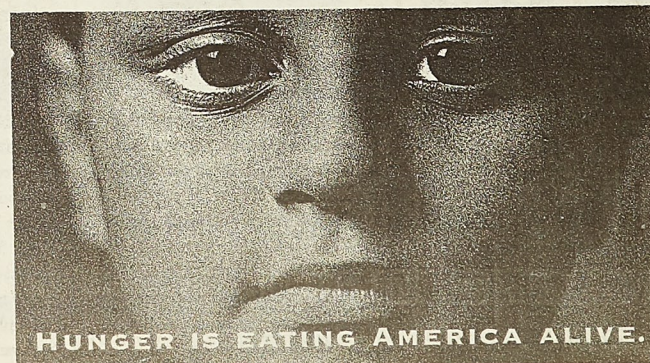

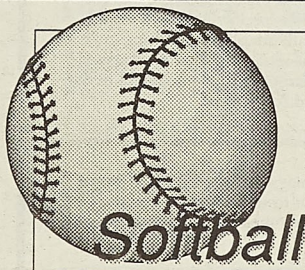
A Lady Miner softball player slides into second during a recent home game. The Lady Miners will host McKendree today at 3 p.m. The Lady Miners are 26-12.

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# UMR Miner Baseball 12-14-2 overall ; 9-12 in MIAA

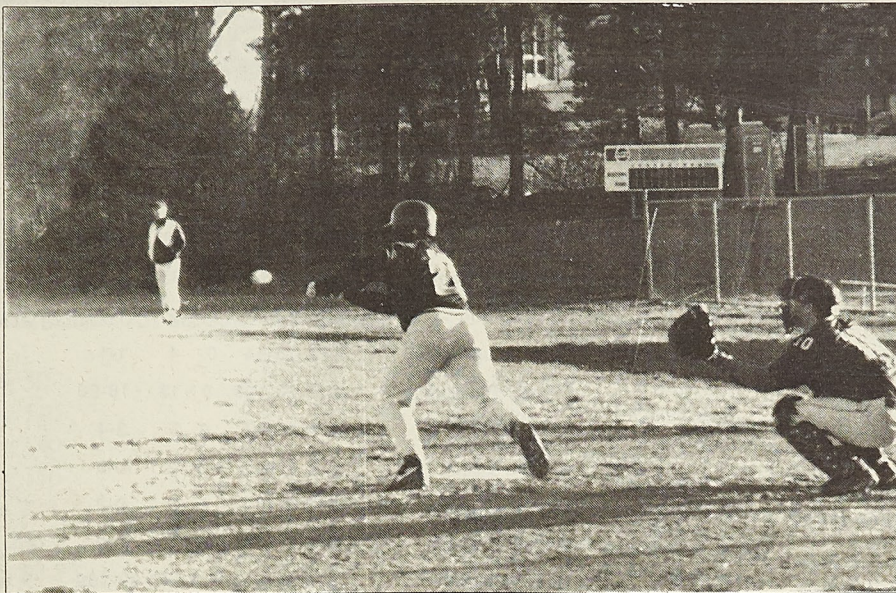

The UMR baseball team played two doubleheaders over spring break, going 1-3 in those games, and now find themselves with a 12-14-2 record overall and 9-12 in the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association. Despite the teams recent losses - they've dropped four of their last five - they are still in contention to land a spot in the MIAA conference tournament, something they haven't done in ten years.

The Miner's most recent doubleheader was at Emporia State University, where they took on the 18-8 Emporia State Hornets. UMR lost the first game 4-3, giving up the game-winning run in the bottom of the seventh of a tie game and won the second game by scoring runs in the fourth and fifth innings to give them the 2-1 victory.

In the first game UMR jumped out to an early lead in the first inning when Matt Bryant hit a three-run homer, his sixth of the season. That lead held until the sixth when the Hornets plated three runs capped off by a successful squeeze play to tie the game at three. The Hornets scored once more in the bottom of the seventh,

to give them the victory. The final score was 4-3.

In the second game a bases loaded RBI single in the fourth inning by Vince Como tied the game at one for the Miners, who then took the lead in the next inning thanks to a balk. That lead would

hold for the remainder of the game thanks to a strong pitcher performance by UMR starting pitcher Kevin Hill. Hill pitched a complete game, scattering seven hits and three walks over seven innings for the win.

On Tuesday, April 8, the Miners played two at Missouri Western, losing them both, 6-5 and 6-4.

The first game saw the Miners take the early advantage with four runs in the second inning. Hill started the UMR rally with a double to leadoff the inning, which was followed by an RBI triple by Bryant, an RBI single by Mike Williams, and RBI's by Andy Dial and Dwight Ippock. Missouri Western had

the game by the end of the fourth inning, and UMR took the lead for one last time in the sixth on a single by Ted Ingalls to score Williams. Western scored another run off of UMR starting pitcher Randy Root in the bottom half of the sixth to tie the game again, and scored the winning run in the bottom of the eighth off of reliever Brian Eisenloeffel.

In the second game the Miners tied the score at four all on a two-out, bases loaded triple by Hill, who then scored on a single by Pat Sisco. Western scored twice more in the bottom of the fifth, however, and the Miners failed to score in either the sixth or seventh, giving Missouri Western its second victory of the day.

One other doubleheader of note: the Miners played two against the Central Missouri State Mules, who were undefeated in the MIAA, on Wednesday, April 2. The Miners surprised the Mules by winning both games, 7-6 and 5-1. This marks the first time the Miners have beaten the Mules in twenty years, and the first time the Mules have lost both games of an MIAA doubleheader in seven years.

The Miners' next game will be today against Evangel College at the Miner Rec baseball field at 2 p.m.

Mike Weinkauff finished in first place in the 110 meter low hurdles. Chris Wildschuetz was third for UMR in the 400 meter dash. ### UMR takes twelfth out of fifteen in recent tournament

The Miner Golf Team will compete in the Lincoln Invitational on April 21 and 22. It will be played at Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Mo. The Missouri Western Invitational was supposed to be played on April 10-11 in St. Joseph, Mo., but was canceled because of weather conditions.

The Miner Golf Team did compete in the Central Missouri State University Heart of America Golf Tournament, which was played at Pertle Springs Golf course in Warrensburg, Mo. The Miners took 12th place out of 15 teams in the tournament. On the first day of competition, the Miners shot a combined score of 325, which

put them in 10th place for the day. Senior, Brian Panka led the Miners with a score of 80 on the first day. Bill Kuess and Andy Laegler each shot an 81. In the Missouri Baptist Spring Collegiate Meet held April 1-2 at Wentzville, Mo., the Miners fared much better. They took 3rd place in an

eight team tournament. On the first day of play, the Miners shot a 330, 28 strokes behind the leader, Indian Hills CC, who shot a 302. Missouri Baptist was in second place with a score of 318. Winschel had the best first round for UMR, with a score of 80. Laegler and Kuess followed close behind with scores of 81 and 83 respectively. Panka finished with a score of 86, and Smith with an 89.

On the second day, the team improved their scores from the previous day. Winschel, Laegler, and Smith each shot a 77; Panka finished with a 79, and Kuess with an 80.

Individually, all members of the team finished in the top 25 for the match. Winschel, a freshman, was the first Miner to finish in the top ten for this season. He took ninth place with a two day score of 157. Laegler finished only one stroke behind with a score of 158, but took 13th due to ties. Kuess was next for the Miners with a score of 163. He took 19th place. Finishing in 21st, was Panka, with a 165. Smith, who shot a 166 finished in 23rd place at the end of the tournament.
